## A BILL

To allow travel between the United States and Cuba.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Freedom to Travel
- 5 to Cuba Act of 2005".
- 6 SEC. 2. TRAVEL TO CUBA.
- 7 (a) Freedom of Travel for United States Citi-
- 8 ZENS AND LEGAL RESIDENTS.—Subject to section 3, the
- 9 President shall not regulate or prohibit, directly or indi-
- 10 rectly, travel to or from Cuba by United States citizens

- 1 or legal residents, or any of the transactions incident to 2 such travel that are set forth in subsection (b).
- 3 (b) Transactions Incident to Travel.—The
- 4 transactions referred to in subsection (a) are—
- 5 (1) any transactions ordinarily incident to trav-6 el to or from Cuba, including the importation into 7 Cuba or the United States of accompanied baggage
- 8 for personal use only;

- (2) any transactions ordinarily incident to travel or maintenance within Cuba, including the payment of living expenses and the acquisition of goods or services for personal use;
- (3) any transactions ordinarily incident to the arrangement, promotion, or facilitation of travel to, from, or within Cuba;
  - (4) any transactions incident to nonscheduled air, sea, or land voyages, except that this paragraph does not authorize the carriage of articles into Cuba or the United States except accompanied baggage; and
- (5) normal banking transactions incident to the activities described in the preceding provisions of this subsection, including the issuance, clearing, processing, or payment of checks, drafts, traveler's

- 1 checks, credit or debit card instruments, or similar
- 2 instruments.

#### 3 SEC. 3. EXCEPTIONS.

- 4 (a) Special Circumstances.—The restrictions on
- 5 authority contained in section 2 do not apply in a case
- 6 in which the United States is at war with Cuba, armed
- 7 hostilities between the two countries are in progress, or
- 8 there is imminent danger to the public health or the phys-
- 9 ical safety of United States travelers.
- 10 (b) Importation of Goods for Personal Con-
- 11 SUMPTION.—Section 2 does not authorize the importation
- 12 into the United States of any goods for personal consump-
- 13 tion acquired in Cuba.

#### 14 SEC. 4. APPLICABILITY.

- 15 This Act applies to actions taken by the President
- 16 before the date of the enactment of this Act that are in
- 17 effect on such date of enactment, and to actions taken
- 18 on or after such date.

#### 19 SEC. 5. INAPPLICABILITY OF OTHER PROVISIONS.

- This Act applies notwithstanding section 102(h) of
- 21 the Cuban Liberty and Democratic Solidarity
- 22 (LIBERTAD) Act of 1996 (22 U.S.C. 6032(h)) and sec-
- 23 tion 910(b) of the Trade Sanctions Reform and Export
- 24 Enhancement Act of 2000 (22 U.S.C. 7210(b)).
