## A BILL

- To establish a Federal Interagency Committee on Emergency Medical Services and a Federal Interagency Committee on Emergency Medical Services Advisory Council, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Emergency Medical
- 5 Services Support Act".

## 1 SEC. 2. FEDERAL INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE ON EMER 2 GENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.

3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary of Transportation and the Secretary of Homeland Security, through 4 5 the Under Secretary for Emergency Preparedness and Response and in consultation with the Secretary of Health 6 7 and Human Services, shall establish a Federal Inter-8 agency Committee on Emergency Medical Services (in this 9 Act referred to as the "Interagency Committee on EMS") to improve coordination and enhance support of emer-10 11 gency medical services.

(b) MEMBERSHIP.—The Interagency Committee on
EMS shall consist of the following officials, or their designees:

15 (1) The Administrator of the National Highway16 Traffic Safety Administration.

17 (2) The Director of the Office for Domestic
18 Preparedness of the Department of Homeland Secu19 rity.

20 (3) The Administrator of the Health Resources
21 and Services Administration of the Department of
22 Health and Human Services.

23 (4) The Director of the Centers for Disease
24 Control and Prevention of the Department of Health
25 and Human Services.

1	(5) The Administrator of the United States
2	Fire Administration of the Department of Homeland
3	Security.
4	(6) Medicaid Services of the Department of
5	Health and Human Services.
6	(7) The Under Secretary of Defense for Per-
7	sonnel and Readiness.
8	(8) The Assistant Secretary for Public Health
9	Emergency Preparedness of the Department of
10	Health and Human Services.
11	(9) The Director of the Indian Health Service
12	of the Department of Health and Human Services.
13	(10) The Bureau Chief of the Wireless Tele-
14	communications Bureau of the Federal Communica-
15	tions Commission.
16	(11) A representative of any other Federal
17	agency identified by the Secretary of Transportation
18	or the Secretary of Homeland Security, through the
19	Under Secretary for Emergency Preparedness and
20	Response and in consultation with the Secretary of
21	Health and Human Services, as having a significant
22	role in relation to the purposes of the Interagency
23	Committee on EMS.
24	(c) LEADERSHIP.—The members of the Interagency
25	Committee on EMS shall annually select an individual

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1	from among the members of the Committee to serve as
2	chairperson of the Committee.
3	(d) ACTIVITIES.—The Interagency Committee on
4	EMS shall carry out the following activities:
5	(1) Ensuring coordination among the Federal
6	agencies represented on the Interagency Committee
7	on EMS with State, local, tribal, and regional emer-
8	gency medical services and 9–1–1 systems.
9	(2) Identifying State, local, tribal, and regional
10	emergency medical services and 9–1–1 needs.
11	(3) Ensuring that emergency medical services
12	are appropriately integrated with homeland security
13	and other emergency response programs.
14	(4) Recommending new or expanded programs,
15	including grant programs, for—
16	(A) improving State, local, tribal, and re-
17	gional emergency medical services; and
18	(B) implementing improved interoperable
19	voice and data emergency medical services and
20	communications technologies, including wireless
21	9-1-1.
22	(5) Identifying ways to streamline the process
23	through which Federal agencies support State, local,
24	

tribal, and regional emergency medical services.

(6) Assisting State, local, tribal, and regional
 emergency medical services in setting priorities
 based on identified needs.

4 (7) Advising, consulting, and making rec5 ommendations on matters relating to the implemen6 tation of the coordinated State emergency medical
7 services programs.

8 (e) MEETINGS.—The Interagency Committee on 9 EMS shall meet as frequently as is determined necessary 10 by the chairperson of the Committee, but no less fre-11 quently than quarterly.

12 (f) ADMINISTRATION.—The Administrator of the Na-13 tional Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in cooperation with the Director of the Office for Domestic Pre-14 15 paredness of the Department of Homeland Security, shall provide administrative support to the Interagency Com-16 17 mittee on EMS, including scheduling meetings, setting agendas, keeping minutes and records, and producing re-18 19 ports.

(g) ANNUAL REPORTS.—The Interagency Committee
on EMS shall prepare and submit an annual report to
Congress on the Committee's activities, actions, and recommendations, and shall include in such report a description of respective Federal agency responsibility, support,
and coordination of emergency medical services systems.

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# 1 SEC. 3. FEDERAL INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE ON EMER 2 GENCY MEDICAL SERVICES ADVISORY COUN 3 CIL.

4 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established a Fed-5 eral Interagency Committee on Emergency Medical Services Advisory Council (in this Act referred to as the "Advi-6 7 sory Council") that shall consist of not more than 13 indi-8 viduals with an interest or expertise in emergency medical 9 services selected by the Interagency Committee on EMS. 10 (b) MEMBERSHIP.—In selecting members of the Advisory Council, the Interagency Committee on EMS shall 11 ensure that the Advisory Council represents— 12

13 (1) both urban and rural areas; and

14 (2) all sectors of the emergency medical services15 community.

(c) LEADERSHIP.—Members of the Advisory Council
shall annually select an individual from among the members of the Council to serve as chairperson of the Advisory
Council.

20 (d) ACTIVITIES.—The Advisory Council shall make
21 recommendations to the Interagency Committee on EMS
22 on topics including the following:

(1) Improved coordination and support of emergency medical services systems among Federal programs.

(2) Development of a national emergency med ical services plan.
 (2) Standarda, gridaling, handbradig, and

3 (3) Standards, guidelines, benchmarks, and
4 data collection on emergency medical services.

5 (4) Guidelines for conducting needs assessments
6 for improving community-based emergency medical
7 services systems at State and local levels.

8 (5) Creation of new, or the expansion of exist9 ing, grants or other programs for improving commu10 nity-based emergency medical services.

(6) Consolidation or realignment of Federal
agency or program responsibility for emergency medical services.

14 (7) Strengthening emergency medical services
15 systems through enhanced workforce development,
16 education, training, exercises, equipment, medical
17 oversight, and other areas.

18 (8) Issues or topics to be addressed in the an-19 nual report of the Interagency Committee on EMS. 20 (e) ANNUAL REPORT.—Before the Interagency Com-21 mittee on EMS submits the annual report required under 22 section 2(g) to Congress, the Advisory Council shall review 23 the report and include independent information or rec-24 ommendations for inclusion in the report, as deemed appropriate by the Advisory Council. 25

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1	(f) MEETINGS.—The Advisory Council—
2	(1) shall meet at the same time and place as
3	the Interagency Committee on EMS, when such
4	Committee meets; and
5	(2) may conduct independent meetings to re-
6	ceive public comment and collect data and informa-
7	tion.
8	(g) Compensation and Reimbursement.—
9	(1) COMPENSATION.—The members of the Ad-
10	visory Council shall receive no pay by reason of their
11	service as a member of the Advisory Council.
12	(2) TRAVEL EXPENSES.—The members of the
13	Advisory Council shall be allowed travel expenses, in-
14	cluding per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates au-
15	thorized for employees of agencies under subchapter
16	1 of chapter 57 of title 5, United States Code, while
17	away from their homes or regular places of business
18	in the performance of services for the Advisory
19	Council.
20	(h) Administration.—The Administrator of the

(h) ADMINISTRATION.—The Administrator of the
