# RESOLUTION

Commending the people and government of Kenya for the  
recent free elections and the orderly and democratic  
transfer of power.

Whereas Mr. Mwai Kibaki recently took the oath of office as  
Kenya's third president;

Whereas President Daniel Moi peacefully transferred power  
after 24 years in office;

Whereas the election of the new president was supported by  
63 percent of the voters, reflecting the decided will of the  
people;

Whereas in spite of unseasonably heavy rains, the elections  
for president, parliament, and more than 2,000 local  
councilors were described by local and international ob-

servers as the most free and fair in Kenya's 39-year history as an independent nation;

Whereas the presidents of Uganda, Tanzania, and Zambia, as well as the prime minister of Rwanda and the wife of South African President Thabo Mbeki, in a strong show of solidarity by the people and countries in the region, with the newly elected government, witnessed the swearing-in ceremony of President Kibaki; and

Whereas the recent elections represent an example for other countries in the region: Now, therefore, be it

1       *Resolved*, That the House of Representatives—

2               (1) commends the people of Kenya and its  
3               newly elected president, members of parliament, and  
4               local councilors for their extraordinary conduct in  
5               the practice of and commitment to the principles of  
6               free elections and a democratic form of government;

7               (2) expresses full support for the new government of Kenya as it begins the difficult transition to  
8               new leadership and addresses the issues of the economy and raised expectations of its citizens for a government more responsive the the needs of its people;

12               (3) urges patience on the part of the people of Kenya as the new government confronts the challenges that lay ahead; and

15               (4) urges the President of the United States to look with favor upon requests for assistance that may be presented to the United States by the new

1 government of Kenya, as it moves forward to ad-  
2 dress the many concerns of the people of this most  
3 important African country.
