A BILL

To provide for programs to increase the awareness and knowledge of women and health care providers with respect to gynecologic cancers.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Gynecologic Cancer
- 5 Education and Awareness Act of 2005" or "Johanna's
- 6 Law".
- 7 SEC. 2. CERTAIN PROGRAMS REGARDING GYNECOLOGIC
- 8 CANCERS.
- 9 (a) National Public Awareness Campaign.—

- 1 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Health and
 2 Human Services (referred to in this section as the
 3 "Secretary") shall carry out a national campaign to
 4 increase the awareness and knowledge of women
 5 with respect to gynecologic cancers.
 - (2) Written materials.—Activities under the national campaign under paragraph (1) shall include—
 - (A) maintaining a supply of written materials that provide information to the public on gynecologic cancers; and
 - (B) distributing the materials to members of the public upon request.
 - (3) Public service announcements.—Activities under the national campaign under paragraph (1) shall, in accordance with applicable law and regulations, include developing and placing, in telecommunications media, public service announcements intended to encourage women to discuss with their physicians their risks of gynecologic cancers. Such announcement shall inform the public on the manner in which the written materials referred to in paragraph (2) can be obtained upon request, and shall call attention to early warning signs and risk

1	factors based on the best available medical informa-
2	tion.
3	(b) Demonstration Projects Regarding Out-
4	REACH AND EDUCATION STRATEGIES.—
5	(1) In general.—The Secretary shall carry
6	out a program to make grants to nonprofit private
7	entities for the purpose of testing different outreach
8	and education strategies to increase the awareness
9	and knowledge of women and health care providers
10	with respect to gynecologic cancers, including early
11	warning signs and treatment options. Such strate-
12	gies shall include strategies directed at physicians,
13	nurses, and key health professionals and families.
14	(2) Preferences in making grants.—In
15	making grants under paragraph (1), the Secretary
16	shall give preference—
17	(A) to applicants with demonstrated exper-
18	tise in gynecologic cancer education or treat-
19	ment or in working with groups of women who
20	are at especially high risk of gynecologic can-
21	cers; and
22	(B) to applicants that, in the demonstra-
23	tion project under the grant, will establish link-
24	ages between physicians, nurses, and key health

1	professionals, hospitals, payers, and State
2	health departments.
3	(3) APPLICATION FOR GRANT.—A grant may be
4	made under paragraph (1) only if an application for
5	the grant is submitted to the Secretary and the ap-
6	plication is in such form, is made in such manner,
7	and contains such agreements, assurances, and in-
8	formation as the Secretary determines to be nec-
9	essary to carry out this subsection.
10	(4) Certain requirements.—In making
11	grants under paragraph (1)—
12	(A) the Secretary shall make grants to not
13	fewer than five applicants, subject to the extent
14	of amounts made available in appropriations
15	Acts; and
16	(B) the Secretary shall ensure that infor-
17	mation provided through demonstration projects
18	under such grants is consistent with the best
19	available medical information.
20	(5) Report to congress.—Not later than
21	February 1, 2009, the Secretary shall submit to the
22	Congress a report that—
23	(A) summarizes the activities of dem-
24	onstration projects under paragraph (1);

1	(B) evaluates the extent to which the
2	projects were effective in increasing early detec-
3	tion of gynecologic cancers and awareness of
4	risk factors and early warning signs in the pop-
5	ulations to which the projects were directed;
6	and
7	(C) identifies barriers to early detection
8	and appropriate treatment of such cancers.
9	(c) Funding.—
10	(1) National public awareness cam-
11	PAIGN.—For the purpose of carrying out subsection
12	(a), there is authorized to be appropriated in the ag-
13	gregate \$15,000,000 for the fiscal years 2006
14	through 2008.
15	(2) Demonstration projects regarding
16	OUTREACH AND EDUCATION STRATEGIES.—
17	(A) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIA-
18	TIONS.—For the purpose of carrying out sub-
19	section (b), there is authorized to be appro-
20	priated in the aggregate \$30,000,000 for the
21	fiscal years 2006 through 2008.
22	(B) Administration, technical assist-
23	ANCE, AND EVALUATION.—Of the amounts ap-
24	propriated under subparagraph (A), not more
25	than 9 percent may be expended for the pur-

pose of administering subsection (b), providing technical assistance to grantees under such subsection, and preparing the report under paragraph (5) of such subsection.

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
