To require a site operator of an international travel Web site to provide information on its Web site to consumers regarding the potential health and safety risks associated with overseas vacation destinations marketed on its Web site.

Mr. Markey of Massachusetts introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce

## A BILL

- To require a site operator of an international travel Web site to provide information on its Web site to consumers regarding the potential health and safety risks associated with overseas vacation destinations marketed on its Web site.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
  - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
  - 4 This Act may be cited as the "International Travelers
  - 5 Bill of Rights Act of 2009".
  - 6 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
  - 7 In this Act:

- 1 (1) SITE OPERATOR.—The term "site operator"
  2 means an individual or entity that operates a Web
  3 site that provides access to international travel serv4 ices. Such term includes an overseas vacation des5 tination or a third party that operates a Web site
  6 that offers international travel services.
  - (2) Commission.—The term "Commission" means the Federal Trade Commission.
  - (3) International travel services.—The term "international travel services" means a service that a consumer can use to reserve lodging at an overseas vacation destination.
  - (4) Overseas vacation destination.—The term "overseas vacation destination" means a resort, hotel, retreat, hostel, or any other similar lodging outside the United States.
  - (5) UNITED STATES.—The term "United States" means each of the several States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

1	SEC. 3. PROVIDING INFORMATION REGARDING THE POTEN
2	TIAL HEALTH AND SAFETY RISKS ASSOCI
3	ATED WITH OVERSEAS VACATION DESTINA
4	TIONS.
5	(a) In General.—A site operator, in a manner in
6	compliance with regulations issued by the Commission and
7	with the requirements of this Act, shall provide informa-
8	tion on its Web site to consumers in a clear and con-
9	spicuous manner regarding the potential health and safety
10	risks associated with overseas vacation destinations mar-
11	keted on its Web site, if any, including the following:
12	(1) Information compiled by the Department of
13	State, including Department of State country-spe-
14	cific travel warnings and alerts.
15	(2) Information regarding the onsite health and
16	safety services that are available to consumers at
17	each overseas vacation destination, including wheth-
18	er the destination—
19	(A) employs or contracts with a physician
20	or nurse on the premises to provide medical
21	treatment for guests;
22	(B) employs or contracts with personnel
23	other than a physician, nurse, or lifeguard, or
24	the premises who are trained in
25	eardionulmonary regugaitation.

- 1 (C) has an automated external defibrillator 2 and employs or contracts with 1 or more indi-3 viduals on the premises trained in its use; and
  - (D) employs or contracts with 1 or more lifeguards on the premises trained in cardiopulmonary resuscitation, if the overseas vacation destination has swimming pools or other water-based activities on its premises, or in areas under its control for use by guests.
- 10 (b) SERVICES NOT AVAILABLE 24 HOURS A DAY.—
  11 If the onsite health and safety services at an overseas va12 cation destination are not available 24 hours a day, 7 days
  13 a week, the site operator shall display the hours and days
  14 of availability on its Web site in a clear and conspicuous
  15 manner.
- 16 (c) Information Not Available.—If the onsite health and safety services described in subsection (a)(2) are not available at an overseas vacation destination, or 18 19 if the site operator does not possess information on the 20 onsite health and safety services required to be displayed 21 on its Web site, the site operator shall display in a clear 22 and conspicuous manner the following: "This destination 23 does not provide certain health and safety services, or information regarding such services is not available. Travel

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- 1 to this destination may pose an increased risk to your
- 2 health or safety.".

### 3 SEC. 4. CONSUMER COMPLAINTS.

- 4 (a) Suspension.—A site operator shall establish a
- 5 process under which an overseas vacation destination will
- 6 be suspended from its Web site as a result of complaints
- 7 from consumers to the site operator regarding poor med-
- 8 ical care, unsafe or unsanitary facilities, or other health-
- 9 related issues with respect to such destination.
- 10 (b) Public Availability.—A site operator shall
- 11 make all complaints submitted by consumers publicly
- 12 available on its Web site and may modify the contents of
- 13 such complaints at the request of the complainant or may
- 14 remove offensive language and personal identification in-
- 15 formation.

#### 16 SEC. 5. ENFORCEMENT.

- 17 (a) IN GENERAL.—A violation of any provision of this
- 18 Act shall be treated as a violation of a rule defining an
- 19 unfair or deceptive act or practice prescribed under section
- 20 18(a)(1)(B) of the Federal Trade Commission Act (15
- 21 U.S.C. 57a(a)(1)(B)). The Commission shall enforce this
- 22 Act in the same manner, by the same means, and with
- 23 the same jurisdiction as though all applicable terms and
- 24 provisions of the Federal Trade Commission Act were in-
- 25 corporated into and made a part of this Act.

- 1 (b) Deadline for Issuance of Regulations.—
- 2 The Commission shall issue regulations to carry out this
- 3 Act not later than 6 months after the date of the enact-

4 ment of this Act.

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
