### A BILL

To adjust the boundary of the Cumberland Island Wilderness, to authorize tours of the Cumberland Island National Seashore, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "Cumberland Island Wil-
- 3 derness Boundary Adjustment Act of 2004".
- 4 SEC. 2. CUMBERLAND ISLAND WILDERNESS BOUNDARY AD-
- 5 **JUSTMENT**.
- 6 Public Law 97–250 (96 Stat. 709) is amended by
- 7 striking section 2 and inserting the following:
- 8 "SEC. 2. CUMBERLAND ISLAND WILDERNESS.
- 9 "(a) Definitions.—In this section:
- 10 "(1) MAP.—The term 'map' means the map enti-
- 11 tled 'Cumberland Island Wilderness', numbered 640/
- 12 20,038I, and dated September 2004.
- 13 "(2) Secretary.—The term 'Secretary' means
- 14 the Secretary of the Interior.
- 15 "(3) WILDERNESS.—The term 'Wilderness'
- 16 means the Cumberland Island Wilderness established
- by subsection (b).
- 18 "(4) POTENTIAL WILDERNESS.—The term 'Po-
- tential Wilderness' means the 10,500 acres of poten-
- 20 tial wilderness described in subsection (c)(2), but does
- 21 not include the area at the north end of Cumberland
- 22 Island known as the 'High Point Half-Moon Bluff
- 23 Historic District'.
- 24 "(b) Establishment.—
- 25 "(1) In General.—Approximately 9,886 acres
- of land in the Cumberland Island National Seashore

- depicted on the map as 'Wilderness' is designated as a component of the National Wilderness Preservation System and shall be known as the 'Cumberland Island Wilderness'.
- 5 "(2) EXCLUSIONS.—The 25-foot wide roadways 6 depicted on the map as the 'Main Road', 'Plum Or-7 chard', and the 'North Cut Road' shall not be in-8 cluded in the Wilderness and shall be maintained by 9 the Secretary for continued vehicle use.
- 10 "(c) ADDITIONAL LAND.—In addition to the land des-11 ignated under subsection (b), the Secretary shall—
- "(1) on acquisition of the approximately 231
  acres of land identified on the map as 'Areas Become
  Designated Wilderness upon Acquisition by the NPS';
  and
- "(2) on publication in the Federal Register of a notice that all uses of the approximately 10,500 acres of land depicted on the map as 'Potential Wilderness' that are prohibited under the Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.) have ceased, adjust the boundary of the Wilderness to include the land.
- "(d) AVAILABILITY OF MAP.—The map shall be on file
  and available for public inspection in the appropriate offices of the National Park Service.

- 1 "(e) Administration.—Subject to valid existing
- 2 rights, the Wilderness shall be administered by the Sec-
- 3 retary, in accordance with the applicable provisions of the
- 4 Wilderness Act (16 U.S.C. 1131 et seq.) governing areas des-
- 5 ignated by that Act as wilderness areas, except that—
- 6 "(1) any reference in such provisions to the effec-
- 7 tive date of that Act shall be deemed to be a reference
- 8 to the effective date of this Act; and
- 9 "(2) where appropriate, any reference in that
- 10 Act to the Secretary of Agriculture shall be deemed to
- be a reference to the Secretary.
- 12 "(f) Effect.—Any person with a right to utility serv-
- 13 ice on Cumberland Island on the date of enactment of this
- 14 subsection shall continue to have the right to utility service
- 15 in the Wilderness after the date of enactment of this sub-
- 16 section.
- 17 "(g) Management Plan for Access to Main Road
- 18 AND NORTH CUT ROAD.—Not later than one year after the
- 19 date of the enactment of the Cumberland Island Wilderness
- 20 Boundary Adjustment Act of 2004, the Secretary shall com-
- 21 plete a management plan to ensure that not more than 8
- 22 and not less than 5 round trips are made available daily
- 23 on the Main Road north of the Plum Orchard Spur and
- 24 the North Cut Road by the National Park Service or a con-
