## A BILL

To amend title 10, United States Code, to provide for the establishment of a combat artillery badge to recognize combat service by members of the Army in the artillery branch.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**

4       Congress makes the following findings:

5               (1) The field artillery is one of the oldest and  
6       most celebrated of the Army's combat arms.

1           (2) The field artillery was critical to American  
 2           success in the “War to end all Wars,” World War  
 3           I.

4           (3) The field artillery also proved to be a deci-  
 5           sive factor during World War II, helping the United  
 6           States achieve victories in Europe, Africa, and the  
 7           Pacific. General George S. Patton Jr. remarked, “I  
 8           do not need to tell you who won the war. You know  
 9           the artillery did.”

10          (4) The field artillery continued to play a role  
 11          in military actions in Korea, Vietnam, and the Per-  
 12          sian Gulf and it remains critical to today’s military  
 13          efforts.

14          (5) Despite the past heroic efforts of the mem-  
 15          bers of the Army who served in the field artillery,  
 16          there is no badge specifically recognizing the con-  
 17          tribution of field artillerymen.

18 **SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF COMBAT ARTILLERY BADGE.**

19          (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 357 of title 10, United  
 20          States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol-  
 21          lowing new section:

22 **“§ 3757. Combat artillery badge**

23          “(a) The Secretary of the Army shall issue a combat  
 24          artillery badge to each person who, while a member of the  
 25          Army in the artillery branch, participated in combat after

1 April 5, 1917. Criteria for the issuance of the medal shall  
 2 be established by the Secretary and shall be as similar as  
 3 practicable for the issuance of the combat infantry badge  
 4 to persons in the infantry branch.

5 “(b) In the case of persons who, while a member of  
 6 the Army in the artillery branch, participated in combat  
 7 after April 5, 1917, and before the date of the enactment  
 8 of this section, the Secretary shall issue the badge de-  
 9 scribed in subsection (a)—

10 “(1) to each such person who is known to the  
 11 Secretary before such date of enactment; and

12 “(2) to each such person with respect to whom  
 13 an application for the issuance of such badge is  
 14 made to the Secretary after such date in such man-  
 15 ner, and within such time period, as the Secretary  
 16 may require.”.
