A BILL

To establish the Great Lakes Interagency Task Force, to establish the Great Lakes Regional Collaboration, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Great Lakes Coordina-
- 5 tion and Oversight Act of 2006".

2 1 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS. 2 In this title: 3 (1) Collaboration.—The term "Collabora-4 tion" means the Great Lakes Regional Collaboration 5 established by section 4(a). 6 (2) Executive committee.—The term "Executive Committee" means the Great Lakes Regional 7 8 Collaboration Executive Committee established by 9 section 4(b). 10 (3) EXECUTIVE ORDER.—The term "Executive 11 Order" means Executive Order 13340 (33 U.S.C. 12 1268 note; relating to establishment of Great Lakes 13 Interagency Task Force and promotion of regional collaboration of national significance for Great 14 15 Lakes). 16 (4) Great Lake.—The term "Great Lake" 17 means— 18 (A) Lake Erie; 19 (B) Lake Huron (including Lake Saint 20 Clair); 21 (C) Lake Michigan; 22 (D) Lake Ontario; 23 (E) Lake Superior; and 24 (F) the connecting channels of those

Lakes, including—

(i) the Saint Marys River;

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1	(ii) the Saint Clair River;
2	(iii) the Detroit River;
3	(iv) the Niagara River; and
4	(v) the Saint Lawrence River to the
5	Canadian border.
6	(5) Great lakes tribe.—The term "Great
7	Lakes Tribe" means any Indian tribe, band, village,
8	nation, or other organized group or community in
9	the watershed basin of a Great Lake that is recog-
10	nized by the Bureau of Indian Affairs as eligible for
11	the special programs and services provided by the
12	United States to Indians because of their status as
13	Indians.
14	(6) Task force.—The term "Task Force"
15	means the Great Lakes Interagency Task Force es-
16	tablished by section 3.
17	SEC. 3. GREAT LAKES INTERAGENCY TASK FORCE.
18	(a) Interagency Coordination.—The Great
19	Lakes Interagency Task Force, as established by the Ex-
20	ecutive Order 13340 for administrative purposes, is estab-
21	lished as a task force within the Environmental Protection
22	Agency.
23	(b) Duties.—In addition to the duties described in
24	the Executive Order, the Task Force shall—

1	(1) ensure that implementation of programs
2	and projects under the authority of Task Force
3	members is coordinated, effective, and cost-efficient;
4	(2) submit to Congress a biennial report that
5	describes the projects and activities carried out by
6	the Collaboration during the 2-year period covered
7	by the report, including a description of—
8	(A) any actions that Federal agencies can
9	take to address the biennial restoration goals;
10	(B) Federal expenditures to meet the res-
11	toration goals and the amount of non-Federal
12	funding leveraged by those Federal expendi-
13	tures; and
14	(C) the indicators and monitoring used to
15	determine whether the goals will be met;
16	(3) establish a regular means of communication
17	with the Executive Committee to exchange informa-
18	tion and recommendations for action; and
19	(4) ensure that the activities of the Task Force
20	are coordinated with the activities of the Lake
21	Champlain Basin Program.
22	SEC. 4. GREAT LAKES REGIONAL COLLABORATION.
23	(a) Establishment.—There is established a Great
24	Lakes Regional Collaboration.
25	(1) Membership.—

1	(A) Composition.—The Collaboration
2	shall be composed of—
3	(i) the members of the Executive
4	Committee; and
5	(ii) each other individual or entity
6	that notifies the Executive Committee, in
7	writing, of the desire and intent of the in-
8	dividual or entity to participate in the Col-
9	laboration.
10	(B) BALANCED REPRESENTATION OF
11	STAKEHOLDER GROUPS.—The Collaboration
12	shall have a balanced representation of inter-
13	ested stakeholder groups, including—
14	(i) members of academia;
15	(ii) municipalities;
16	(iii) nongovernmental organizations;
17	(iv) property owners;
18	(v) recreational boaters;
19	(vi) recreational fisheries;
20	(vii) representatives of environmental
21	interests; and
22	(viii) representatives of industry.
23	(2) Duties of the collaboration.—Not
24	later than 3 years after the date of enactment of
25	this Act, and every 3 years thereafter, the Collabora-

1	tion shall draft a strategy using the best available
2	science—
3	(A) to describe the health of the Great
4	Lakes; and
5	(B) to identify Great Lakes restoration
6	goals.
7	(b) The Executive Committee.—
8	(1) Composition.—The Executive Committee
9	shall be composed of—
10	(A) the Chairperson of the Task Force;
11	(B) a representative of the Council of
12	Great Lakes Governors, as agreed upon by the
13	Governors;
14	(C) a representative of the Great Lakes
15	and Saint Lawrence Cities Initiative, as agreed
16	upon by the majority of mayors of those cities;
17	and
18	(D) a designated representative of the
19	Great Lakes Tribes, as agreed upon by those
20	Tribes.
21	(c) Duties.—The Executive Committee shall—
22	(1) establish a process for communicating with
23	the members of the Collaboration:

1	(2) work with the members of the Collaboration
2	to develop a strategy for the restoration of the Great
3	Lakes as required in subsection (a)(2);
4	(3) after completing the strategy, develop a list
5	of short-term and long-term goals and identify the
6	level of government that is best able to achieve each
7	goal;
8	(4) hold semiannual public meetings to dis-
9	cuss—
10	(A) Great Lakes restoration goals; and
11	(B) the progress in carrying out those
12	goals;
13	(5) receive input and consider recommendations
14	relating to the proposed goals described in para-
15	graph (3) from interested stakeholder groups de-
16	scribed in subsection (a)(1)(B);
17	(6) submit to the Congress and the Task Force
18	a biennial report that includes—
19	(A) an analysis of progress in—
20	(i) carrying out the restoration of the
21	Great Lakes; and
22	(ii) meeting the goals and the rec-
23	ommendations of the strategy developed by
24	the Great Lakes Regional Collaboration
25	and under this Act; and

1	(B) contributions made by—
2	(i) Great Lakes States;
3	(ii) municipal partners; and
4	(iii) Great Lakes Tribes; and
5	(7) ensure that—
6	(A) the Collaboration has a balanced rep-
7	resentation of interested stakeholder groups de-
8	scribed in subsection (a)(1)(B); and
9	(B) the strategy developed by the Collabo-
10	ration is coordinated with the activities of the
11	Lake Champlain Basin Program.
12	(d) Subcommittees.—The members of the Execu-
13	tive Committee may designate representatives to work as
14	1 or more subcommittees to provide staff support and oth-
15	erwise assist in carrying out responsibilities of the Execu-
16	tive Committee relating to the Collaboration.
17	SEC. 5. EFFICIENCY EVALUATIONS OF COMMITTEES AND
18	OFFICES.
19	The Administrator of the Environmental Protection
20	Agency shall evaluate each committee and office that over-
21	sees a Great Lakes program—The Administrator of the
22	Environmental Protection Agency shall evaluate each com-
23	mittee of which the Administrator is a member and each
24	office within the jurisdiction of the Environmental Protec-
25	tion Agency that oversees a Great Lakes program—

1	(1) to identify overlapping duties; and
2	(2) to develop recommendations to improve the
3	efficiency of those committees and offices.

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
