A BILL

To require the Secretary of the Treasury to redesign \$1 Federal reserve notes so as to incorporate the preamble to the Constitution of the United States, a list describing the Articles of the Constitution, and a list describing the Amendments to the Constitution, on the reverse side of such notes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- This Act may be cited as the "Liberty Bill Act".

1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

2	The Congress finds that—
3	(1) many Americans are unaware of the provi-
4	sions of the Constitution of the United States, one
5	of the most remarkable and important documents in
6	world history;
7	(2) an abbreviated version of the Constitution,
8	consisting of the preamble, a list of the Articles, and
9	a list of the Amendments, could easily be placed on
10	the reverse side of \$1 Federal reserve notes;
11	(3) the placement of an abbreviated version of
12	the Constitution on \$1 Federal reserve notes would
13	remind the American people of the historical impor-
14	tance of the Constitution and its impact on their
15	lives today;
16	(4) the preamble would remind Americans of
17	the blessings of liberty;
18	(5) the Articles would remind Americans of the
19	framework of the United States Government;
20	(6) the Amendments would remind Americans
21	of the historical changes to this living document that
22	forms the very core of the American experience; and
23	(7) people throughout the world would also
24	learn about the framework of a republican govern-



1 "(3) AUTHORITY OF SECRETARY.—The require-2 ments of this subsection shall not be construed as— 3 "(A) prohibiting the inclusion of any other inscriptions or material on the reverse side of 4 5 Federal reserve notes which the Secretary may 6 determine to be necessary or appropriate; or 7 "(B) limiting any other authority of the 8 Secretary with regard to the design of Federal 9 reserve notes, including the adoption of any de-10 sign features to deter the counterfeiting of 11 United States currency.". 12 (b) DATE OF APPLICATION.—The amendment made by subsection (a) shall apply to the lowest denomination of Federal reserve notes which are first placed into circula-14 15 tion during the 2-year period beginning 3 years after the
