A BILL

To provide assistance for the Museum of the History of Polish Jews in Warsaw, Poland.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Support for the Mu-
- 5 seum of the History of Polish Jews Act of 2008".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:
- 8 (1) Current and future generations benefit
- 9 greatly by visible reminders and documentation of
- the historical and cultural roots of their society.

- 1 (2) It is in the national interest of the United 2 States to encourage the preservation and protection 3 of artifacts associated with the heritage of United 4 States citizens who trace their forbearers to other 5 countries and to encourage the collection and dis-6 semination of knowledge about that heritage.
 - (3) According to the 2000 United States Census, nearly 9,000,000 Americans are of Polish ancestry.
 - (4) At the beginning of World War II, Poland had the largest Jewish population in Europe.
 - (5) In 1996, Yeshayahu Weinberg, a founding director of Tel Aviv's Diaspora Museum and the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, created an international team of experts with the goal of establishing a Museum of the History of Polish Jews.
 - (6) The Museum of the History of Polish Jews will preserve and present the history of the Jewish people in Poland and the wealth of their culture spanning a period of 1,000 years.
 - (7) In 1997, the City of Warsaw donated a parcel of land, opposite the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising Memorial, for the explicit use for the Museum of the History of Polish Jews.

1	(8) In 2005, the Government of Poland and the
2	City of Warsaw agreed to provide 40,000,000 Polish
3	zlotys for the construction of the Museum of the
4	History of Polish Jews.
5	(9) In 2005, an international architectural com-
6	petition selected a Finnish firm to design the build-
7	ing for the Museum of the History of Polish Jews.
8	(10) In 2006, the building for the Museum of
9	the History of Polish Jews moved into the last phase
10	of project design.
11	SEC. 3. ASSISTANCE FOR THE MUSEUM OF THE HISTORY
12	OF POLISH JEWS.
13	From funds available to the Secretary of State for
14	assistance under the Support for East European Democ-
15	racy (SEED) Act (22 U.S.C. 5401 et seq.), the Secretary
16	may provide up to \$5,000,000 in assistance to fund the
17	establishment of, and maintain the permanent collection
