A BILL

- To authorize the President to reestablish the Civilian Conservation Corps as a means of providing gainful employment to unemployed and underemployed citizens of the United States through the performance of useful public work, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "21st Century Civilian
- 5 Conservation Corps Act".

1SEC. 2. ESTABLISHMENT AND OPERATION OF CIVILIAN2CONSERVATION CORPS.

3 (a) ESTABLISHMENT AND PURPOSE.—In order to relieve the acute condition of widespread distress and unem-4 5 ployment existing in the United States and to provide for the restoration of depleted natural resources in the United 6 7 States and the advancement of an orderly program of use-8 ful public works, the President may establish and operate 9 a Civilian Conservation Corps to employ citizens of the 10 United States, who are otherwise unemployed or under-11 employed, in the construction, maintenance, and carrying on of works of a public nature in connection with-12

13 (1) the forestation of lands belonging to the14 United States or a State;

15 (2) the prevention of forest fires, floods, and16 soil erosion;

17 (3) plant pest and disease control;

(4) the construction, maintenance, or repair of
paths, trails, and fire-lanes in units of the National
Park System, public lands, and other lands under
the jurisdiction of the Secretary of the Interior and
units of the National Forest System; and

(5) such other work on Federal or State land
incidental to or necessary in connection with any
projects of the character enumerated in paragraphs

(1) through (4) that the President determines to be
 desirable.

3 (b) ROLE OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—To operate the 4 Civilian Conservation Corps, the President may utilize ex-5 isting Federal departments and agencies, including the Department of Labor, the Department of Defense, the 6 7 National Guard Bureau, the Department of Interior, the 8 Department of Agriculture, the Army Corps of Engineers, 9 the Department of Transportation, the Department of En-10 ergy, the Environmental Protection Agency, and Federal 11 governmental corporations.

12 (c) INCLUSION OF OTHER LANDS.—The President 13 may extend the activities of the Civilian Conservation Corps to lands owned by a political subdivision of a State 14 15 and lands in private ownership, but only for the purpose of conducting such kinds of cooperation work as are other-16 17 wise authorized by law in preventing and controlling forest fires and the attacks of forest tree pests and diseases and 18 19 such work as is necessary and in the public interest to 20 control floods.

(d) CONTRACT AUTHORITY.—For the purpose of carrying out this Act the President may enter into such contracts or agreements with States as may be necessary, including provisions for utilization of existing State administrative agencies.

(e) ACQUISITION OF REAL PROPERTY.—The Presi dent, or the head of any department or agency authorized
 by the President to construct any project or to carry on
 any public works under this Act, may acquire real prop erty for such project or public work by purchase, donation,
 condemnation, or otherwise.

7 SEC. 3. ADMINISTRATION OF CIVILIAN CONSERVATION 8 CORPS.

9 (a) HOUSING AND CARE OF EMPLOYEES.—The 10 President may provide housing for persons employed in 11 the Civilian Conservation Corps and furnish them with 12 such subsistence, clothing, medical attendance and hos-13 pitalization, and cash allowance, as may be necessary, dur-14 ing the period they are so employed.

15 (b) TRANSPORTATION.—The President may provide for the transportation of persons employed in the Civilian 16 Conservation Corps to and from the places of employment. 17 18 (c) NON-DISCRIMINATION.—In employing citizens for the Civilian Conservation Corps, no discrimination shall 19 20 occur in accordance with Federal employment law; except 21 that no individual under conviction for crime and serving 22 sentence therefore shall be employed under the provisions 23 of this Act.

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1 SEC. 4. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

2 (a) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
3 are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this Act
4 \$16,000,000,000 for each fiscal years 2010 through 2013.

5 (b) USE OF UNOBLIGATED FUNDS APPROPRIATED6 FOR PUBLIC WORKS.—

7 (1) USE OF EXISTING FUNDS.—The President
8 may use any moneys previously appropriated for
9 public works and unobligated as of the date of the
10 enactment of this Act to establish and operate a Ci11 vilian Conservation Corps under this Act.

(2) USE TO RELIEVE UNEMPLOYMENT.—Not
less than 80 percent of the funds utilized pursuant
to paragraph (1) must be used to provide for the
employment of individuals under this Act.

16 (3) EXCEPTIONS.—Paragraph (1) does not
17 apply to—

(A) unobligated moneys appropriated for
public works on which actual construction has
been commenced as of the date of the enactment of this Act or may be commenced within
90 days after that date; and

(B) maintenance funds for river and harbor improvements already allocated as of the
date of the enactment of this Act.

(c) DURATION OF AVAILABILITY.—Amounts appro priated pursuant to the authorization of appropriations in
 subsection (a) or made available under subsection (b) shall
 remain available until expended.

5 SEC. 5. TERMINATION.

6 The authority of the President to establish and oper-7 ate a Civilian Conservation Corps under this Act expires8 on September 30, 2013.

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
