A BILL

Disapproving of any formal agreement emerging from the "Declaration of Principles for a Long-Term Relationship of Cooperation and Friendship Between the Republic of Iraq and the United States of America" unless the agreement is approved through an Act of Congress.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.
- 4 Congress finds the following:

- 1 (1) The Iraq Study Group Report recommends:
 2 "The President should state that the United States
 3 does not seek permanent military bases in Iraq. If
 4 the Iraqi Government were to request a temporary
 5 base or bases, then the United States Government
 6 could consider that request as it would in the case
 7 of any other government.".
 - (2) The House of Representatives has passed 10 separate bills prohibiting or expressing opposition to the establishment of permanent military bases in Iraq including five of which Congress has approved on a strong bipartisan basis and the President has signed into law: Public Law 109–289, Public Law 109–364, Public Law 110–28, Public Law 110–116, and Public Law 110–161. Nevertheless, the President has failed to faithfully execute and enforce these statutes, as he has taken an oath to fulfill.
 - (3) The perception that the United States intends to permanently maintain tens of thousands of U.S. troops in Iraq, following the invasion ordered by President Bush in March 2003 and the subsequent prolonged military occupation of Iraq, aids insurgent groups and the al-Qaeda terrorist network in recruiting supporters and fuels violent activity.

- 1 (4) Without any congressional consultation or 2 input, President Bush signed a "Declaration of 3 Principles for a Long-Term Relationship of Coopera-4 tion and Friendship Between the Republic of Iraq 5 and the United States of America" on November 26,
- 7 (5) The "Declaration of Principles" outlines the 8 multi-faceted shape of the long-term bilateal rela-9 tionship between the Governments of the United 10 States and Iraq, including anticipated enduring mili-11 tary roles for the U.S. Armed Forces.

12 SEC. 2. DISAPPROVAL OF AGREEMENT EMERGING FROM

- 13 DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.
- 14 Any formal agreement emerging from the "Declara-
- 15 tion of Principles for a Long-Term Relationship of Co-
- 16 operation and Friendship Between the Republic of Iraq
- 17 and the United States of America" shall not have the ef-
- 18 fect of force of law unless the agreement is approved by
- 19 an Act of Congress enacted after the date of enactment
- 20 of this Act.

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- 21 SEC. 3. SENSE OF CONGRESS.
- It is the sense of Congress that any formal agreement
- 23 emerging from the "Declaration of Principles for a Long-
- 24 Term Relationship of Cooperation and Friendship Be-

- 1 tween the Republic of Iraq and the United States of Amer-
- 2 ica" must be approved by an act of the Iraqi legislature.

3 SEC. 4. LIMITATION OF USE OF FUNDS.

- 4 No funds appropriated or otherwise made available
- 5 to the Department of Defense or any other department
- 6 or agency of the United States may be used to enforce
- 7 or implement any formal agreement emerging from the
- 8 "Declaration of Principles for a Long-Term Relationship
- 9 of Cooperation and Friendship Between the Republic of
- 10 Iraq and the United States of America" unless the agree-
- 11 ment is approved through an Act of Congress.

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
