## A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to display in each prosthetic and orthotic clinic of the Department of Veterans Affairs an Injured and Amputee Veterans Bill of Rights.

- 3 SECTION 1. DISPLAY OF INJURED AND AMPUTEE VET-

- 5 (a) Establishment.—The Secretary of Veterans
- 6 Affairs shall ensure that the Injured and Amputee Vet-
- 7 erans Bill of Rights described in subsection (b) is dis-

- 2 of the Department of Veterans Affairs.
- 3 (b) Injured and Amputee Veterans Bill of
- 4 RIGHTS.—The Injured and Amputee Veteran Bill of
- 5 Rights described in this subsection is a sign stating that
- 6 injured veterans should have the following rights:
- 7 (1) The right to access the highest quality pros-8 thetic and orthotic care, including the right to the
- 9 most appropriate technology and best qualified prac-
- titioners.
- 11 (2) The right to continuity of care in the transi-
- tion from the Department of Defense health pro-
- gram to the Department of Veterans Affairs health
- 14 care system, including comparable benefits relating
- to prosthetic and orthotic services.
- 16 (3) The right to select the practitioner that best
- meets their orthotic and prosthetic needs, whether or
- not that practitioner is an employee of the Depart-
- ment of Veterans Affairs, a private practitioner who
- 20 has entered into a contract with the Secretary of
- Veterans Affairs to provide prosthetic and orthotic
- services, or a private practitioner with specialized ex-
- pertise.
- 24 (4) The right to consistent and portable health
- care, including the right to obtain comparable serv-

- ices and technology at any medical facility of the
  Department of Veterans Affairs across the country.
  - (5) The right to timely and efficient prosthetic and orthotic care, including a speedy authorization process with expedited authorization available for veterans visiting from another area.
    - (6) The right to play a meaningful role in rehabilitation decisions, including the right to receive a second opinion regarding prosthetic and orthotic treatment options.
    - (7) The right to receive appropriate treatment, including the right to receive both a primary prosthesis or orthosis and a functional spare.
    - (8) The right to be treated with respect and dignity and have an optimal quality of life both during and after rehabilitation.
    - (9) The right to transition and readjust to civilian life in an honorable manner, including by having ample access to vocational rehabilitation, employment programs, and housing assistance.
