To amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to authorize grant programs to enhance the access of low-income African-American students to higher education.

Mr. Obama introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

A BILL

- To amend the Higher Education Act of 1965 to authorize grant programs to enhance the access of low-income African-American students to higher education.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 This Act may be cited as the "Predominantly Black
 - 5 Institution Act of 2007".
 - 6 SEC. 2. PREDOMINANTLY BLACK INSTITUTIONS.
 - 7 (a) AMENDMENT.—Part A of title III of the Higher
 - 8 Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1057 et seq.) is amend-
 - 9 ed by inserting after section 317 the following:

1 "SEC. 318. PREDOMINANTLY BLACK INSTITUTIONS.

2	"(a) Findings and Purpose.—
3	"(1) Findings.—Congress finds that—
4	"(A) although African-Americans have
5	made significant progress in closing the gap be-
6	tween African-American and White enrollment
7	in higher education—
8	"(i) African-Americans continue to
9	trail Whites in the percentage of the col-
10	lege-age cohort who enroll and graduate
11	from college;
12	"(ii) among recent secondary school
13	graduates, the college participation rate of
14	Whites was 46 percent from 2000 through
15	2002, while such rate for African-Ameri-
16	cans was only 39 percent; and
17	"(iii) the gap between White and Afri-
18	can-American bachelor's degree attainment
19	rates also remains high, continuing to ex-
20	ceed 10 percent;
21	"(B) a growing number of African-Amer-
22	ican students are participating in higher edu-
23	cation and are enrolled at an increasing number
24	of urban and rural Predominantly Black Insti-
25	tutions that have included in their mission the
26	provision of academic training and education

for both traditional and nontraditional minority students;

"(C) the overwhelming majority of students attending Predominantly Black Institutions come from low- and middle-income families and qualify for participation in the Federal student assistance programs or other needbased Federal programs as indicated by recent data from the National Postsecondary Student Aid Study which demonstrates that 47 percent of African-American undergraduates are Federal Pell Grant recipients, compared to 21 percent of non-Hispanic Whites;

"(D) many of the students who enroll in Predominantly Black Institutions are also first generation college students who often lack the appropriate academic preparation for success in college and whose parents lack the requisite knowledge and information regarding financing a college education;

"(E) there is a particular national need to aid institutions of higher education that have become Predominantly Black Institutions by virtue of the fact that the Predominantly Black

1	Institutions have expanded opportunities for Af-
2	rican-American and other minority students;
3	"(F) Predominantly Black Institutions ful-
4	fill a unique mission within American higher
5	education, far beyond that which was initially
6	envisioned;
7	"(G) Predominantly Black Institutions
8	serve the cultural and social advancement of
9	low-income, African-American and other minor-
10	ity students and are a significant access point
11	for these students to higher education and the
12	opportunities offered by American society;
13	"(H) the concentration of the students de-
14	scribed in subparagraph (G) in a limited num-
15	ber of 2-year and 4-year Predominantly Black
16	Institutions and the desire of these students to
17	secure a degree to prepare these students for a
18	successful career places special burdens on
19	those institutions who attract, retain, and grad-
20	uate these students; and
21	"(I) financial assistance to establish or
22	strengthen the academic resources, physical
23	plants, financial management, and endowments
24	of the Predominantly Black Institutions are ap-

propriate methods to enhance the educational

1	quality of the Predominantly Black Institutions,
2	to facilitate decreased long-term reliance on
3	governmental financial support, and to encour-
4	age reliance on endowments and private
5	sources.
6	"(2) Purpose.—It is the purpose of this sec-
7	tion to assist Predominantly Black Institutions in
8	expanding educational opportunity through a pro-
9	gram of Federal assistance.
10	"(b) Definitions.—In this section:
11	"(1) Educational and general expendi-
12	TURES.—The term 'educational and general expendi-
13	tures' has the meaning given the term in section
14	312.
15	"(2) Eligible institution.—The term 'eligi-
16	ble institution' means an institution of higher edu-
17	cation that—
18	"(A) has an enrollment of needy under-
19	graduate students;
20	"(B) has an average educational and gen-
21	eral expenditure which is low, per full-time
22	equivalent undergraduate student in comparison
23	with the average educational and general ex-
24	penditure per full-time equivalent under-

graduate student of institutions that offer simi-

1	lar instruction, except that the Secretary may
2	apply the waiver requirements described in sec-
3	tion 392(b) to this subparagraph in the same
4	manner as the Secretary applies the waiver re-
5	quirements to section 312(b)(1)(B);
6	"(C) has an enrollment of undergraduate
7	students that is not less than 40 percent Afri-
8	can-American students;
9	"(D) is legally authorized to provide, and
10	provides within the State, an educational pro-
11	gram for which the institution of higher edu-
12	cation awards a baccalaureate degree, or in the
13	case of a junior or community college, an asso-
14	ciate's degree; and
15	"(E) is accredited by a nationally recog-
16	nized accrediting agency or association deter-
17	mined by the Secretary to be a reliable author-
18	ity as to the quality of training offered, or is
19	according to such an agency or association
20	making reasonable progress toward accredita-
21	tion.
22	"(3) Endowment fund.—The term 'endow-

ment fund' has the meaning given the term in sec-

tion 312.

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1	"(4) Enrollment of needy students.—
2	The term 'enrollment of needy students' means the
3	enrollment at an eligible institution with respect to
4	which not less than 50 percent of the undergraduate
5	students enrolled in an academic program leading to
6	a degree—
7	"(A) in the second fiscal year preceding
8	the fiscal year for which the determination is
9	made, were Federal Pell Grant recipients for
10	such year;
11	"(B) come from families that receive bene-
12	fits under a means-tested Federal benefit pro-
13	gram;
14	"(C) attended a public or nonprofit private
15	secondary school—
16	"(i) that is in the school district of a
17	local educational agency that was eligible
18	for assistance under part A of title I of the
19	Elementary and Secondary Education Act
20	of 1965 for any year during which the stu-
21	dent attended such secondary school; and
22	"(ii) which for the purpose of this
23	paragraph and for that year was deter-
24	mined by the Secretary (pursuant to regu-
25	lations and after consultation with the

1	State educational agency of the State in
2	which the school is located) to be a school
3	in which the enrollment of children counted
4	under section 1113(a)(5) of such Act ex-
5	ceeds 30 percent of the total enrollment of
6	such school; or
7	"(D) are first generation college students
8	and a majority of such first generation college
9	students are low-income individuals.
10	"(5) First generation college student.—
11	The term 'first generation college student' has the
12	meaning given the term in section 402A(g).
13	"(6) Institution of higher education.—
14	The term 'institution of higher education' has the
15	meaning given the term in section 101(a).
16	"(7) Low-income individual.—The term
17	'low-income individual' has the meaning given such
18	term in section 402A(g).
19	"(8) Means-tested federal benefit pro-
20	GRAM.—The term 'means-tested Federal benefit pro-
21	gram' means a program of the Federal Government,
22	other than a program under title IV, in which eligi-
23	bility for the program's benefits, or the amount of

such benefits, are determined on the basis of income

1	or resources of the individual or family seeking the
2	benefit.
3	"(9) Predominantly black institution.—
4	The term 'Predominantly Black Institution' means
5	an institution of higher education—
6	"(A) that is an eligible institution with not
7	less than 1,000 undergraduate students;
8	"(B) at which not less than 50 percent of
9	the undergraduate students enrolled at the eli-
10	gible institution are low-income individuals or
11	first generation college students; and
12	"(C) at which not less than 50 percent of
13	the undergraduate students are enrolled in an
14	educational program leading to a bachelor's or
15	associate's degree that the eligible institution is
16	licensed to award by the State in which the eli-
17	gible institution is located.
18	"(10) State.—The term 'State' means each of
19	the 50 States and the District of Columbia.
20	"(c) Grant Authority.—
21	"(1) In general.—The Secretary is authorized
22	to award grants, from allotments under subsection
23	(e), to Predominantly Black Institutions to enable
24	the Predominantly Black Institutions to carry out
25	the authorized activities described in subsection (d)

"(2) Priority.—In awarding grants under this 1 2 section the Secretary shall give priority to Predomi-3 nantly Black Institutions with large numbers or percentages of students described in subsections 5 (b)(2)(A) or (b)(2)(C). The level of priority given to 6 Predominantly Black Institutions with large num-7 bers or percentages of students described in sub-8 section (b)(2)(A) shall be twice the level of priority 9 given to Predominantly Black Institutions with large 10 numbers or percentages of students described in 11 subsection (b)(2)(C). 12

"(d) AUTHORIZED ACTIVITIES.—

- "(1) REQUIRED ACTIVITIES.—Grant funds provided under this section shall be used—
 - "(A) to assist the Predominantly Black Institution to plan, develop, undertake, and implement programs to enhance the institution's capacity to serve more low- and middle-income African-American students;
 - "(B) to expand higher education opportunities for students eligible to participate in programs under title IV by encouraging college preparation and student persistence in secondary school and postsecondary education; and

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1	"(C) to strengthen the financial ability of
2	the Predominantly Black Institution to serve
3	the academic needs of the students described in
4	subparagraphs (A) and (B).
5	"(2) Additional activities.—Grant funds
6	provided under this section shall be used for 1 or
7	more of the following activities:
8	"(A) The activities described in paragraphs
9	(1) through (11) of section 311(c).
10	"(B) Academic instruction in disciplines in
11	which African-Americans are underrepresented.
12	"(C) Establishing or enhancing a program
13	of teacher education designed to qualify stu-
14	dents to teach in a public elementary school or
15	secondary school in the State that shall include,
16	as part of such program, preparation for teach-
17	er certification or licensure.
18	"(D) Establishing community outreach
19	programs that will encourage elementary school
20	and secondary school students to develop the
21	academic skills and the interest to pursue post-
22	secondary education.
23	"(E) Establishing or increasing an endow-
24	ment fund in accordance with paragraph (3).

1	"(F) Other activities proposed in the appli-
2	cation submitted pursuant to subsection (f)
3	that—
4	"(i) contribute to carrying out the
5	purpose of this section; and
6	"(ii) are approved by the Secretary as
7	part of the review and approval of an ap-
8	plication submitted under subsection (f).
9	"(3) Endowment fund.—
10	"(A) In General.—A Predominantly
11	Black Institution may use not more than 20
12	percent of the grant funds provided under this
13	section to establish or increase an endowment
14	fund at the institution.
15	"(B) MATCHING REQUIREMENT.—In order
16	to be eligible to use grant funds in accordance
17	with subparagraph (A), a Predominantly Black
18	Institution shall provide matching funds from
19	non-Federal sources, in an amount equal to or
20	greater than the Federal funds used in accord-
21	ance with subparagraph (A), for the establish-
22	ment or increase of the endowment fund.
23	"(C) Comparability.—The provisions of
24	part C of title III, regarding the establishment
25	or increase of an endowment fund, that the

Secretary determines are not inconsistent with this subsection, shall apply to funds used under subparagraph (A).

"(4) LIMITATION.—Not more than 50 percent of the grant funds provided to a Predominantly Black Institution under this section may be available for the purpose of constructing or maintaining a classroom, library, laboratory, or other instructional facility.

10 "(e) Allotments to Predominantly Black In-11 stitutions.—

"(1) Federal Pell Grant Basis.—From the amounts appropriated to carry out this section for any fiscal year, the Secretary shall allot to each Predominantly Black Institution having an application approved under subsection (f) a sum that bears the same ratio to one-half of that amount as the number of Federal Pell Grant recipients in attendance at such institution at the end of the academic year preceding the beginning of that fiscal year, bears to the total number of Federal Pell Grant recipients at all such institutions at the end of such academic year.

"(2) GRADUATES BASIS.—From the amounts appropriated to carry out this section for any fiscal year, the Secretary shall allot to each Predominantly

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Black Institution having an application approved under subsection (f) a sum that bears the same ratio to one-fourth of that amount as the number of graduates for such academic year at such institution, bears to the total number of graduates for such academic year at all such institutions.

"(3) Graduates seeking a higher degree Basis.—From the amounts appropriated to carry out this section for any fiscal year, the Secretary shall allot to each Predominantly Black Institution having an application approved under subsection (f) a sum that bears the same ratio to one-fourth of that amount as the percentage of graduates from such institution who are admitted to and in attendance at, not later than 2 years after graduation with an associate's degree or a baccalaureate degree, a baccalaureate degree-granting institution or a graduate or professional school in a degree program in disciplines in which African-American students are underrepresented, bears to the percentage of such graduates for all such institutions.

"(4) MINIMUM ALLOTMENT.—

"(A) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding paragraphs (1), (2), and (3), the amount allotted to each Predominantly Black Institution

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under this section shall not be less than \$250,000.

"(B) Insufficient AMOUNT.—If the appropriated pursuant amount to section 399(a)(1)(D) for a fiscal year is not sufficient to pay the minimum allotment provided under subparagraph (A) for the fiscal year, then the amount of such minimum allotment shall be ratably reduced. If additional sums become available for such fiscal year, such reduced allotment shall be increased on the same basis as the allotment was reduced until the amount allotted equals the minimum allotment required under subparagraph (A).

"(5) REALLOTMENT.—The amount of a Predominantly Black Institution's allotment under paragraph (1), (2), (3), or (4) for any fiscal year that the Secretary determines will not be required for such institution for the period such allotment is available, shall be available for reallotment to other Predominantly Black Institutions in proportion to the original allotment to such other institutions under this section for such fiscal year. The Secretary shall reallot such amounts from time to time, on

- 1 such date and during such period as the Secretary
- 2 determines appropriate.
- 3 "(f) APPLICATIONS.—Each Predominantly Black In-
- 4 stitution desiring a grant under this section shall submit
- 5 an application to the Secretary at such time, in such man-
- 6 ner, and containing or accompanied by such information
- 7 as the Secretary may reasonably require.
- 8 "(g) Prohibition.—No Predominantly Black Insti-
- 9 tution that applies for and receives a grant under this sec-
- 10 tion may apply for or receive funds under any other pro-
- 11 gram under part A or part B of title III.
- 12 "(h) Duration and Carryover.—Any grant funds
- 13 paid to a Predominantly Black Institution under this sec-
- 14 tion that are not expended or used for the purposes for
- 15 which the funds were paid within 10 years following the
- 16 date on which the grant was awarded, shall be repaid to
- 17 the Treasury.
- 18 "(i) APPLICABILITY OF PART F.—Part F, other than
- 19 section 399, shall not apply to this section.".
- 20 (b) Authorization of Appropriations.—Section
- 21 399(a)(1) of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.
- 22 1068h(a)(1)) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
- 23 lowing new subparagraph:
- 24 "(D) There are authorized to be appropriated
- to carry out section 318 such sums as may be nec-

- 1 essary for fiscal year 2008 and each of the 5 suc-
- 2 ceeding fiscal years.".

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
