## A BILL

To enhance the reporting requirements on the status of the Arab League trade boycott of Israel and other trade boycotts of Israel.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.
- 4 Congress finds the following:
- 5 (1) The Arab League's trade boycott of the
- 6 State of Israel is inconsistent with World Trade Or-
- 7 ganization's (WTO) principle of nondiscrimination.

- 1 (2) Trade boycotts of the State of Israel are a 2 barrier to better relations between Israel and nations 3 of the Arab League.
  - (3) It has been the long-standing policy of the United States to oppose the enforcement of trade boycotts of Israel.
  - (4) Many members of the World Trade Organization continue to enforce the primary trade boycott of the State of Israel. Other WTO members continue to enforce the secondary and tertiary trade boycott of the State of Israel.
  - (5) Taxpayers are required to report requests to participate in or cooperate with an international boycott. Section 999 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 requires the Secretary of the Treasury to keep a list of countries which require or may require participation in, or cooperation with, a trade boycott of Israel. Currently, the list of countries which require or may require participation in a trade boycott of Israel includes Kuwait, Lebanon, Libya, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Syria, the United Arab Emirates, and the Republic of Yemen.
  - (6) In 2005, during negotiations for the accession of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia to the World Trade Organization (WTO), the United States re-

- ceived assurances from the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia that, upon accession, "WTO rules will apply between Saudi Arabia and all current members" which includes Israel. Further, the United States received assurances that "Saudi Arabia is legally obligated to provide most-favored nation treatment to all WTO Members, including Israel. Any government sanctioned activity on the Boycott [of Israel] would be a violation of Saudi Arabia's obligations and subject to dispute settlement. This legal obligation cannot be changed."
  - (7) The United States Trade Representative reports annually on the Arab League's trade boycott of Israel under the National Trade Estimate report but that reporting on trade boycotts of Israel can be improved through additional reporting requirements.
  - (8) Greater transparency and more comprehensive reporting will assist United States taxpayers in complying with United States law and policy regarding trade boycotts of Israel.
  - (9) Improved reporting will enhance efforts to end all trade boycotts of Israel and allow progress on ending such boycotts to be better measured.
  - (10) Taking steps to improve transparency with respect to the boycott of Israel can serve the United

1	States goal of the elimination of the trade boycott of
2	Israel. Fostering increased trade and investment ties
3	between Israel and the countries of the greater Mid-
4	dle East can encourage stronger ties and greater un-
5	derstanding among the peoples of the Middle East.
6	SEC. 2. STATEMENT OF POLICY.
7	Congress reaffirms its opposition to trade boycotts of
8	Israel and calls on the President to take stronger steps
9	to end all trade boycotts of Israel.
10	SEC. 3. NATIONAL TRADE ESTIMATE REPORTING REQUIRE-
11	MENT.
12	Section 181(b) of the Trade Act of 1974 (19 U.S.C.
13	2241(b)) is amended by adding at the end the following:
14	"(4) Report on the boycott of Israel.—
15	"(A) IN GENERAL.—The United States
16	Trade Representative shall include in each re-
17	port submitted under paragraph (1) a list of
18	each country that participates in any trade boy-
19	cott of Israel. With respect to each country
20	identified as participating in a formal or infor-
21	mal trade boycott of the State of Israel, the
22	United States Trade Representative shall report
23	on a country-specific basis the following:
24	"(i) Whether the country is a partici-
25	pant in the Arab League boycott or any

1	other boycott of Israel including any boy-
2	cott sponsored by the Arab League or the
3	Organization of Islamic Conference.
4	"(ii) Whether any officials of the boy-
5	cotting country have attended any Arab
6	League or Organization of the Islamic
7	Conference boycott meetings in any official
8	or unofficial capacity during the year pre-
9	ceding the submission of the report.
10	"(iii) Whether the boycotting country
11	maintains a government office with respon-
12	sibility for enforcement of a boycott of
13	Israel.
14	"(iv) Whether the boycotting country
15	has laws enforcing a boycott of Israel or
16	otherwise prohibiting Israeli origin goods
17	from entering its territories and a sum-
18	mary of those laws.
19	"(v) Whether the boycotting country
20	has recently changed its domestic boycott
21	laws or regulations with respect to either
22	strengthening or eliminating the boycott.
23	"(vi) Whether a country's laws or
24	practices with respect to a boycott of Israel
25	are of a nature that they may lead a tax-

1	payer to reasonably conclude that the tax-
2	payer would be required to report a re-
3	quest to participate in or cooperate with
4	the boycott to the Secretary of the Treas-
5	ury pursuant to section 999 of the Internal
6	Revenue Code of 1986.
7	"(vii) Whether a country encourages
8	or otherwise condones, through govern-
9	ment-sponsored actions, an unofficial boy-
10	cott of goods of Israeli origin, including
11	consumer marketing campaigns directed
12	against the purchase of goods of Israeli or-
13	igin.
14	"(viii) Whether a country's formal or
15	informal boycott practices have had an
16	identifiable impact on United States ex-
17	ports of goods that have Israeli content.
18	"(ix) Whether a country's formal or
19	informal boycott practices have had an
20	identifiable impact on United States busi-
21	nesses with operations or investments in
22	Israel.
23	"(B) OTHER INFORMATION.—The United
24	States Trade Representative shall include in the
25	National Trade Estimate a report on any steps

1	taken by the United States at the World Trade
2	Organization or other international fora to end
3	the trade boycott of the State of Israel.".
