A BILL

To establish the National Center for Transportation Solutions, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.

- 4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the 5 "National Center for Transportation Solutions Act of
- **6** 2004".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2 Congress makes the following findings:

3 (1) Research and development are critical to de4 veloping and maintaining a transportation system
5 that meets the goals of safety, mobility, economic vi6 tality, efficiency, equity, and environmental protec7 tion.

8 (2) Federal investment in transportation re-9 search and development represents approximately 1 10 percent of overall Government spending on transpor-11 tation programs.

(3) While Congress increased funding for overall transportation programs by about 40 percent in
the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century
(Public Law 105–178), funding for transportation
research and development remained relatively flat.

17 (4) Inadequate resources are devoted to re-18 search aimed at long-term transportation goals.

19 (5) The competitive, peer-reviewed award of re20 search funding is best suited to address long-term,
21 strategic research needs.

1 (6) The diversity of transportation research 2 programs that address the needs of different cus-3 tomers poses challenges to effective regional-based 4 and university-based transportation research centers, 5 and short-term applied research and development and long-term fundamental research and develop-6 7 ment. 8 (7) The wide-ranging subject matter of trans-9 portation research makes effective priority setting 10 difficult. 11 (8) In order to ensure that the United States 12 transportation system meets the goals of safety, mo-13 bility, economic vitality, equity, and environmental 14 protection, it is in the interest of the United States 15 to---16 (A) increase Federal investment in long-17 range transportation planning; 18 (B) initiate and support competitive, peer-19 reviewed research into systemic transportation 20 issues; 21 (C) better coordinate the research and de-22 velopment programs of the Department of 23 Transportation;

1 (D) foster the interchange of transpor-2 tation research and development data among 3 interested parties; and

4 (E) establish nationwide priorities in Fed5 eral transportation research and development.

6 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONAL CENTER FOR 7 TRANSPORTATION SOLUTIONS.

8 There is hereby established as an independent agency 9 in the executive branch of government the National Center 10 for Transportation Solutions (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Center"). The Center shall consist of 11 12 the National Center for Transportation Solutions Board established under section 5 and the Director of National 13 Transportation Research appointed under section 6. Ex-14 15 cept as otherwise provided in this Act, the National Center for Transportation Solutions Board shall exercise the au-16 thorities of the Center. 17

18 SEC. 4. DUTIES OF THE CENTER.

19 (a) RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT.—

(1) LONG-TERM POLICY.—The Center shall develop and encourage the execution of a long-term national policy for the promotion of research and development related to multimodal transportation.

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(2) PROJECTS.—The Center shall initiate and 1 2 support research and development projects related to 3 multimodal transportation that— 4 (A) are of long-term significance; 5 (B) have clear public benefits and in which 6 private investment is not optimal due to the failure of, or distortions in, the market; or 7 8 (C) are not otherwise conducted in the 9 public or private sectors. 10 (b) GRANTS.—The Center is authorized to award 11 competitive, merit-based grants to academic, public, and 12 private research institutions to support long-term, stra-13 tegic transportation objectives. 14 (c) COORDINATION OF RESEARCH AND DEVELOP-15 MENT.—The Center shall facilitate the interchange of transportation research data among interested parties in 16 17 the United States, including by— 18 (1) serving as a clearinghouse of information 19 for individuals engaged in transportation research 20 and development in the United States; 21 (2) consulting with officials from the Depart-22 ment of Transportation in the development of rec-23 ommendations related to transportation research; 24 and

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(3) coordinating scientific research programs
 with public and private research groups.

3 (d) EVALUATION OF RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT
4 PROGRAMS.—The Center shall evaluate programs related
5 to transportation research and development that are con6 ducted by the United States Government.

7 (e) ANNUAL REPORT.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than January 15, 9 2006, and annually thereafter, the Director of Na-10 tional Transportation Research shall submit to Con-11 gress a report on activities undertaken by the Center 12 during the fiscal year ending in the previous cal-13 endar year.

14 (2) RECOMMENDATIONS.—Each report sub15 mitted under paragraph (1) shall include rec16 ommendations on research and development related
17 to multimodal transportation, including any minority
18 views and recommendations of members of the Na19 tional Center for Transportation Solutions Board.

20 SEC. 5. NATIONAL CENTER FOR TRANSPORTATION SOLU-21 TIONS BOARD.

(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is hereby established
the National Center for Transportation Solutions Board
(hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Board").

25 (b) MEMBERSHIP.—

1	(1) Composition.—The Board shall be com-
2	posed of the Director of National Transportation
3	Research, who shall serve ex officio, and 16 voting
4	members, of whom—
5	(A) four shall be appointed by the Sec-
6	retary of Transportation;
7	(B) four shall be appointed by the Director
8	of the National Academies; and
9	(C) eight shall be appointed by the Presi-
10	dent, in consultation with the majority leader of
11	the Senate, the minority leader of the Senate,
12	the Speaker of the House of Representatives,
13	and the minority leader of the House of Rep-
14	resentatives, by and with the advice and con-
15	sent of the Senate.
16	(2) QUALIFICATIONS.—The members of the
17	Board shall—
18	(A) represent various professions and occu-
19	pations in the public and private sectors;
20	(B) to the extent practicable, represent a
21	broad range of regions of the United States;
22	and
23	(C) possess skills and experience appro-
24	priate to the functions and responsibilities of
25	the Center.

1	(c) Appointment; Vacancies.—
2	(1) INITIAL APPOINTMENTS.—The initial mem-
3	bers of the Board shall be appointed not less than
4	90 days after the date of enactment of this Act.
5	(2) TERMS.—
6	(A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in
7	subparagraph (B), members shall serve for
8	terms of 6 years. No member may serve for
9	more than two consecutive terms.
10	(B) STAGGERED TERMS.—The terms of
11	the members shall be staggered, with the initial
12	members appointed for the following initial
13	terms:
14	(i) Six members shall serve for a term
15	of six years.
16	(ii) Five members shall serve for a
17	term of four years.
18	(iii) Five members shall serve for a
19	term of two years.
20	(C) Non-election year expiration.—
21	The term of a member under this subsection
22	shall not expire during a calendar year in which
23	an election occurs to select the President or any
24	members of the Senate or the House of Rep-
25	resentatives (not including special elections).

The initial terms described under subparagraph
(B) may, at the discretion of the Director, be
extended for not to exceed one year for pur-
poses of complying with the requirements of
this subparagraph.
(3) VACANCIES.—Any vacancy in the Board
shall not affect its powers, but shall be filled in the
same manner as the original appointment.
(d) Meetings.—
(1) INITIAL MEETING.—Not later than 30 days
after the date on which all members of the Board
have been appointed, the Board shall hold its first
meeting.
(2) MEETINGS.—The Board shall meet at the
call of the Chair.
(3) QUORUM.—A majority of the members of
the Board shall constitute a quorum, but a lesser
number of members may hold hearings.
(e) Chairman and Vice Chairman.—
(1) Selection.—The Board shall select a
Chairman and Vice Chairman from among its mem-
bers.
(2) TERMS.—The Chairman and Vice Chair-
man shall serve for 2-year terms. An individual may

not serve for more than two consecutive terms as
 Chairman.

3 SEC. 6. DIRECTOR OF NATIONAL TRANSPORTATION RE-4 SEARCH.

5 (a) DIRECTOR.—There shall be a Director of Na-6 tional Transportation Research who shall be appointed by 7 the President, by and with the consent of the Senate 8 (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Director"). The 9 Board shall have an opportunity to make recommenda-10 tions to the President with respect to the appointment of 11 the Director.

12 (b) DUTIES.—The Director—

13 (1) shall serve as the chief executive office of14 the Center;

15 (2) is authorized to carry out the authorities16 and powers of the Center; and

17 (3) shall serve as a nonvoting, ex officio mem-18 ber of the Board.

19 (c) TERM.—The Director shall serve for a term of20 six years unless earlier removed by the President.

(d) SALARY.—The rate of pay for the Director may
not exceed the rate payable for level V of the Executive
Schedule under section 5316 of title 5, United States
Code.

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1 SEC. 7. ORGANIZATION OF CENTER. 2 (a) DIVISIONS.—Subject to the discretion of the 3 Board, the Center shall be organized into the following 4 divisions: 5 (1) The Division of Transportation Safety. 6 (2) The Division of Environmental, Energy, 7 and Land Use Planning. 8 (3) The Division of Infrastructure. 9 (4) The Division of Intermodal Connections. 10 (5) The Division of Transportation Economics 11 and Financial Policy. 12 (6) Such other divisions as the Board deter-13 mines appropriate. 14 (b) DIVISION COMMITTEES.— 15 (1) IN GENERAL.—Each division under sub-16 section (a) shall have a committee that shall make 17 recommendations to, consult with, and advise the 18 Board and the Director with respect to the issues 19 covered by such division. 20(2) COMPOSITION.—Each division committee 21 shall be composed of not less than five members who 22 may be, but need not be, members of the Board. 23 (3) TERMS.—Members of the division commit-24 tees shall serve for terms of two years. 25 (4) CHAIRMEN.—Each division committee shall

annually elect a Chairman from among its members.

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(5) PROCEDURES.—Each division committee
 shall prescribe its own rules of procedure, subject to
 such restrictions as may be prescribed by the Board.

4 SEC. 8. POWERS OF CENTER.

5 (a) HEARINGS.—The Board and each division com-6 mittee may hold such hearings, sit and act at such times 7 and places, take such testimony, and receive such evidence 8 as the Board or such division committee considers advis-9 able to carry out this Act.

10 (b) INFORMATION FROM FEDERAL AGENCIES.—The Board and each division committee may secure directly 11 12 from any Federal department or agency such information 13 as the Board or such division committee considers necessary to carry out this Act. Upon request of the Chair-14 15 man of the Board or the Chairman of a division committee, the head of such department or agency shall fur-16 17 nish such information to the Board or the division committee, as the case may be. 18

(c) CONTRACTS.—The Board is authorized to enter
into contracts and cooperative agreements to carry out the
purposes of this Act, including sole source agreements
with the National Academy of Sciences and other entities
to provide studies to assist the Board in developing policies and strategies.

(d) POSTAL SERVICES.—The Board and the division
 committees may use the United States mails in the same
 manner and under the same conditions as other depart ments and agencies of the Federal Government.

5 (e) GIFTS.—The Board and the division committees
6 may accept, use, and dispose of gifts or donations of serv7 ices or property.

8 (f) PUBLICATION OF RESEARCH.—The Center may9 publish the results of its research.

10 SEC. 9. CENTER PERSONNEL MATTERS.

11 (a) Staff.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director may, without
regard to civil service laws and regulations, appoint
and terminate such personnel from among personnel
of the Department of Transportation and the National Academies as may be necessary to enable the
Center to perform its duties.

(2) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The staff of the Center appointed under paragraph (1) shall, at the discretion of the Director, carry out the following responsibilities:

(A) Submit to the Board a multiyear stra-tegic plan and annual plans for the Center.

24 (B) Develop an annual budget for the Cen-25 ter.

1	(C) Administer the programs of the Cen-
2	ter, including through oversight of the grant
3	program under section 4(b).
4	(D) Provide staff support to the Board.
5	(E) Report periodically to the Board on
6	the progress of the programs of the Center.
7	(F) Coordinate with personnel from the
8	Department of Transportation, the National
9	Science Foundation, the Transportation Re-
10	search Board, and other independent organiza-
11	tions that focus on transportation issues in
12	order to leverage intellectual and other re-
13	sources.
14	(3) COMPENSATION.—The Director may fix the
15	compensation of Center personnel without regard to
16	chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title
17	5, United States Code, relating to classification of
18	positions and General Schedule pay rates, except
19	that the rate of pay for personnel may not exceed
20	the rate payable for level V of the Executive Sched-
21	ule under section 5316 of such title.
22	(4) Detail of government employees
23	Any Federal Government employee may be detailed
24	to the Center without reimbursement, and such de-

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tail shall be without interruption or loss of civil serv ice status or privilege.

3 (5) PROCUREMENT OF TEMPORARY AND INTER-4 MITTENT SERVICES.—The Director may procure 5 temporary and intermittent services under section 6 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, at rates for 7 individuals which do not exceed the daily equivalent 8 of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level 9 V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of 10 such title.

(6) ACCEPTANCE OF VOLUNTEER SERVICES.—
The Director may accept volunteer services to carry
out activities under this Act without regard to section 1342 of title 31, United States Code.

15 SEC. 10. REGIONAL CENTERS FOR TRANSPORTATION SOLU16 TIONS.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than September 30,
2005, the Director shall award grants to establish regional
centers for transportation solutions. One regional center
shall be located in each of 4 regions established by the
Board for the northeast, northwest, southeast, and southwest regions of the United States.

(b) RESEARCH.—The regional centers establishedunder this section shall initiate and support research

projects into regional multimodal transportation issues
 that—

- 3 (1) are of long-term significance;
- 4 (2) have clear public benefits and in which pri5 vate investment is not optional due to the failure of,
 6 or distortions in, the market; or

7 (3) are not otherwise conducted in the public or8 private sectors.

9 (c) NORTHEAST REGIONAL CENTER.—The location 10 of the regional center established under this section for 11 the northeast region of the United States shall be located 12 in a State that—

(1) is one of the 5 States with the highest levels
of traffic congestion in the United States, based on
the ratio of annual vehicle miles traveled on National Highway System roads that are located in the
State to the number of National Highway System
lane miles that are located in such State; and

(2) is one of the 10 States with the highest levels of traffic congestion in the United States, based
on the ratio of miles of National Highway System
roads that are located in urban areas in the State
to the number of National Highway System lane
miles that are located in urban areas in such State.

1 SEC. 11. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2 There are authorized to be appropriated from the
3 Highway Trust Fund the following sums to carry out the
4 purposes of this Act:

- 5 (1) In fiscal year 2006, \$50,000,000.
- 6 (2) In fiscal year 2007, \$100,000,000.
- 7 (3) In fiscal year 2008, \$150,000,000.
- 8 (4) In fiscal year 2009, \$200,000,000.
- 9 (5) In fiscal year 2010, \$250,000,000.
