CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

Expressing the sense of Congress that a commemorative postage stamp should be issued to honor America's barbers.

- Whereas the barbering profession has a rich and honorable history and symbolizes the first legalized profession and licensed trade in the United States;
- Whereas barber shops were the meeting places of American grassroots before city halls existed, functioning as centers where daily news and small talk were exchanged;
- Whereas barber shops have made lasting contributions to our Nation's culture and are located in every community across our great Nation;
- Whereas issuing a stamp honoring the barbering profession would commemorate a true American tradition; and

Whereas the National Association of Barber Boards of America has worked for nearly two decades, in hopes of making this stamp a reality: Now, therefore, be it

- 2 concurring), That it is the sense of the Congress that—
- 3 (1) a commemorative postage stamp should be
- 4 issued by the United States Postal Service to honor
- 5 America's barbers; and
- 6 (2) the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee
- 7 should recommend to the Postmaster General that
- 8 such a postage stamp be issued.
