## A BILL

To direct the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a resource study along the "Ox-Bow Route" of the Butterfield Overland Trail in the States of Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Butterfield Overland
- 5 Trail Study Act".

### 2 SEC. 2. RESOURCE STUDY OF THE BUTTERFIELD OVER-2 LAND TRAIL. 3 (a) In General.—The Secretary of the Interior (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Secretary"), in 4 5 consultation with appropriate Federal, State, county and local governmental entities, shall conduct a resource study 6 7 along the "Ox-Bow Route" of the Butterfield Overland 8 Trail in the States of Missouri, Tennessee, Arkansas, 9 Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "trail area"). The 10 11 study shall evaluate a range of alternatives for protecting 12 and interpreting the resources of the trail area, including 13 alternatives for potential addition of the trail area to the National Trails System. 15 (b) STUDY OBJECTIVES.—In conducting the study under subsection (a), the Secretary shall evaluate alternatives for achieving the following objectives: 17 18 and historic Identifying the resources 19 themes associated with the trail area. 20 (2) Making a review of existing studies and re-21

- (2) Making a review of existing studies and reports to complement, and not duplicate, other studies of the scenic or historical importance of the Butterfield Overland Trail and associated resources that may be underway or undertaken.
- (3) Establishing connections with partnerships
   already engaged in the development of various trails

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- and sites along the corridor of the Butterfield Overland Trail.
  - (4) Preserving recreational opportunities and facilitating access for a variety of recreational users.
    - (5) Protecting historically significant landscapes, districts, sites, and structures of the trail area.
      - (6) Identifying alternatives for preservation and interpretation of the trail area by the National Park Service, other Federal, State, or local governmental entities, or private and non-profit organizations.
- 12 (7) Identifying cost estimates for any necessary 13 acquisition, development, interpretation, operation, 14 and maintenance associated with the alternatives re-15 ferred to in subsection (a).
- 16 (c) Transmission to Congress.—Not later than 3
  17 years after funds are first made available for the study,
- 18 the Secretary shall transmit the final study to the Com-
- 19 mittee on Energy and Natural Resources of the United
- 20 States Senate and to the Committee on Natural Resources
- 21 of the United States House of Representatives.
- 22 SEC. 3. PRIVATE PROPERTY PROTECTIONS.
- 23 (a) Alternatives To Protect Private Prop-
- 24 ERTY.—In conducting the resource study under section

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1	2(a), the Secretary shall not consider any alternative that
2	would—
3	(1) require any private property owner to allow
4	public access (including Federal, State, or local gov-
5	ernment access) to such private property;
6	(2) modify any provision of Federal, State, or
7	local law with regard to public access to or use of
8	private property;
9	(3) create any liability, or have any effect on
10	any liability under any other law, of any private
11	property owner with respect to any persons injured
12	on such private property;
13	(4) modify the authority of Federal, State, or
14	local governments to regulate land use; or
15	(5) require the owner of any private property to
16	participate in or be associated with any addition to
17	the National Parks System.
18	(b) Impacts on Private Property.—The study
19	shall include an analysis and documentation regarding
20	whether each alternative proposed has potential or actual
21	impact on private property located within or abutting the

22 trail area.
