- (1) United States Customs and Border Protection within the Department of Homeland Security is authorized to hire and train 2,000 new Border Patrol agents for each of the next five years in order to strengthen security along United States borders.
 - (2) Congress has requested United States Customs and Border Protection to provide information regarding the funding and resource needs of the Department to meet this goal. To date, Congress has not received a satisfactory explanation of the costs to train new Border Patrol agents.
- 14 (3) It is critical to United States security that
 15 the Border Patrol has a sufficient number of trained
 16 agents on active duty to secure United States borders.
- 18 (4) It is also critical to the national economy 19 that Border Patrol training and other Federal train-20 ing programs be as cost-effective as possible.

21 SEC. 3. GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE REVIEW.

3	(b) CONTENTS OF REVIEW.—The review shall include
4	the following:
5	(1) An evaluation of the appropriateness of the
6	length and content of the basic training curriculum

9	(2) An evaluation of the appropriateness and a
10	detailed breakdown of the costs incurred by United
11	States Customs and Border Protection and the Fed-
12	eral Law Enforcement Training Center to train one
13	new Border Patrol agent.
14	(3) A cost and effectiveness of training com-
15	parison with other similar law enforcement training
16	programs provided by State and local agencies, non-
17	profit organizations, universities, and the private
18	sector.
19	(4) Recommendations to increase the number of
20	Border Patrol agents trained per year, and to reduce
21	the per-agent costs of basic training—
22	(A) through utilization of comparable
23	training programs sponsored by State and local
24	agencies, non-profit organizations, universities,

and the private sector;

8	(c) Report.—Not later than 90 days after the com-
9	pletion of the review required under subsection (a), the
10	Comptroller General shall submit to Congress a report
11	containing the findings and recommendations of the re-
