A BILL

To require the Secretary of Homeland Security to develop and implement a mitigation plan to address the ecological impacts of border security measures and activities, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Healthy Borderlands
- 5 Act of 2009".

1 SEC. 2. MITIGATION PLAN.

2	(a) In General.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-
3	rity, in consultation with the Secretary of the Interior, the
4	Secretary of Agriculture, and the heads of appropriate
5	State and tribal wildlife agencies and entities, shall de-
6	velop and implement a comprehensive mitigation plan (in
7	this section referred to as the "mitigation plan") to ad-
8	dress the ecological and environmental impacts of border
9	security infrastructure, measures, and activities along the
10	international land borders of the United States.
11	(b) Requirements.—The mitigation plan required
12	under subsection (a) shall include measures to address and
13	mitigate the full range of ecological and environmental im-
14	pacts of border security infrastructure, measures, and ac-
15	tivities, including—
16	(1) preserving, maintaining, and, if necessary,
17	restoring wildlife migration corridors, key habitats,

- restoring wildlife migration corridors, key habitats, and the ecologically functional connectivity between and among key habitats sufficient to ensure that species (whether or not designated as rare, protected, or of concern) remain viable and are able to adapt to the impacts of climate change;
- (2) addressing control of invasive species and implementing measures necessary to avoid the spread of such species;

- 1 (3) maintaining hydrological functionality, in-2 cluding water quantity and quality;
- (4) incorporating adaptive management, includ ing detailed provisions for long-term monitoring of
 the mitigation plan's effectiveness and for necessary
 adjustments to such plan based on such monitoring
 results; and
- 8 (5) protection of cultural and historical resources.

(c) Preemption.—

- (1) In General.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Secretary of Homeland Security may, subject to paragraph (2), carry out the mitigation plan on any Federal, State, private, or tribal lands regardless of which individual, agency, or entity has principal responsibility for the management of any such lands.
- (2) Conditions.—Activities carried out under paragraph (1) in connection with the mitigation plan shall be carried out in full consultation with, and with the concurrence of, the owner of, or entity with principal responsibility for, the management of the lands described in such paragraph.

1	(1) Authorization.—The Secretary of Home-
2	land Security may transfer funds of the Department
3	of Homeland Security to other Federal agencies
4	for—
5	(A) expenditure under programs of such
6	agencies that are designed to fund conservation
7	related activities on non-Federal lands, includ-
8	ing land acquisition programs; and
9	(B) mitigation activities on Federal lands
10	managed by such agencies, if such activities are
11	required to implement the mitigation plan and
12	if the costs of such activities are above the costs
13	associated with managing such lands in the ab-
14	sence of such activities.
15	(2) Acceptance and use of donations.—
16	The Secretary of Homeland Security may accept and
17	use donations for the purpose of developing and im-
18	plementing the mitigation plan, and may transfer
19	such funds to any other Federal agency for expendi-
20	ture under such plan pursuant to the authorization

QUIREMENTS.—Funds transferred pursuant to the

authorization under paragraph (1), including dona-

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- tions under paragraph (2), shall not be subject to reprogramming requirements.
- 3 (4) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.— Notwithstanding 4 any other provision of law, amounts authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-5 retary of Homeland Security for border security in-6 frastructure and activities may be used by the Sec-7 8 retary to develop and implement the mitigation plan.

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
