# H. R. 2350

To amend the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971 to prohibit contributions and expenditures by multicandidate political committees controlled by foreign-owned corporations, and for other purposes.

## A BILL

To amend the Federal Election Campaign Act of 1971 to prohibit contributions and expenditures by multi-candidate political committees controlled by foreign-owned corporations, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Ethics in Foreign Lob-
- 5 bying Act of 2007".

24	expenditure with respect to an election for Federal
25	office if 50 percent or more of the operating fund of
26	the trade organization, membership organization, co-

operative, or corporation without capital stock is supplied by foreign-controlled corporations or foreign nationals.

#### "(b) The Commission shall—

"(1) require each multicandidate political committee or separate segregated fund of a corporation to include in the statement of organization of the multicandidate political committee or separate segregated fund a statement (to be updated annually and at any time when the percentage goes above or below 50 percent) of the percentage of ownership interest in the corporation that is controlled by persons other than citizens or nationals of the United States;

"(2) require each trade association, membership organization, cooperative, or corporation without capital stock to include in its statement of organization of the multicandidate political committee or separate segregated fund (and update annually) the percentage of its operating fund that is derived from foreign-owned corporations and foreign nationals; and

"(3) take such action as may be necessary to enforce subsection (a).

"(c) The Commission shall maintain a list of the 1 identity of the multicandidate political committees or sepa-3 rate segregated funds that file reports under subsection 4 (b), including a statement of the amounts and percentage 5 reported by such multicandidate political committees or separate segregated funds. 6 7 "(d) As used in this section— 8 "(1) the  $\operatorname{term}$ 'foreign-owned corporation' 9 means a corporation at least 50 percent of the own-10 ership interest of which is controlled by persons 11 other than citizens or nationals of the United States; "(2) the term 'multicandidate political com-12 13 mittee' has the meaning given that term in section 14 315(a)(4);15 "(3) the term 'separate segregated fund' means 16 a separate segregated fund referred to in section 17 316(b)(2)(C); and 18 "(4) the term 'foreign national' has the mean-19 ing given that term in section 319.". 20 SEC. 3. - 18 (b) Disclosure of Other Information Prohib-
- 19 ITED.—The disclosure by the clearinghouse, or any officer
- 20 or employee thereof, of any information other than that
- 21 set forth in subsection (a) is prohibited, except as other-
- 22 wise provided by law.
- 23 (c) Director of Clearinghouse.—(1) The clear-
- 24 inghouse shall have a Director, who shall administer and

#### 11 SEC. 5. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTOR

- 12 **OF THE CLEARINGHOUSE.**
- 13 (a) In General.—It shall be the duty of the Direc-
- 14 tor of the clearinghouse established under section 4—
- 15 (1) to develop a filing, coding, and cross-index-
- ing system to carry out the purposes of this Act
- 17 (which shall include an index of all persons identi-
- 18 fied in the reports, registrations, and other informa-
- tion comprising the clearinghouse;
- 20 (2) notwithstanding any other provision of law,
- 21 to make copies of registrations, reports, and other
- information comprising the clearinghouse available
- for public inspection and copying, beginning not
- later than 30 days after the information is first
- available to the public, and to permit copying of any

- such registration, report, or other information by hand or by copying machine or, at the request of any person, to furnish a copy of any such registration, report, or other information upon payment of the cost of making and furnishing such copy, except that no information contained in such registration or report and no such other information shall be sold or used by any person for the purpose of soliciting contributions or for any profit-making purpose;
  - (3) to compile and summarize, for each calendar quarter, the information contained in such registrations, reports, and other information comprising the clearinghouse in a manner which facilitates the disclosure of political activities, including, but not limited to, information on—
    - (A) political activities pertaining to issues before the Congress and issues before the executive branch; and
    - (B) the political activities of individuals, organizations, foreign principals, and agents of foreign principals who share an economic, business, or other common interest;
  - (4) to make the information compiled and summarized under paragraph (3) available to the public within 30 days after the close of each calendar quar-

- ter, and to publish such information in the Federal
  Register at the earliest practicable opportunity;
  - (5) not later than 150 days after the date of the enactment of this Act and at any time thereafter, to prescribe, in consultation with the Comptroller General, such rules, regulations, and forms, in conformity with the provisions of chapter 5 of title 5, United States Code, as are necessary to carry out the provisions of section 4 and this section in the most effective and efficient manner; and
    - (6) at the request of any Member of the Senate or the House of Representatives, to prepare and submit to such Member a study or report relating to the political activities of any person and consisting only of the information in the registrations, reports, and other information comprising the clearinghouse.

### (b) Definitions.—As used in this section—

- (1) the terms "foreign principal" and "agent of a foreign principal" have the meanings given those terms in section 1 of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended (22 U.S.C. 611);
- (2) the term "issue before the Congress" means the total of all matters, both substantive and procedural, relating to—

1	(A) any pending or proposed bill, resolu-
2	tion, report, nomination, treaty, hearing, inves-
3	tigation, or other similar matter in either the
4	Senate or the House of Representatives or any
5	committee or office of the Congress; or
6	(B) any pending action by a Member, offi-
7	cer, or employee of the Congress to affect, or
8	attempt to affect, any action or proposed action
9	by any officer or employee of the executive
10	branch; and
11	(3) the term "issue before the executive
12	branch" means the total of all matters, both sub-
13	stantive and procedural, relating to any pending ac-
14	tion by any executive agency, or by any officer or
15	employee of the executive branch, concerning—
16	(A) any pending or proposed rule, rule of
17	practice, adjudication, regulation, determina-
18	tion, hearing, investigation, contract, grant, li-
19	cense, negotiation, or the appointment of offi-
20	cers and employees, other than appointments in
21	the competitive service; or
22	(B) any issue before the Congress.
23	SEC. 6. PENALTIES FOR DISCLOSURE.
24	Any person who discloses information in violation of
25	section 4(b), and any person who sells or uses information

- 2 it-making purpose in violation of section 5(a)(2), shall be
- 3 imprisoned for a period of not more than 1 year, or fined
- 4 under title 18, United States Code, or both.
- 5 SEC. 7. AMENDMENTS TO THE FOREIGN AGENTS REG-
- 6 ISTRATION ACT OF 1938, AS AMENDED.
- 7 (a) Quarterly Reports.—Section 2(b) of the For-
- 8 eign Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended (22
- 9 U.S.C. 612(b)), is amended in the first sentence by strik-
- 10 ing out ", within thirty days" and all that follows through
- 11 "preceding six months' period" and inserting in lieu there-
- 12 of "on January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31
- 13 of each year, file with the Attorney General a supplement
- 14 thereto on a form prescribed by the Attorney General,
- 15 which shall set forth regarding the three-month periods
- 16 ending the previous December 31, March 31, June 30, and
- 17 September 30, respectively, or if a lesser period, the period
- 18 since the initial filing,".
- 19 (b) Exemption for Legal Representation.—
- 20 Section 3(g) of the Foreign Agents Registration Act of
- 21 1938, as amended (22 U.S.C. 613(g)) is amended by add-
- 22 ing at the end the following: "A person may be exempt
- 23 under this subsection only upon filing with the Attorney
- 24 General a request for such exemption.".

- 1 (c) Civil Penalties.—Section 8 of the Foreign
- 2 Agents Registration Act of 1938, as amended (22 U.S.C.
- 3 618), is amended by adding at the end thereof the fol-
- 4 lowing:
- 5 "(i)(1) Any person who is determined, after notice
- 6 and opportunity for an administrative hearing—
- 7 "(A) to have failed to file a registration state-
- 8 ment under section 2(a) or a supplement thereto
- 9 under section 2(b),
- 10 "(B) to have omitted a material fact required to
- be stated therein, or
- "(C) to have made a false statement with re-
- spect to such a material fact,
- 14 shall be required to pay a civil penalty in an amount not
- 15 less than \$2,000 or more than \$5,000 for each violation
- 16 committed. In determining the amount of the penalty, the
- 17 Attorney General shall give due consideration to the na-
- 18 ture and duration of the violation.
- 19 "(2)(A) In conducting investigations and hearings
- 20 under paragraph (1), administrative law judges may, if
- 21 necessary, compel by subpoena the attendance of witnesses
- 22 and the production of evidence at any designated place
- 23 or hearing.
- 24 "(B) In the case of contumacy or refusal to obey a
- 25 subpoena lawfully issued under this paragraph and, upon

- 1 application by the Attorney General, an appropriate dis-
- 2 trict court of the United States may issue an order requir-
- 3 ing compliance with such subpoena and any failure to obey
- 4 such order may be punished by such court as contempt

5 thereof.".

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
