## A BILL

- To enhance citizen access to Government information and services by establishing plain language as the standard style of Government documents issued to the public, and for other purposes.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Plain Language in3 Government Communications Act of 2007".

#### 4 SEC. 2. PURPOSE.

5 The purpose of this Act is to improve the effective6 ness and accountability of Federal agencies to the public
7 by promoting clear Government communication that the
8 public can understand and use.

#### 9 SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.

10 In this Act:

(1) AGENCY.—The term "agency" means an
Executive agency, as defined under section 105 of
title 5, United States Code.

14 (2) COVERED DOCUMENT.—The term "covered
15 document"—

16 (A) means any document (other than a
17 regulation) issued by an agency to the public
18 that—

19(i) provides information about any20Federal Government requirement or pro-21gram; or

(ii) is relevant to obtaining any Federal Government benefit or service; and
(B) includes a letter, publication, form, notice, or instruction.

1 (3) PLAIN LANGUAGE.—The term "plain lan-2 guage" means language that the intended audience 3 can readily understand and use because that lan-4 guage is clear, concise, well-organized, and follows 5 other best practices of plain language writing.

#### 6 SEC. 4. RESPONSIBILITIES OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.

7 (a) REQUIREMENT TO USE PLAIN LANGUAGE IN 8 NEW DOCUMENTS.—Not later than 1 year after the date 9 of enactment of this Act, each agency shall use plain lan-10 guage in any covered document of the agency issued or 11 substantially revised after the date of enactment of this 12 Act.

13 (b) GUIDANCE.—

14 (1) IN GENERAL.—

(A) DEVELOPMENT.—Not later than 6
months after the date of enactment of this Act,
the Office of Management and Budget shall develop guidance on implementing the requirements of subsection (a).

20 (B) ISSUANCE.—The Office of Manage21 ment and Budget shall issue the guidance de22 veloped under subpargraph (A) to agencies as a
23 circular.

| 13 | (a) INITIAL REPORT.—Not later than 6 months after          |
| 14 | the date of enactment of this Act, the head of each agency |
| 15 | shall submit to the Committee on Homeland Security and     |
| 16 | Governmental Affairs of the Senate and the Committee       |
| 17 | on Oversight and Government Reform of the House of         |
| 18 | Representatives a report that describes how the agency in- |
| 19 | tends to meet the following objectives:                    |

| 22 | (2) Training agency employees to write in plain            |
