A BILL

To amend the Public Health Service Act to establish various programs for the recruitment and retention of public health workers and to eliminate critical public health workforce shortages in Federal, State, local, and tribal public health agencies.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Public Health Pre-
- 5 paredness Workforce Development Act of 2008".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:

- 1 (1) The ability of the public health system to
 2 prevent, respond to, and recover from bioterrorism,
 3 acute outbreaks of infectious diseases, or other
 4 health threats and emergencies depends upon the ex5 istence of adequate numbers of well-trained public
 6 health professionals in Federal, State, local, and
 7 tribal public health departments.
 - (2) The public health system has an aging staff nearing retirement with no clear pipeline of highly-skilled and capable employees to fill the void, with the average age of the State public health workforce at 47 years.
 - (3) Retirement rates in some State public health agencies are as high as 20 percent as of June 2007, and projected to be as high as 45 percent by 2008.
 - (4) The ratio of public health workers to the population has dropped from 219 per 100,000 in 1980 to 158 per 100,000 in 2000, while responsibilities of such workers have continued to expand.
 - (5) Public health nurses comprise the largest segment of the public health workforce. A study by the Institute of Medicine in 2003 identified nursing as facing one of the most severe shortages of public health workers. The average age of public health

- nurses is nearly 50 years, with the leaders of State
 public health nursing averaging more than 30 years
 of service. In one State nearly 40 percent of the
 public health nursing workforce was eligible for retirement as of June 2007.
 - (6) According to the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials, most of the approximately 6,400 graduates from accredited schools of public health took jobs in the private sector in 2004. The Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that there will be an increase in private sector demand for highly educated graduates in scientific fields during the 10-year period ending in 2017. Public health agencies will have difficulty competing for those highly skilled scientists.
 - (7) As of June 2007, approximately 42 percent of the epidemiology workforce in State and territorial health departments lacks formal academic training in epidemiology. States have reported that approximately 47 percent more epidemiologists are needed to adequately prevent and control avian influenza and other emerging diseases.
 - (8) Thirteen State public health laboratories are without doctoral-level molecular scientists on staff, and 23 have only 1. A majority of State health

- laboratories report they do not have enough staff on board to provide surge capacity in case of a public health emergency, such as a bioterrorist attack.
 - (9) The Partnership for Public Service reports that in the field of microbiology, there are more than 4 times as many full-time permanent employees over age 40 as under age 40 at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Among full-time permanent employees with medical backgrounds at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration, there are 3 times as many employees over 40 years of age as under 40.
 - (10) More than 50 percent of the States cite the lack of qualified individuals or individuals willing to relocate as being a major barrier to preparedness. A study conducted by the Health Resources and Services Association reported difficulty with recruiting more educated, skilled public health providers to work in traditionally medically underserved areas, such as rural populations. Public health agencies continue to identify unmet need for public health workers who are bilingual and culturally competent.
 - (11) Lack of access to advanced education, including baccalaureate nursing and graduate studies,

- is a significant barrier to upgrading the existing public health workforce, particularly in rural areas.
 - ited schools of public health and State or local health departments, known as academic health departments, will provide important first-hand experience to encourage students to pursue careers in public health. These partnerships, consistent with recommendations made by the Institute of Medicine, will provide mutually beneficial collaboration and improve the quality of both academic and applied training.
 - (13) Academic health departments will improve access to continuing and higher education for health department workers.
 - (14) The concept of academic health departments has been successfully demonstrated at 14 accredited schools of public health by a pilot program funded by the Centers for Disease Control. Applications for funds to develop such departments were submitted by 70 percent of the public health schools in the United States.

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- "(1) Contracts with institutions.—The
 Secretary may contract with an educational institution in which a participant in the Program is enrolled, for the payment to the educational institution
 of the amounts of tuition and other reasonable educational expenses described in subsection (d)(3).
- 7 "(2)EMPLOYMENT CEILINGS.—Notwith-8 standing any other provision of law, individuals who 9 have entered into written contracts with the Sec-10 retary under this section, while undergoing academic 11 training, shall not be counted against any employ-12 ment ceiling affecting the Department or any other 13 Federal agency.
- "(g) Breach of Contract.—An individual who fails to comply with the contract entered into under subsection (d) shall be subject to the same financial penalties as provided for under section 338E for breaches of scholarship contracts under sections 338A.

 - "(2)(A) in the case of an individual described in paragraph (1)(A), have accepted employment with a Federal, State, local, or tribal public health agency, as recognized by the Secretary, to commence upon graduation; or
 - "(B) in the case of an individual described in paragraph (1)(B), be employed by, or have accepted employment with, a Federal, State, local, or tribal public health agency, as recognized by the Secretary;
 - "(3) be a United States citizen;
 - "(4) submit an application to the Secretary to participate in the Program; and

- "(A) a fair summary of the rights and liabilities of an individual whose application is approved (and whose contract is accepted) by the Secretary, including in the summary a clear explanation of the damages to which the United States is entitled to recover in the case of the individual's breach of the contract; and
- "(B) information relating to the service obligation and such other information as may be necessary for the individual to understand the individual's prospective participation in the Program.
- "(2) Information for schools.—The Secretary shall distribute to health professions schools and other appropriate accredited academic institutions and relevant Federal, State, local, and tribal public health agencies, materials providing information on the Program and shall encourage such schools, institutions, and agencies to disseminate such materials to potentially eligible students.

"(e) Payments.—

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"(1) IN GENERAL.—A loan repayment provided for an individual under a written contract under the Program shall consist of payment, in accordance with paragraph (2), on behalf of the individual of the principal, interest, and related expenses on government and commercial loans received by the individual regarding the undergraduate or graduate edu-

1 cation of the individual (or both), which loans were 2 made for— "(A) tuition expenses; or 3 "(B) all other reasonable educational ex-4 penses, including fees, books, and laboratory ex-6 penses, incurred by the individual. 7 "(2) Payments for years served.— 8 "(A) IN GENERAL.—For each year of obli-9 gated service that an individual contracts to serve under subsection (d) the Secretary may 10 11 pay up to \$35,000 on behalf of the individual 12 for loans described in paragraph (1). 8	"(c) USE OF FUNDS.—An eligible partnership (as de-
9	scribed in subsection (b)) may use funds provided under
10	a grant made under subsection (a) for the following pur-

12	"(1) To provide for curriculum development.
13	"(2) To provide for training and academic in-
14	struction.
15	"(3) To conduct leadership seminars.

18	"(5) To facilitate appropriate staff of the State
19	or local health department participating in the eligi-
20	ble partnership to teach with the school of public
21	health or public health degree program participating
22	in such partnership.
23	"(6) To facilitate faculty and students of the
24	school of public health or public health degree pro-
25	gram participating in the eligible partnership to

- work in the health department participating in such
 partnership.
- 3 "(7) To provide for a project coordinator.
- 4 "(8) To provide for subgrants to organizations 5 to conduct activities consistent with the goals of the 6 Program.
 - "(9) Other appropriate activities specified by the Secretary to recruit public health students to full time employment in a health department after graduation.

"(d) Reports.—

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- "(1) Grant recipient reports to the sec-Retary.—Each recipient of a grant awarded under subsection (a) shall submit to the Secretary a report for each year for which the recipient received such a grant on the results and outcomes of the activities funded by such grant during such year.
- "(2) Reports to congress.—For the 3-year period beginning on the date of the establishment of the Program, and for each subsequent 3-year period in which the Program is in existence, the Secretary shall submit to Congress a report, on the results and outcomes of the Program during such 3-year period, including the number of Academic Health Departments funded by grants under the Program, the

- number of students trained through grants under the Program, and the number of trainees participating in such Academic Health Departments who remain in public health professions.
- 5 "(3) EVALUATION OF PROGRAM.—Not later 6 than the date that is 5 years after the date of the 7 establishment of the Program, the Secretary shall 8 submit to Congress a report that examines the re-9 sults and outcomes of the Program and recommends 10 the extent to which the Program should be contin-11 ued.
- "(e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
 is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section,
 4 \$4,000,000 for each of the fiscal years 2009 through
 2014."

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
