#### A BILL

To designate the Grey Towers National Historic Site in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited	as the	e "Grey	Towers	National
3	Historic Site Act of 2004".				

#### 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS; PURPOSES; DEFINITIONS.

- 5 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
- (1) James and Mary Pinchot constructed a home
   and estate that is known as Grey Towers in Milford,
   Pennsylvania.
  - (2) James and Mary Pinchot were also the progenitors of a family of notable accomplishment in the history of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the Nation, in particular, their son, Gifford Pinchot.
    - (3) Gifford Pinchot was the first Chief of the Forest Service, a major influence in formulating and implementing forest conservation policies in the early 20th Century, and twice Governor of Pennsylvania.
    - (4) During the early 20th century, James and Gifford Pinchot used Grey Towers and the environs to establish scientific forestry, to develop conservation leaders, and to formulate conservation principles, thus making this site one of the primary birthplaces of the American conservation movement.
    - (5) In 1963, Gifford Bryce Pinchot, the son of Gifford and Cornelia Pinchot, donated Grey Towers and 102 acres to the Nation.

- (6) In 1963, President John F. Kennedy dedicated the Pinchot Institute for Conservation "for the greater knowledge of land and its uses" at Grey Towers National Historic Landmark, thereby establishing a partnership between the public and private sectors.
  - (7) Grey Towers today is a place of historical significance where leaders in natural resource conservation meet, study, and share ideas, analyses, values, and philosophies, and is also a place where the public can learn and appreciate our conservation heritage.
  - (8) As established by President Kennedy, the Pinchot Institute for Conservation, and the Forest Service at Grey Towers operate through an established partnership in developing and delivering programs that carry on Gifford Pinchot's conservation legacy.
  - (9) Grey Towers and associated structures in and around Milford, Pennsylvania, can serve to enhance regional recreational and educational opportunities.
- 22 (b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are as fol-23 lows:
- (1) To honor and perpetuate the memory of Gif-ford Pinchot.

1	(2) To promote the recreational and educational
2	resources of Milford, Pennsylvania, and its environs.
3	(3) To authorize the Secretary of Agriculture—
4	(A) to further the scientific, policy analysis,
5	educational, and cultural programs in natural
6	resource conservation at Grey Towers;
7	(B) to manage the property and environs
8	more efficiently and effectively; and
9	(C) to further collaborative ties with the
10	Pinchot Institute for Conservation, and other
11	Federal, State, and local agencies with shared
12	interests.
13	(c) Definitions.—For the purposes of this Act:
14	(1) Associated properties.—The term "Asso-
15	ciated Properties" means lands and improvements
16	outside of the Grey Towers National Historic Land-
17	mark within Pike County, Pennsylvania, and which
18	were associated with James and Mary Pinchot, the
19	Yale School of Forestry, or the Forest Service.
20	(2) Grey towers.—The term "Grey Towers"
21	means the buildings and surrounding area of ap-
22	proximately 303 acres, including the 102 acres do-
23	nated in 1963 to the United States and so designated
24	that year.

1	(3) Historic Site.—The term "Historic Site"		
2	means the Grey Towers National Historic Site, as so		
3	designated by this Act.		
4	(4) Pinchot institute.—The term "Pinchot		
5	Institute" means the Pinchot Institute for Conserva-		
6	tion, a nonprofit corporation established under the		
7	laws of the District of Columbia.		
8	(5) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means		
9	the Secretary of Agriculture.		
10	SEC. 3. DESIGNATION OF NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE.		
11	Subject to valid existing rights, all lands and improve-		
12	ments formerly encompassed within the Grey Towers Na-		
13	tional Historic Landmark are designated as the "Grey		
14	Towers National Historic Site".		
15	SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATION.		
16	(a) Purposes.—The Historic Site shall be adminis-		
17	tered for the following purposes:		
18	(1) Education, public demonstration projects,		
19	and research related to natural resource conservation,		
20	protection, management, and use.		
21	(2) Leadership development within the natural		
22	resource professions and the Federal civil service.		
23	(3) Continuing Gifford Pinchot's legacy through		
24	pursuit of new ideas, strategies, and solutions to nat-		

- ural resource issues that include economic, ecological,
   and social values.
- (4) Preservation, use, and maintenance of the
   buildings, grounds, facilities, and archives associated
   with Gifford Pinchot.
- 6 (5) Study and interpretation of the life and 7 works of Gifford Pinchot.
- 8 (6) Public recreation and enjoyment.
- 9 (7) Protection and enjoyment of the scenic and natural environs.
- 11 (b) APPLICABLE LAWS.—The Secretary shall admin-
- 12 ister federally owned lands and interests in lands at the
- 13 Historic Site and Associated Properties as components of
- 14 the National Forest System in accordance with this Act,
- 15 16 U.S.C. 461 et seq. and other laws generally applicable
- 16 to the administration of national historic sites, and the
- 17 laws, rules, and regulations applicable to the National For-
- 18 est System, except that the Forest and Rangeland Renew-
- 19 able Resources Planning Act of 1974 (16 U.S.C. 1600, et
- 20 seq.) shall not apply.
- 21 (c) Land Acquisition.—The Secretary is authorized
- 22 to acquire, on a willing seller basis, by purchase, donation,
- 23 exchange, or otherwise, privately owned lands and interests
- 24 in lands, including improvements, within the Historic Site

- 1 and the Associated Properties, using donated or appro-
- 3 (d) GIFTS.—

priated funds.

- 4 (1) Accepted by entities other than the
  5 Secretary.—Subject to such terms and conditions as
  6 the Secretary may prescribe, any public or private
  7 agency, organization, institution, or individual may
  8 solicit, accept, and administer private gifts of money
  9 and real or personal property for the benefit of, or in
  10 connection with, the activities and services at the His11 toric Site.
- 12 (2) ACCEPTED BY THE SECRETARY.—Gifts may
  13 be accepted by the Secretary for the benefit of, or in
  14 connection with, the activities and services at the His15 toric Site notwithstanding the fact that a donor con16 ducts business with or is regulated by the Department
  17 of Agriculture in any capacity.

#### 18 SEC. 5. COOPERATIVE AUTHORITIES.

19 (a) Grants, Contracts, and Cooperative Agree20 Ments.—The Secretary is authorized to enter into agree21 ments for grants, contracts, and cooperative agreements as
22 appropriate with the Pinchot Institute, public and other
23 private agencies, organizations, institutions, and individ24 uals to provide for the development, administration, main25 tenance, or restoration of land, facilities, or Forest Service

- 1 programs at Grey Towers or to otherwise further the pur-
- 2 poses of this Act.
- 3 (b) Interdepartmental.—The Secretary and the
- 4 Secretary of the Interior are authorized and encouraged to
- 5 cooperate in promoting public use and enjoyment of Grey
- 6 Towers and the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation
- 7 Area and in otherwise furthering the administration and
- 8 purposes for which both areas were designated. Such co-
- 9 operation may include colocation and use of facilities with-
- 10 in Associated Properties and elsewhere.
- 11 (c) Other.—The Secretary may authorize use of the
- 12 grounds and facilities of Grey Towers by the Pinchot Insti-
- 13 tute and other participating partners including Federal,
- 14 State, and local agencies, on such terms and conditions as
- 15 the Secretary may prescribe, including the waiver of special
- 16 use authorizations and the waiver of rental and use fees.
- 17 SEC. 6. FUNDS.
- 18 (a) Fees and Charges.—The Secretary may impose
- 19 reasonable fees and charges for admission to and use of fa-
- 20 cilities on Grey Towers.
- 21 (b) Special Fund.—Any monies received by the For-
- 22 est Service in administering Grey Towers shall be deposited
- 23 into the Treasury of the United States and covered in a
- 24 special fund called the Grey Towers National Historic Site
- 25 Fund. Monies in the Grey Towers National Historic Site

- 1 Fund shall be available until expended, without further ap-
- 2 propriation, for support of programs of Grey Towers, and
- 3 any other expenses incurred in the administration of Grey
- 4 Towers.
- 5 SEC. 7. MAP.
- 6 The Secretary shall produce and keep for public in-
- 7 spection a map of the Historic Site and associated prop-
- 8 erties within Pike County, Pennsylvania, which were asso-
- 9 ciated with James and Mary Pinchot, the Yale School of
- 10 Forestry, or the Forest Service.
- 11 SEC. 8. SAVINGS PROVISION.
- Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to diminish the
- 13 authorities of the Secretary under the Cooperative Forestry
- 14 Assistance Act or any other law pertaining to the National
- 15 Forest System.
