# A BILL

To provide for competitive development and operation of high-speed rail corridor projects.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SOLICITATION OF PROPOSALS.
- 4 (a) IN GENERAL.—
- 5 (1) NORTHEAST CORRIDOR.—Not later than 60
- 6 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the
- 7 Secretary of Transportation shall issue a request for

- 1 proposals for projects for the financing, design, con-2 struction, and operation of an initial high-speed rail system operating between Washington, DC, and 3 4 New York City. Such proposals shall be submitted to 5 the Secretary not later than 150 days after the pub-6 lication of such request for proposals.
  - (2) OTHER PROJECTS.—After a report is transmitted under section 5 with respect to projects described in paragraph (1), the Secretary of Transportation may issue a request for proposals for additional projects for the financing, design, construction, and operation of a high-speed rail system operating on any other corridor in the United States. Such proposals shall be submitted to the Secretary not later than 150 days after the publication of such request for proposals.
- 17 (b) Contents.—A proposal submitted under subsection (a) shall include— 18
- 19 (1) the names and qualifications of the persons 20 submitting the proposal;
- (2) a detailed description of the proposed route 22 and its engineering characteristics;

#### 17 SEC. 4. COMMISSION CONSIDERATION.

18 (a) IN GENERAL.—Each commission established 19 under section 2(2) shall be responsible for reviewing the 20 proposal or proposals with respect to which the commis-21 sion was established, and not later than 90 days after the 22 establishment of the commission, shall transmit to the 23 Secretary, and to the chairman and ranking minority 24 member of the Committee on Transportation and Infra-25 structure of the House of Representatives and the Com-

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- 6 mittee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of the 2 Senate, a report which includes— 3 (1) a summary of each proposal received; 4 (2) a ranking of the order of the proposals ac-5 cording to feasibility, and cost and benefit to the 6 public; 7 (3) an indication of which proposal or proposals 8 are recommended by the commission; and 9 (4) an identification of any proposed legislative 10 provisions which would facilitate implementation of 11 the recommended project. 12 (b) Verbal Presentation.—Proposers shall be

### 15 SEC. 5. SELECTION BY SECRETARY.

Not later than 60 days after receiving a report from a commission under section 4(a), the Secretary of Transportation shall transmit to the Congress a report that ranks all of the recommended proposals according to feasibility, and cost and benefit to the public.

- Not later than 9 months after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Transportation shall transmit

1	study of Amtrak's Northeast Corridor service between
2	Washington, DC, and New York City. Such study shall
3	examine how to achieve maximum utilization of the North-
4	east Corridor, including—
5	(1) maximizing the assets of the Northeast Cor-
6	ridor for potential economic development purposes;
7	(2) real estate improvement and financial re-
8	turn;
9	(3) improved commuter and freight services;
10	(4) optimum utility utilization in conjunction
11	with potential separated high-speed rail passenger
12	services; and
13	(5) any other means of maximizing the eco-
14	nomic potential of the Northeast Corridor.

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
