## **AN ACT**

- To direct the Secretary of the Interior to carry out a study to determine the suitability and feasibility of establishing Camp Hale as a unit of the National Park System.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be eited as the "Camp Hale Study 5 Act".

1	SEC. 2. SPECIAL RESOURCE STUDY OF THE SUITABILITY
2	AND FEASIBILITY OF ESTABLISHING CAMP
3	HALE AS A UNIT OF THE NATIONAL PARK
4	SYSTEM.
5	(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of the Interior, act-
6	ing through the Director of the National Park Service
7	(hereinafter referred to as the "Secretary"), shall com-
8	plete a special resource study of Camp Hale to deter-
9	mine—
10	(1) the suitability and feasibility of designating
11	Camp Hale as a separate unit of the National Park
12	<del>System;</del> and
13	(2) the methods and means for the protection
14	and interpretation of Camp Hale by the National
15	Park Service, other Federal, State, or local govern-
16	ment entities or private or nonprofit organizations.
17	(b) Study Requirements.—The Secretary shall
18	conduct the study in accordance with section 8(c) of Pub-
19	<del>lic Law 91–383 (16 U.S.C. 1a–5(c)).</del>

(e) REPORT.—Not later than 3 years after the date
on which funds are made available to carry out this Act,
the Secretary shall submit to the Committee on Natural
Resources of the House of Representatives and the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate
a report containing—

(1) the results of the study; and

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1	(2) any recommendations of the Secretary.
2	SEC. 3. EFFECT OF STUDY.
3	Nothing in this Act shall affect valid existing rights,
4	including—
5	(1) all interstate water compacts in existence on
6	the date of the enactment of this Act (including full
7	development of any apportionment made in accord-
8	ance with the compacts);
9	(2) water rights decreed at the Camp Hale site
10	or flowing within, below, or through the Camp Hale
11	<del>site;</del>
12	(3) water rights in the State of Colorado;
13	(4) water rights held by the United States; and
14	(5) the management and operation of any res-
15	ervoir, including the storage, management, release,
16	or transportation of water.
17	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
18	This Act may be cited as the "Camp Hale Study Act".
19	SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
20	In this Act:
21	(1) CAMP HALE.—The term "Camp Hale" means
22	the area comprising approximately 200,000 acres on
23	the White River and San Isabel National Forests in
24	west-central Colorado located within portions of
25	Eagle, Lake, Pitkin, and Summit counties.

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1	(2) Secretaries.—The term "Secretaries"
2	means the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary
3	of Agriculture, acting jointly.
4	SEC. 3. SPECIAL RESOURCE STUDY.
5	(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretaries shall conduct a
6	study of Camp Hale to determine—
7	(1) the suitability and feasibility of designating
8	Camp Hale as a unit of the National Park System,
9	in accordance with section 8(c) of Public Law 91–383
10	(16 U.S.C. 1a-5(c)); or
11	(2) any other designation or management option
12	that would provide for the protection of resources
13	within Camp Hale, including continued management
14	of Camp Hale by the Forest Service.
15	(b) REQUIRED ANALYSIS.—The study under subsection
16	(a) shall include an analysis of—
17	(1) the significance of Camp Hale in relation to
18	national security during World War II and the Cold
19	War, including—
20	(A) the use of Camp Hale for training of
21	the 10th Mountain Division and other elements
22	of the United States Armed Forces; and
23	(B) the use of Camp Hale for training by
24	the Central Intelligence Agency of Tibetan refu-

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1	gees seeking to resist the Chinese occupation of
2	Tibet;
3	(2) opportunities for public enjoyment and recre-
4	ation at Camp Hale; and
5	(3) any operational, management, or private
6	property issues relating to Camp Hale.
7	(c) Congressional Intent.—It is the intent of Con-
8	gress that, in conducting the study under subsection (a),
9	the Secretaries not propose any designation that would af-
10	fect valid existing rights, including—
11	(1) all interstate water compacts in existence on
12	the date of enactment of this Act (including full devel-
13	opment of any apportionment made in accordance
14	with the compacts);
15	(2) water rights—
16	(A) decreed at Camp Hale; or
17	(B) flowing within, below, or through Camp
18	Hale;
19	(3) water rights in the State of Colorado;
20	(4) water rights held by the United States; and
21	(5) the management and operation of any res-
22	ervoir, including the storage, management, release, or
23	transportation of water.

1 SEC. 4. REPORT.

Not later than 3 years after the date on which funds
are made to available to carry out this Act, the Secretaries
shall submit to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources of the Senate and the Committee on Natural Resources of the House of Representatives—
(1) the study conducted under section 3; and

### 10 SEC. 5. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

11 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums as12 are necessary to carry out this Act.

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
