# H. R. 892

To provide for the award of a gold medal on behalf of Congress to Arnold Palmer in recognition of his service to the Nation in promoting excellence and good sportsmanship in golf.

Mr. BACA (for himself, Mr. BURTON of Indiana, Mr. PETERSON of Pennsylvania, Mr. MURTHA, Mr. MCCRERY, Mr. SHAW, Mr. GRIJALVA, Mr. MCGOVERN, Mr. FALEOMAVAEGA, Mr. WALSH, Ms. HART, and Mr. BLUNT) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Financial Services

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## A BILL

To provide for the award of a gold medal on behalf of Congress to Arnold Palmer in recognition of his service to the Nation in promoting excellence and good sportsmanship in golf.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. FINDINGS.**

4       The Congress finds the following:

5               (1) Arnold Palmer is a world famous golf pro-  
6       fessional, a highly-successful business executive, a  
7       prominent advertising spokesman, a devoted hus-

1 band, father, and grandfather, and a man with a  
2 common touch that has made him one of the most  
3 popular and accessible public figures in history.

4 (2) Arnold Palmer amassed 92 championships  
5 in professional competition of national or inter-  
6 national stature by the end of 1993, 61 of which  
7 came on the Professional Golf Association Tour.

8 (3) Arnold Palmer's magnetic personality and  
9 unfailing sense of kindness and thoughtfulness have  
10 endeared him to millions throughout the world.

11 (4) Arnold Palmer has been the recipient of  
12 countless honors including virtually every national  
13 award in golf and both the Hickok Athlete of the  
14 Year and Sports Illustrated's Sportsman of the Year  
15 awards, and he was chosen Athlete of the Decade for  
16 the 1960s in a national Associated Press poll.

17 (5) Arnold Palmer has received numerous hon-  
18 ors outside the world of sports, including the Patriot  
19 Award of the Congressional Medal of Honor Society  
20 and the Golden Plate award of the American Acad-  
21 emy of Achievement.

22 (6) Arnold Palmer served his country for 3  
23 years in the United States Coast Guard and was  
24 among those chosen to address the Joint Session of

1 Congress on the occasion of the 100th anniversary  
2 of the birth of President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

3 (7) Arnold Palmer served as Honorary National  
4 Chairman of the March of Dimes Birth Defects  
5 Foundation for 20 years and played a major role in  
6 the fund-raising drive that led to the creation of the  
7 Arnold Palmer Hospital for Children and Women in  
8 Orlando and the Latrobe Area Hospital Charitable  
9 Foundation in his Western Pennsylvania hometown.

10 (8) Arnold Palmer remains active in tour-  
11 nament golf, although he retired from competition in  
12 the major championships on April 14, 2002, when  
13 he played the last of his 48 Masters Tournaments,  
14 where he was given an emotional standing ovation as  
15 he finished the 18th hole.

16 **SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.**

17 (a) PRESENTATION AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker of  
18 the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tem-  
19 pore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements  
20 for the presentation, on behalf of the Congress, of a gold  
21 medal of appropriate design to Arnold Palmer in recogni-  
22 tion of his service to the Nation in promoting excellence  
23 and good sportsmanship.

24 (b) DESIGN AND STRIKING.—For the purpose of the  
25 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary

1 of the Treasury shall strike a gold medal with suitable em-  
2 blems, devices, and inscriptions to be determined by the  
3 Secretary.

4 **SEC. 3. DUPLICATE MEDALS.**

5 Under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treas-  
6 ury may prescribe, the Secretary may strike duplicate  
7 medals in bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant to  
8 section 2 and sell such duplicate medals at a price suffi-  
9 cient to cover the costs of the duplicate medals (including  
10 labor, materials, dies, use of machinery, overhead ex-  
11 penses) and the cost of the gold medal.

12 **SEC. 4. NATIONAL MEDALS.**

13 The medals struck under this Act are national medals  
14 for purposes of chapter 51 of title 31, United States Code.

15 **SEC. 5. FUNDING.**

16 (a) **AUTHORIZATION OF CHARGES.**—There is author-  
17 ized to be charged against the United States Mint Public  
18 Enterprise Fund an amount not to exceed \$30,000 to pay  
19 for the cost of the medals authorized by this Act.

20 (b) **PROCEEDS OF SALE.**—Amounts received from the  
21 sale of duplicate bronze medals under section 3 shall be  
22 deposited in the United States Mint Public Enterprise  
23 Fund.

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
