A BILL

To amend section 5318 to prohibit the use of identification issued by foreign governments, other than passports, for purposes of verifying the identity of a person who opens an account at a financial institution, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the “Financial Customer
5 Identification Verification Improvement Act”.

1 **SEC. 2. FOREIGN-ISSUED FORMS OF IDENTIFICATION PRO-**
2 **HIBITED AS PROOF OF IDENTITY TO OPEN**
3 **ACCOUNTS AT FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS.**

4 Section 5318(l) of title 31, United States Code (relat-
5 ing to identification and verification of accountholders) is
6 amended—

7 (1) by redesignating paragraph (6) as para-
8 graph (7); and

9 (2) by inserting after paragraph (5) the fol-
10 lowing new paragraph:

11 “(6) PROHIBITION ON USE OF IDENTIFICATION
12 ISSUED BY A FOREIGN GOVERNMENT.—A financial
13 institution may not accept any form of identification
14 that was issued by a foreign government, other than
15 a passport, for use in verifying the identity of a per-
16 son in connection with the opening of an account by
17 such person at the financial institution, including a
18 matricula consular issued in the United States by a
19 duly authorized consular officer of the Government
20 of Mexico.”.
