A BILL

To direct the Secretary of the Interior to establish the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge in Northeastern Pennsylvania, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Cherry Valley National
- 5 Wildlife Refuge Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 The Congress finds the following:

- 1 (1) The scenic Cherry Valley area of North-2 eastern Pennsylvania is blessed with more than 80 3 special-concern animal and plant species and natural 4 habitats.
 - (2) In a preliminary assessment of Cherry Valley, United States Fish and Wildlife Service biologists ranked Cherry Valley very high as a potential national wildlife refuge.
 - (3) Six species that are listed as endangered species or threatened species under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) have been documented within or near Cherry Valley: The bog turtle (possibly the most significant population of the listed subspecies), the dwarf wedge mussel, the northeastern bulrush, the small whorled pogonia, the bald eagle, and the Indiana bat (a historic resident, with efforts under way to re-establish favorable conditions).
 - (4) Cherry Valley provides habitat for at least 79 species of national or regional concern, which either nest in Cherry Valley or migrate through the area during critical times in their life cycle, including—
- 24 (A) neo-tropical migratory birds such as 25 the Cerulean Warbler, the Worm-eating War-

1	bler, and the Wood Thrush, all of which nest in
2	Cherry Valley;
3	(B) waterfowl such as the American Black
4	Duck;
5	(C) several globally rare plants, such as
6	the spreading globeflower; and
7	(D) anadromous fish species.
8	(5) The Cherry Valley watershed encompasses a
9	large segment of the Kittatinny Ridge, an important
10	migration route for birds of prey throughout the
11	Northeastern United States. Every migratory raptor
12	species in the Northeast is regularly observed along
13	the Kittatinny Ridge during the autumnal migra-
14	tion, including the bald eagle, the golden eagle, and
15	the broad-winged hawk.
16	(6) The Kittatinny Ridge also includes a long
17	segment of the Appalachian Trail, a nationally sig-
18	nificant natural-cultural-recreational feature.
19	(7) Many of the significant wildlife habitats
20	found in the Cherry Valley, especially the rare cal-
21	careous wetlands, have disappeared from other local-
22	ities in their range.
23	(8) Ongoing studies have documented the high
24	water quality of Cherry Creek.

1	(9) Public meetings over several years have
2	demonstrated strong, deep, and growing local sup-
3	port for a Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge:
4	(A) Area landowners, business and commu-
5	nity leaders, media, and elected officials have
6	consistently voiced their enthusiasm for a Cher-
7	ry Valley National Wildlife Refuge.
8	(B) Numerous local communities and pub-
9	lic and private conservation entities share com-
10	plementary goals for protecting Cherry Valley
11	and are energetically conserving wildlife habitat
12	and farmland. Along with State land-manage-
13	ment agencies and the National Park Service,
14	these local entities represent potential strong
15	partners for the United States Fish and Wild-
16	life Service.
17	(C) A number of local landowners have al-
18	ready put their land into conservation ease-
19	ments or other conservation arrangements.
20	(D) A voter-approved Monroe County Open
21	Space Fund and a voter-approved Stroud
22	Township municipal land conservation fund
23	have contributed to many of these projects.
24	(10) Two federally owned parcels of land are

contiguous to the area to be established by this Act

- as the Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge: The
- 2 Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area and
- a 700-acre segment of the Appalachian Trail owned
- 4 by the National Park Service.

5 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT AND PURPOSE OF REFUGE.

- 6 (a) Establishment.—The Secretary shall establish
- 7 as a national wildlife refuge the lands, waters, and inter-
- 8 ests therein acquired under section 5, at such time as the
- 9 Secretary determines that sufficient property has been ac-
- 10 quired by the United States to constitute an area that can
- 11 be effectively managed as a national wildlife refuge for the
- 12 purposes set forth in subsection (b) of this section. The
- 13 national wildlife refuge so established shall be known as
- 14 the "Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge".
- 15 (b) Purposes.—The primary purposes of the Refuge
- 16 are the following:
- 17 (1) To preserve and enhance the Refuge's lands
- and waters in a manner that will conserve the nat-
- ural diversity of fish, wildlife, plants, and their habi-
- tats for present and future generations, through vol-
- 21 untary conservation agreements, partnerships with
- local communities, and transactions with willing
- 23 landowners.
- 24 (2) To conserve and enhance populations of
- 25 fish, wildlife, and plants within the Refuge, including

- populations of bog turtle, waterfowl, raptors, pas serines, and neo-tropical migratory birds.
- 3 (3) To protect and enhance the quality of 4 aquatic and wetland habitats within the Refuge.
- 5 (4) To fulfill international obligations of the 6 United States with respect to fish, wildlife, and their 7 habitats.
- 8 (5) To provide opportunities for compatible sci-9 entific research, environmental education, and fish 10 and wildlife-oriented recreation in collaboration with 11 private and public entities.
- 12 (c) Notice of Establishment.—The Secretary
- 13 shall publish a notice of the establishment of the Refuge—
- 14 (1) in the Federal Register; and
- 15 (2) in publications of local circulation in the vi-16 cinity of the Refuge.

17 SEC. 4. ADMINISTRATION OF REFUGE.

- 18 (a) In General.—The Secretary shall administer all
- 19 lands, waters, and interests therein acquired under section
- 20 5 in accordance with—
- 21 (1) the National Wildlife Refuge System Ad-
- 22 ministration Act of 1966 (16 U.S.C. 668dd et seq.)
- 23 and the Act of September 28, 1962 (76 Stat. 653;
- 24 16 U.S.C. 460k et seq.; popularly known as the Ref-
- 25 uge Recreation Act);

1	(2) the purposes of the Refuge set forth in sec-
2	tion 3(b); and
3	(3) the management plan issued under sub-
4	section (c).
5	(b) STUDY OF SELECTION AREA.—
6	(1) REQUIREMENT.—The Secretary, acting
7	through the Director of the United States Fish and
8	Wildlife Service, shall conduct a study of fish and
9	wildlife habitat and aquatic and terrestrial commu-
10	nities of the selection area described in section
11	5(e)(2).
12	(2) Report.—Not later than 18 months after
13	the date of the enactment of the Act, the Secretary
14	shall complete such study and submit a report con-
15	taining the results thereof to the Congress.
16	(3) Authorization of appropriations.—
17	There is authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-
18	retary \$200,000 to carry out the study.
19	(c) Management Plan.—
20	(1) In general.—Not later than 30 months
21	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-
22	retary shall issue a management plan for the Ref-
23	uge.
24	(2) Contents.—The management plan shall
25	include provisions that provide for the following:

1	(A) Planning and design of trails and ac-
2	cess points.
3	(B) Planning of wildlife and habitat res-
4	toration, including reforestation.
5	(C) Permanent exhibits and facilities and
6	regular educational programs throughout the
7	Refuge.
8	(3) Public Participation.—
9	(A) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall
10	provide an opportunity for public participation
11	in developing the management plan.
12	(B) Local views.—The Secretary shall
13	give special consideration to views by local pub-
14	lic and private entities and individuals in devel-
15	oping the management plan.
16	SEC. 5. ACQUISITION OF LANDS, WATERS, AND INTERESTS
17	THEREIN.
18	(a) In General.—The Secretary shall seek to ac-
19	quire up to 30,000 acres of land, water, or interests there-
20	in (including permanent conservation easements or ser-
21	vitudes) within the boundaries designated under sub-
22	section (c). All lands, waters, and interests acquired under
23	this subsection shall be part of the Refuge.
24	(b) Method of Acquisition.—The Secretary may
25	acquire an interest in land or water for inclusion in the

1	Refuge only by donation, exchange, or purchase from a
2	willing seller.
3	(c) Designation of Boundaries.—
4	(1) In general.—Not later than 12 months
5	after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-
6	retary shall—
7	(A) consult with appropriate State and
8	local officials, private conservation organiza-
9	tions, and other interested parties, regarding
10	the designation of appropriate boundaries for
11	the Refuge within the selection area;
12	(B) designate boundaries of the Refuge
13	that are within the selection area and adequate
14	for fulfilling the purposes of the Refuge set
15	forth in section 3(b); and
16	(C) prepare a detailed map, entitled
17	"Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge", de-
18	picting the boundaries of the Refuge designated
19	under subparagraph (B).
20	(2) Selection area.—For purposes of this
21	subsection, the selection area consists of approxi-
22	mately 30,000 acres located in Monroe County,
23	Pennsylvania, that—
24	(A) encompasses the watershed of Cherry
25	Creek, portions of the McMichaels and

1	Aquashicola Creeks watersheds, and an area
2	that drains directly into the Delaware River
3	and
4	(B) is contiguous to the Delaware Water
5	Gap National Recreation Area.
6	(3) AVAILABILITY OF MAP; NOTICE.—The Sec-
7	retary shall—
8	(A) keep the map prepared under para-
9	graph (1) on file and available for public in-
10	spection at offices of the United States Fish
11	and Wildlife Service in the District of Columbia
12	and Pennsylvania; and
13	(B) publish in the Federal Register a no-
14	tice of that availability.
15	(d) Boundary Revisions.—The Secretary may
16	make such minor revisions in the boundaries designated
17	under subsection (c) as may be appropriate to achieve the
18	purposes of the Refuge under section 3(b) or to facilitate
19	the acquisition of property for the Refuge.
20	SEC. 6. DEFINITIONS.
21	For purposes of this Act:
22	(1) Refuge.—The term "Refuge" means the
23	Cherry Valley National Wildlife Refuge established
24	under section 3.

- 1 (2) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
- 2 the Secretary of the Interior.
