Mr. LaHood (for himself and Mr. Jackson of Illinois) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Financial Services

A BILL

To provide for the redesign of the reverse of the Lincoln 1-cent coin in 2009 in commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the birth of President Abraham Lincoln.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Abraham Lincoln Bi-
- 5 centennial 1-Cent Coin Redesign Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds as follows:
- 8 (1) Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President, was
- 9 one of the Nation's greatest leaders, demonstrating

- true courage during the Civil War, one of the greatest crises in the Nation's history.
- 3 (2) Born of humble roots in Hardin County, 4 Kentucky, on February 12, 1809, Abraham Lincoln 5 rose to the Presidency through a combination of 6 honesty, integrity, intelligence, and commitment to 7 the United States.
 - (3) With the belief that all men are created equal, Abraham Lincoln led the effort to free all slaves in the United States.
 - (4) Abraham Lincoln had a generous heart, with malice toward none and with charity for all.
 - (5) Abraham Lincoln gave the ultimate sacrifice for the country he loved, dying from an assassin's bullet on April 15, 1865.
 - (6) All Americans could benefit from studying the life of Abraham Lincoln, for Lincoln's life is a model for accomplishing the "American dream" through honesty, integrity, loyalty, and a lifetime of education.
 - (7) The year 2009 will be the bicentennial anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln.
- 23 (8) Abraham Lincoln was born in Kentucky, 24 grew to adulthood in Indiana, achieved fame in Illi-25 nois, and led the nation in Washington, D.C.

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- 1 (9) The so-called "Lincoln cent" was introduced 2 in 1909 on the 100th anniversary of Lincoln's birth, 3 making the obverse design the most enduring on the 4 nation's coinage.
 - (10) President Theodore Roosevelt was so impressed by the talent of Victor David Brenner that the sculptor was chosen to design the likeness of President Lincoln for the coin, adapting a design from a plaque Brenner had prepared earlier.
 - (11) In the nearly 100 years of production of the "Lincoln cent", there have been only 2 designs on the reverse: the original, featuring 2 wheat-heads in memorial style enclosing mottoes, and the current representation of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C.
 - (12) On the occasion of the bicentennial of President Lincoln's birth and the 100th anniversary of the production of the Lincoln cent, it is entirely fitting to issue a series of 1-cent coins with designs on the reverse that are emblematic of the 4 major periods of President Lincoln's life.

22 SEC. 3. REDESIGN OF LINCOLN CENT FOR 2009.

23 (a) IN GENERAL.—During the year 2009, the Sec-24 retary of the Treasury shall issue 1-cent coins in accord-25 ance with the following design specifications:

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1	(1) Obverse.—The obverse of the 1-cent coin
2	shall continue to bear the Victor David Brenner like-
3	ness of President Abraham Lincoln.
4	(2) Reverse.—The reverse of the coins shall
5	bear 4 different designs each representing a dif-
6	ferent aspect of the life of Abraham Lincoln, such
7	as—
8	(A) his birth and early childhood in Ken-
9	tucky;
10	(B) his formative years in Indiana;
11	(C) his professional life in Illinois; and
12	(D) his presidency, in Washington, D.C.
13	(b) Issuance of Redesigned Lincoln Cents in
14	2009.—
15	(1) Order.—The 1-cent coins to which this
16	section applies shall be issued with 1 of the 4 de-
17	signs referred to in subsection (a)(2) beginning at
18	the start of each calendar quarter of 2009.
19	(2) Number.—The Secretary shall prescribe,
20	on the basis of such factors as the Secretary deter-
21	mines to be appropriate, the number of 1-cent coins
22	that shall be issued with each of the designs selected
23	for each calendar quarter of 2009.

1	(e) Design Selection.—The designs for the coins
2	specified in this section shall be chosen by the Sec-
3	retary——
4	(1) after consultation with the Abraham Lin-
5	coln Bicentennial Commission and the Commission
6	of Fine Arts; and
7	(2) after review by the Citizens Coinage Advi-
8	sory Committee.
9	SEC. 4. REDESIGN OF REVERSE OF 1-CENT COINS AFTER
10	2009.
11	The design on the reverse of the 1-cent coins issued
12	after December 31, 2009 shall bear an image emblematic
13	of President Lincoln's preservation of the United States
14	of America as a single and united country.
15	SEC. 5. NUMISMATIC PENNIES WITH THE SAME METALLIC
16	CONTENT AS THE 1909 PENNY.
17	The Secretary of the Treasury shall issue 1-cent coins
18	in 2009 with the exact metallic content as the 1-cent coin
19	contained in 1909 in such number as the Secretary deter-
20	mines to be appropriate for numismatic purposes
21	SEC. 6. SENSE OF THE CONGRESS.
22	It is the sense of the Congress that the original Victor
23	David Brenner design for the 1-cent coin was a dramatic
24	departure from previous American coinage that should be
25	reproduced, using the original form and relief of the like-

1 ness of Abraham Lincoln, on the 1-cent coins issued in2 2009.

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
