# A BILL

- To accord honorary citizenship to the alien victims of the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks against the United States and to provide for the granting of permanent resident status to the alien spouses and children of certain victims of such attacks.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
  - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
  - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Terrorist Victim Citi-
  - 5 zenship Relief Act of 2003".
  - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
  - 7 Congress makes the following findings:

- 1 (1) On September 11, 2001, the United States 2 suffered a series of attacks which led to the deaths 3 of thousands of people.
  - (2) Hundreds of foreign nationals perished in the attacks on the American institutions on American soil.
  - (3) At that time, the Immigration and Naturalization Service was processing applications for adjustment in immigration status for immigrants who perished in the attacks.
  - (4) The immigrant or nonimmigrant status of many immigrant families depends on the sponsorship of those who perished.
  - (5) The Immigration and Naturalization Service has publicly stated that it does not intend to take action against foreign nationals whose immigration status is in jeopardy as a direct result of the attack.
  - (6) Commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service James Ziglar stated that "the Immigration and Naturalization Service will exercise its discretion toward families of victims during this time of mourning and readjustment".
  - (7) Only Congress has the authority to change immigration law to address unanticipated omissions in existing law to account for the unique cir-

- 7 (1) inadmissible under paragraph (2) or (3) of
- 8 section 212(a) of the Immigration and Nationality
- 9 Act, or deportable under paragraph (2) or (4) of sec-
- tion 237(a) of that Act, including any terrorist per-
- petrator of a September 11, 2001, terrorist attack
- against the United States; or
- 13 (2) a member of the family of a person de-14 scribed in paragraph (1).

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
