## A BILL

To establish a permanent grant program to improve public safety communications and the interoperability of emergency communications equipment.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Public Safety Inter-
- 5 operability Implementation Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) Following the tragic events of September
- 9 11, 2001, the need for interoperable communications

- for public safety became even more apparent, and critical to address.
  - (2) The inability of many firefighters and police to communicate with each other in the World Trade Centers led to some loss of lives that perhaps could have been prevented.
    - (3) As demonstrated by a hearing by the Committee on Energy and Commerce of the House of Representatives, Subcommittee on Telecommunications and the Internet, on June 11, 2003, interoperability problems and spectrum and equipment shortages continue to plague our nation's first responders, and without additional funding these problems will continue.
    - (4) Action is critical to address these shortages not only to ensure readiness in the event of another terrorist attack, but also to address daily communications needs that are essential.
    - (5) Each day this Nation's public safety officers put their lives on the line to serve this country and immediate increases in funding are essential.
    - (6) According to the report by the Council on Foreign Relations, the United States is drastically underfunding local emergency responders, and re-

1	mains dangerously unprepared to handle a cata-
2	strophic attack on American soil.
3	SEC. 3. PUBLIC SAFETY TRUST FUND.
4	Part A of the National Telecommunications and In-
5	formation Administration Organization Act (47 U.S.C.
6	901 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following
7	new section:
8	"SEC. 106. PUBLIC SAFETY TRUST FUND.
9	"(a) Establishment.—
10	"(1) Fund established.—There is hereby es-
11	tablished in the Treasury of the United States the
12	Public Safety Communications Trust Fund.
13	"(2) Deposits.—The Fund shall consist of—
14	"(A) the amounts appropriated pursuant
15	to subsection (f); and
16	"(B) 50 percent of the proceeds of any
17	auction conducted pursuant to section 309(j) of
18	the Communications Act of 1934 for any bands
19	of frequencies other than those described in
20	paragraph (3), except that such percentage may
21	be reduced in accordance with paragraph (4).
22	"(3) Excepted frequencies.—The bands of
23	frequencies described in this paragraph are the fol-
24	lowing:

1	"(A) the 216–220 megahertz band, the
2	1432–1435 megahertz band, the 1710–1755
3	megahertz band, and the 2385–2390 megahertz
4	band of frequencies; and
5	"(B) any other band of frequencies reallo-
6	cated from Federal use to non-Federal use after
7	January 1, 2003, that is assigned by competi-
8	tive bidding pursuant to section 309(j) of the
9	Communications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C.
10	309(j)), except for bands of frequencies pre-
11	viously identified by the National Telecommuni-
12	cations and Information Administration in the
13	Spectrum Reallocation Final Report, NTIA
14	Special Publication 95–32 (1995).
15	"(4) REDUCTION OF PERCENTAGE.—If the
16	board of directors submits to the Congress a state-
17	ment that—
18	"(A) projects that the future needs for
19	grants under subsection (c) has been reduced to
20	the extent that the percentage specified in para-
21	graph (2) is likely to yield a surplus in the fund
22	beyond the amounts needed to meet such needs,
23	and

"(B) specifies a lower percentage that the 1 2 board estimates to be sufficient to meet such 3 needs (without yielding a surplus), 4 paragraph (2) shall be applied to any auction subject 5 to such paragraph that is conducted after the date 6 of submission of such statement by substituting such 7 lower percentage for 50 percent. 8 "(5) Fund availability.— "(A) APPROPRIATION.—There are hereby 9 appropriated from the Fund such sums as are 10 11 authorized by the board to be disbursed for 12 grants under this section. 13 "(B) REVERSION OF UNUSED FUNDS.— 14 Any grant proceeds that remain unexpended at 15 the end of the grant period as determined 16 under subsection (c)(3) shall revert to and be 17 deposited in the Fund. 18 "(b) Board of Directors.— "(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Fund shall be ad-19 20

"(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Fund shall be administered by the Administrator of the NTIA, in consultation with a board of directors comprised of 5 members, appointed by the Secretary, with experience in one or more of the following fields: grant and investment management; communications equipment and software applications; and public safety

1	and emergency response. The board shall consult
2	with, or include a member or members from, the De-
3	partment of Homeland Security.
4	"(2) Functions.—The board shall—
5	"(A) establish the reasonable and prudent
6	criteria for the selection of the grant recipients
7	under this section;
8	"(B) determine the amount of the grants
9	awarded; and
10	"(C) review the use of funds made by such
11	grant recipients.
12	"(3) Compensation prohibited; expenses
13	PROVIDED.—The members of the board shall serve
14	without compensation, but may, from appropriated
15	funds available for the administrative expenses of
16	the NTIA, receive travel expenses, including per
17	diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with appli-
18	cable provisions under subchapter I of chapter 57 of
19	title 5, United States Code.
20	"(c) Purpose and Activities of the Trust.—
21	"(1) Grant purposes.—In order to achieve
22	the objectives and carry out the purposes of this
23	part, the Administrator is authorized to make
24	grants, from amounts deposited pursuant to sub-
25	section (a)(2) and from the interest or other income

- on the Fund, to implement interoperability and modernization (including equipment upgrades) for the communications needs of public safety, fire, emergency, law enforcement, and crisis management by State and local government agencies and instrumentalities and nonprofit organizations.
- 7 "(2) Grant preference for broader scope 8 OF Interoperability.—In making grants from the 9 Fund, the Administrator shall give preference to eli-10 gible entities that are proposing inter-agency or re-11 gional and multi-jurisdictional interoperability.
- "(3) Grant available.—Grants from the
  Fund shall be made available on a single or multiyear basis to facilitate long term planning and training.
- 16 "(d) ELIGIBLE ENTITIES.—The following organiza-17 tions and entities are eligible to apply for funds under this 18 section:
- "(1) an agency or instrumentality of a State or local government of the United States (including an agency or instrumentality of a territory or possession of the United States); and
- 23 "(2) a nonprofit agency or organization that is 24 exempt from taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the In-25 ternal Revenue Code of 1986 and that performs a

- 1 public safety function, as determined by the Admin-
- 2 istrator.
- 3 "(e) Permissible Uses of Funds.—Amounts
- 4 made available by grant from the fund may be used by
- 5 eligible entities for equipment, training, planning, and re-
- 6 search for the purposes of upgrading communications and
- 7 the interoperability of communications used in public safe-
- 8 ty, fire, emergency, law enforcement, and crisis manage-
- 9 ment.
- 10 "(f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
- 11 are authorized to be appropriated to the Fund
- 12 \$500,000,000 for fiscal year 2004 and each of the 2 suc-
- 13 ceeding fiscal years.
- 14 "(g) Reports.—
- 15 "(1) By Grant recipients.—Each grant re-
- cipient shall submit to the Administrator and the
- board a report on the use of the funds provided by
- the grant, and on the progress made with respect to
- the improvement of the grant recipient's communica-
- tions capabilities.
- 21 "(2) By administrator.—The Administrator
- shall annually submit to the Congress a report on
- 23 the operations of the Fund and the grants made by
- the Funds. Such report shall include—

1	"(A) an identification of the grants made,
2	the recipients thereof, and the planned uses of
3	the amounts made available;
4	"(B) a financial report on the operations
5	and condition of the Fund; and
6	"(C) a description of the results of the use
7	of funds provided by grants under this section,
8	including the status of interoperability imple-
9	mentation by the grant recipients.
10	"(h) REGULATIONS.—The Administrator may pre-
11	scribe such regulations as may be necessary and appro-
12	priate to carry out this section.
13	"(i) Definitions.—As used in this section—
14	"(1) the term 'the Fund' means the Public
15	Safety Communications Trust Fund established pur-
16	suant to subsection (a); and
17	"(2) the term 'the board' means the board of
18	directors established pursuant to subsection (b) "
