# A BILL

- To authorize the Secretary of Education to make grants to educational organizations to carry out educational programs about the Holocaust.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Simon Wiesenthal Hol-

5 ocaust Education Assistance Act".

#### 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.

7 (a) FINDINGS.—The Congress makes the following8 findings:

1 (1) The Holocaust was an historical event that 2 resulted in the systemic, state-sponsored mass mur-3 ders by Nazi Germany of 6,000,000 Jews, along 4 with millions of others, in the name of racial purity. 5 (2) Six States (California, Florida, Illinois, 6 Massachusetts, New Jersey, and New York) now 7 mandate that the Holocaust be taught in the edu-8 cational curriculum, 11 States (Connecticut, Geor-9 gia, Indiana, Nevada, North Carolina, Ohio, Penn-10 sylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and 11 Washington) recommend teaching the Holocaust but 12 do not provide sufficient funds to assist in the train-13 ing and educating of teachers, and 3 States (Ala-14 bama, Mississippi, and West Virginia) have established councils or commissions that promote Holo-15 16 caust education.

17 (3) The Holocaust is a sensitive and difficult
18 issue about which to teach, and to do so effectively,
19 educators need appropriate teaching tools and train20 ing to increase their knowledge to enhance the edu21 cational experience.

(b) PURPOSES.—The purposes of this Act are the fol-lowing:

24 (1) To educate Americans so that they can—

1	(A) explore the lessons that the Holocaust
2	provides for all people; and
3	(B) be less susceptible to the falsehood of
4	Holocaust denial and to the destructive mes-
5	sages of hate that arise from Holocaust denial.
6	(2) To provide resources and support for edu-
7	cation programs that—
8	(A) portray accurate historical information
9	about the Holocaust;
10	(B) sensitize communities to the cir-
11	cumstances that gave rise to the Holocaust;
12	(C) convey the lessons that the Holocaust
13	provides for all people; and
14	(D) by developing curriculum guides and
15	providing training, help teachers incorporate
16	into their mainstream disciplines the study of
17	the Holocaust and its lessons.
18	SEC. 3. AUTHORITY TO MAKE GRANTS.
19	From any amounts made available to carry out this
20	Act, the Secretary may make grants under this Act to edu-
21	cational organizations to carry out proposed or existing
22	Holocaust education programs.
23	SEC. 4. USE OF GRANT AMOUNTS.
24	(a) IN GENERAL.—An educational organization re-
25	ceiving grant amounts under this Act shall use such grant

amounts only to carry out the Holocaust education pro gram for which the grant amounts were provided.

3 (b) REQUIREMENTS.—An educational organization
4 receiving grant amounts under this Act shall comply with
5 the following requirements:

6 (1) CONTINUATION OF ELIGIBILITY.—The edu-7 cational organization shall, throughout the period 8 that the educational organization receives and uses 9 such grant amounts, continue to be an educational 10 organization.

11 (2) SUPPLEMENTATION OF EXISTING FUNDS.— 12 The educational organization shall ensure that such 13 grant amounts are used to supplement, and not sup-14 plant, non-Federal funds that would otherwise be 15 available to the educational organization to carry out 16 the Holocaust education program for which the 17 grant amounts were provided.

(c) ADDITIONAL CONDITIONS.—The Secretary may
require additional terms and conditions in connection with
the use of grant amounts provided under this Act as the
Secretary considers appropriate.

### 22 SEC. 5. SELECTION CRITERIA.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall award grant
amounts under this Act in accordance with competitive
criteria to be established by the Secretary.

(b) CONSULTATION WITH HOLOCAUST EDU CATORS.—In establishing the competitive criteria under
 subsection (a), the Secretary shall consult with a variety
 of individuals, to be determined by the Secretary, who are
 prominent educators in the field of Holocaust education.

#### 6 SEC. 6. APPLICATION.

7 The Secretary may award grant amounts under this 8 Act only to an educational organization that has submitted 9 an application to the Secretary at such time, in such man-10 ner, and containing such information as the Secretary may 11 require.

#### 12 SEC. 7. REVIEW AND SANCTIONS.

(a) ANNUAL REVIEW.—The Secretary shall review at
least annually each educational organization receiving
grant amounts under this Act to determine the extent to
which the educational organization has complied with the
provisions of this Act.

(b) IMPOSITION OF SANCTIONS.—The Secretary may
impose sanctions on an educational organization for any
failure of the educational organization to comply substantially with the provisions of this Act. The Secretary shall
establish the sanctions to be imposed for a failure to comply substantially with the provisions of this Act.

#### 1 SEC. 8. ANNUAL REPORT.

Not later than February 1 of each year, the Secretary
shall submit to the Senate and House of Representatives
a report describing the activities carried out under this
Act and containing any related information that the Secretary considers appropriate.

## 7 SEC. 9. DEFINITIONS.

8 For purposes of this Act, the following definitions9 shall apply:

10	(1) EDUCATIONAL ORGANIZATION.—The term
11	"educational organization" means an entity—
12	(A) described in section $501(c)(3)$ of the
13	Internal Revenue Code of 1986;
14	(B) exempt from tax under section $501(a)$
15	of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986; and
16	(C) organized and operated for cultural,
17	literary, or educational purposes.
18	(2) HOLOCAUST EDUCATION PROGRAM.—The
19	term "Holocaust education program" means a pro-
20	gram that—
21	(A) has as its specific and primary purpose
22	to improve awareness and understanding of the
23	Holocaust; and
24	(B) to achieve such purpose, furnishes one
25	or more of the following:
26	(i) Classes, seminars, or conferences.

1	(ii) Educational materials.
2	(iii) Teacher training.
3	(iv) Any other good or service de-
4	signed to improve awareness and under-
5	standing of the Holocaust.
6	(3) HOLOCAUST.—The term "Holocaust"
7	means the historical event that resulted in the sys-
8	temic, state-sponsored mass murders by Nazi Ger-
9	many of 6,000,000 Jews, along with millions of oth-
10	ers, in the name of racial purity.
11	(4) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
12	the Secretary of Education.
13	SEC. 10. REGULATIONS.
14	The Secretary shall issue any regulations necessary
15	to carry out this Act.
16	SEC. 11. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.
17	For grants under this Act, there is authorized to be
18	appropriated to the Secretary \$2,000,000 each fiscal year
19	for five fiscal years, beginning with the first fiscal year
20	to commence after the date of enactment of this Act, to
21	remain available until expended.
