# H. R. 1131

To establish a commission to commemorate the sesquicentennial of the American Civil War.

#### IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. Baker (for himself, Mr. McCrery, Mr. Alexander, Mr. Melancon, Mr. Jindal, Mr. Boustany, Mr. Wolf, and Mr. Platts) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform

## A BILL

To establish a commission to commemorate the sesquicentennial of the American Civil War.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Civil War Sesqui-
- 5 centennial Commission Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress makes the following find-
- 8 ings:

- 1 (1) The American Civil War was a defining ex-2 perience in the development of the United States.
  - (2) The people of the United States continue to struggle with issues of race, civil rights, the politics of federalism, and heritage which are legacies of the Civil War and Reconstruction.
    - (3) There is a resurgence of interest in the Civil War that is evidenced by the multitude of publications, exhibits, reenactments, research organizations, Internet and multimedia resources, historic parks, and preservation associations focused on the Civil War.
    - (4) The years 2011 through 2015 mark the sesquicentennial of the Civil War.
    - (5) The sesquicentennial of the Civil War presents a significant opportunity for Americans to recall and reflect upon the Civil War and its legacy in a spirit of reconciliation and reflection.
    - (6) The United States Civil War Center at Louisiana State University, Louisiana, and the Civil War Institute at Gettysburg College, Pennsylvania, have been designated by the Federal Government to plan and facilitate the commemoration of the sesquicentennial of the Civil War.
- 25 (7) The State of Virginia—

1	(A) witnessed more Civil War military en-
2	gagements on its soil than any other State;
3	(B) hosts more historic sites related to the
4	Civil War than any other State; and
5	(C) is home to the Pamplin Historical
6	Park and the National Museum of the Civil
7	War Soldier and the Virginia Center for Civil
8	War Studies at Virginia Polytechnic Institute
9	and State University, both of which are nation-
10	ally recognized centers of expertise in the study
11	of the Civil War.
12	(8) The African American Civil War Museum
13	located in Washington, DC, is the only museum in
14	the Nation dedicated to the study and understanding
15	of the role of African Americans in the Civil War.
16	(b) Purpose.— The purpose of this Act is to estab-
17	lish a Civil War Sesquicentennial Commemoration Com-
18	mission to—
19	(1) ensure a suitable national observance of the
20	sesquicentennial of the Civil War;
21	(2) cooperate with and assist States and na-
22	tional organizations with programs and activities for
23	the observance of the sesquicentennial of the Civil
24	War;

1	(3) assist in ensuring that any observance of
2	the sesquicentennial of the Civil War is inclusive and
3	appropriately recognizes the experiences and points
4	of view of all people affected by the Civil War; and
5	(4) provide assistance for the development of
6	programs, projects, and activities on the Civil War
7	that have lasting educational value.
8	SEC. 3. CIVIL WAR SESQUICENTENNIAL COMMEMORATION
9	COMMISSION.
10	The Secretary of the Interior shall establish a com-
11	mission to be known as the Civil War Sesquicentennial
12	Commemoration Commission (hereafter in this Act re-
13	ferred to as the "Commission").
14	SEC. 4. COMPOSITION OF THE COMMISSION.
15	(a) In General.—The Commission shall be com-
16	posed of 25 members as follows:
17	(1) GOVERNMENT MEMBERS.—The Commission
18	shall include—
19	(A) 2 Members of the House of Represent-
20	atives appointed by the Speaker of the House of
21	Representatives;
22	(B) 2 Members of the Senate appointed by
23	the President pro tempore of the Senate, in
24	consultation with the majority leader and the
25	minority leader of the Senate;

1	(C) the Secretary of the Interior or the
2	designee of the Secretary;
3	(D) the Secretary of the Smithsonian In-
4	stitution, or the designee of the Secretary;
5	(E) the Secretary of the Department of
6	Education, or the designee of the Secretary;
7	(F) the Chairman of the National Endow-
8	ment for the Humanities, or the designee of the
9	Chairman;
10	(G) the Archivist of the United States, or
11	the designee of the Archivist;
12	(H) the Librarian of Congress, or the des-
13	ignee of the Librarian; and
14	(I) the Director of the National Park Serv-
15	ice, or the designee of the Director.
16	(2) Private members.—The Commission shall
17	include—
18	(A) 5 members appointed by the President
19	from among individuals who are representative
20	of the corporate community; and
21	(B) 9 individuals, appointed by the Presi-
22	dent, from among persons who by reason of
23	education, training, and experience, are experts
24	on the Antebellum, Civil War, and Reconstruc-
25	tion eras, including—

1	(i) 6 individuals with expertise in his-
2	tory;
3	(ii) 1 individual with specific expertise
4	in art history, historic preservation, or a
5	related field;
6	(iii) 1 individual with expertise in an-
7	thropology, cultural geography, sociology,
8	or a related field; and
9	(iv) 1 individual with expertise in po-
10	litical science, law, economics, or a related
11	field.
12	(b) Terms.—Members shall be appointed for the life
13	of the Commission.
14	(c) VACANCIES.—Any vacancy in the Commission
15	shall not affect its powers, and shall be filled in the same
16	manner as the original appointment.
17	(d) Initial Appointments.—The appointment of
18	the members of the Commission shall be made not later
19	than 60 days after the date of the enactment of this Act.
20	SEC. 5. GENERAL PROVISIONS.
21	(a) Meetings.—
22	(1) Initial meeting.—Not later than 60 days
23	after the date on which all members of the Commis-
24	sion have been appointed, the members appointed

1 under subparagraphs (A) and (B) of section 4(a)(2)2 shall call the first meeting of the Commission. 3 (2) Subsequent meetings.—The Commission shall hold subsequent meetings at the call of the 5 chairperson. 6 (b) Chairperson and Vice Chairperson.—At the initial meeting, the Commission shall elect a Chairperson 8 and Vice Chairperson from among its voting members. 9 (c) Quorum.—A majority of voting members shall 10 constitute a quorum, but a lesser number may hold meet-11 ings. 12 (d) Voting.— 13 (1) In General.—The Commission shall act 14 only on an affirmative vote of a majority of the vot-15 ing members of the Commission. 16 NONVOTING MEMBERS.—The individuals 17 appointed under subparagraphs (A) and (B) of sec-18 tion 4(a)(1) shall be nonvoting members, and shall 19 serve only in an advisory capacity. 20 SEC. 6. DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION. 21 (a) ACTIVITIES RELATED TO THE SESQUICENTEN-22 NIAL.—The Commission shall— 23 (1) plan, develop, and carry out programs and 24 activities appropriate to commemorate the sesqui-25 centennial of the Civil War;

1	(2) encourage interdisciplinary examination of
2	the Civil War;
3	(3) facilitate Civil War-related activities
4	throughout the United States;
5	(4) encourage civic, historical, educational, eco-
6	nomic, and other organizations throughout the
7	United States to organize and participate in activi-
8	ties to expand the understanding and appreciation of
9	the significance of the Civil War;
10	(5) coordinate and facilitate the public distribu-
11	tion of scholarly research, publications, and interpre-
12	tations of the Civil War;
13	(6) provide technical assistance to States, local-
14	ities, and nonprofit organizations to further the com-
15	memoration of the sesquicentennial of the Civil War;
16	(7) develop programs and facilities to ensure
17	that the sesquicentennial commemoration of the
18	Civil War results in a positive legacy and long-term
19	public benefit; and
20	(8) encourage the development and conduct of
21	programs designed to involve the international com-
22	munity in activities that commemorate the Civil
23	War.
24	(b) Plans and Report.—

1	(1) Strategic plan and annual perform-
2	ANCE PLANS.—The Commission shall prepare a
3	strategic plan in accordance with section 306 of title
4	5, United States Code, and annual performance
5	plans in accordance with section 1115 of title 31,
6	United States Code, for the activities of the Com-
7	mission carried out under this Act.
8	(2) Reports.—
9	(A) Annual Report.—The Commission
10	shall submit to Congress an annual report that
11	contains a list of each gift, bequest, or devise
12	with a value of more than \$250, together with
13	the identity of the donor of each such gift, be-
14	quest, or devise.
15	(B) Final Report.—Not later than De-
16	cember 30, 2015, the Commission shall submit
17	to Congress a final report that contains—
18	(i) a summary of activities of the
19	Commission;
20	(ii) a final accounting of funds re-
21	ceived and expended by the Commission
22	and
23	(iii) the findings and recommenda-
24	tions of the Commission.

#### 1 SEC. 7. GRANT PROGRAM.

(a) Grants Authorized.—The National Endow-
ment for the Humanities shall award grants under this
section for the uses described in subsection (b).
(b) Use of Grants.—Grants awarded under this
section shall be used for appropriate activities relating to
the sesquicentennial of the Civil War.
(c) Consideration.—In awarding grants under this
section, the National Endowment of the Humanities shall
consider established university, museum, or academic pro-
grams with national scope that sponsor multidisciplinary
projects, including those that concentrate on the role of
African Americans in the Civil War.
SEC. 8. POWERS OF THE COMMISSION.
(a) In General.—The Commission may—
(1) solicit, accept, use, and dispose of gifts, be-
quests, or devises of money or other real or personal

(2) appoint any advisory committee as the Commission considers appropriate for the purposes of this Act;

property for the purpose of aiding or facilitating the

23 (3) authorize any voting member or employee of 24 the Commission to take any action that the Commis-25 sion is authorized to take under this Act;

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- 1 (4) procure supplies, services, and property, and
  2 make or enter into contracts, leases, or other legal
  3 agreements to carry out this Act (except that any
  4 contracts, leases, or other legal agreements entered
  5 into by the Commission shall not extend beyond the
  6 date of the termination of the Commission); and
- 7 (5) use the United States mails in the same 8 manner and under the same conditions as other 9 Federal agencies.

#### 10 SEC. 9. PERSONNEL MATTERS.

- 11 (a) Compensation of Members.—Members of the
- 12 Commission, and members of any advisory committee ap-
- 13 pointed under section 8(a)(2), shall serve without com-
- 14 pensation.
- 15 (b) Travel Expenses.—Members of the Commis-
- 16 sion, and members of any advisory committees appointed
- 17 under section 8(a)(2), shall be allowed travel expenses, in-
- 18 cluding per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates authorized
- 19 for an employee of an agency under subchapter I of chap-
- 20 ter 57 of title 5, United States Code, while away from
- 21 the home or regular place of business of the member in
- 22 the performance of the duties of the Commission.
- 23 (c) Staff.—
- 24 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Chairperson of the
- 25 Commission may, without regard to civil service laws

- (including regulations), appoint and terminate an executive director and such other additional personnel
  as are necessary to enable the Commission to perform the duties of the Commission.
  - (2) CONFIRMATION OF EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—The employment of an executive director shall be subject to confirmation by the Commission.

#### (3) Compensation.—

- (A) In General.—Except as provided in subparagraph (B), the Chairperson of the Commission may fix the compensation of the executive director and other personnel without regard to the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title 5, United States Code, relating to classification of positions and General Schedule pay rates.
- (B) MAXIMUM RATE OF PAY.—The rate of pay for the executive director and other personnel shall not exceed the rate payable for level V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of title 5, United States Code.

### (d) DETAIL OF GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES.—

(1) In General.—At the request of the Commission, the head of any Federal agency may detail, on a reimbursable or nonreimbursable basis, any of

- 1 the personnel of the agency to the Commission to as-
- 2 sist the Commission in carrying out the duties of the
- 3 Commission under this Act.
- 4 (2) CIVIL SERVICE STATUS.—The detail of an
- 5 employee under paragraph (1) shall be without inter-
- 6 ruption or loss of civil service status or privilege.
- 7 (e) Volunteer and Uncompensated Services.—
- 8 Notwithstanding section 1342 of title 31, United States
- 9 Code, the Commission may accept and use voluntary and
- 10 uncompensated services as the Commission determines
- 11 necessary.
- 12 (f) Support Services.—The Director of the Na-
- 13 tional Park Service shall provide to the Commission, on
- 14 a reimbursable basis, such administrative support services
- 15 as the Commission may request.
- 16 (g) Procurement of Temporary and Intermit-
- 17 TENT SERVICES.—The Chairperson of the Commission
- 18 may procure temporary and intermittent services under
- 19 section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, at daily
- 20 rates for individuals which do not exceed the daily equiva-
- 21 lent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level
- 22 V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of such
- 23 title.

- 1 (h) FACA NONAPPLICABILITY.—Section 14(b) of the
- 2 Federal Advisory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not
- 3 apply to the Commission.
- 4 (i) Termination.—The Commission shall terminate
- 5 on the date that is 90 days after the date on which the
- 6 Commission submits its report under section 6(b)(2).

#### 7 SEC. 10. AUDIT OF COMMISSION.

- 8 The Inspector General of the Department of the Inte-
- 9 rior shall perform an annual audit of the Commission and
- 10 shall make the results of the audit available to the public.

#### 11 SEC. 11. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- 12 (a) In General.—There is authorized to be appro-
- 13 priated to carry out this Act (other than section 7)
- 14 \$200,000 for each of the fiscal years 2005 through 2016.
- 15 (b) Grants.—There is authorized to be appropriated
- 16 \$3,500,000 to the National Endowment for the Human-
- 17 ities to provide grants under section 7, to remain available
- 18 until expended.

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
