Mr. YOUNG of Alaska introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Natural Resources

### A BILL

To establish a Native American Economic Advisory Council, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Native American Eco-

5 nomic Advisory Council Act of 2010".

#### 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds—

8 (1) the United States has a special political and9 legal relationship and responsibility to promote the

welfare of the Native American people of the United
 States;

(2) evaluations of indicators and criteria of so-3 4 cial well-being, education, health, unemployment, 5 housing, income, rates of poverty, justice systems, 6 and nutrition by agencies of Government and others 7 have consistently found that Native American com-8 munities rank below other groups of United States 9 citizens and many are at or near the bottom in those 10 evaluations;

(3) Native Americans, like other people in the
United States, have been hit hard by the deepest recession of the United States economy in over 50
years, causing a significant decline in employment
and economic activity across the United States;

16 (4) Native American communities have been de17 scribed as "emerging economies" and consequently
18 have been stalled in the efforts of the communities
19 to build sustainable growing economies for the peo20 ple of the communities and are being adversely af21 fected faster than the rest of the United States;

(5) economic stimulus programs to help Native
American communities generate jobs and stronger
economic performance will require United States financial and tax incentives to increase both local and

expanded investment that is tailored to the unique
 needs and circumstances of Native American com munities;

4 (6) the impacts of the ongoing recession and
5 the near collapse of the financial and banking sys6 tems require a review of assumptions about the fu7 ture, the need for new growth strategies, and a focus
8 on laying the groundwork for economic success in
9 the 21st century;

10 (7) there is a continuing need for direct eco-11 nomic stimulus, including needs for improving rural 12 infrastructure and alternative energy in rural and 13 Native American communities of the United States 14 and providing Native Americans leaders with the 15 tools to create jobs and improve economic conditions;

16 (8) in light of the role of Native American com-17 munities as emerging markets within the United 18 States, there are opportunities and needs that 19 should be addressed, including consideration of 20 United States support for the pooling of resources to 21 create an Indigenous Sovereign Wealth Fund that is 22 similar to those Funds created around the world to 23 diversify revenue streams, attract more resources, 24 invest more wisely, and create jobs;

(9) Native Americans should be participants
 when major economic decisions are made that affect
 the property, lives, and future of Native Americans;
 and

5 (10) Native Americans should fully participate
6 in rebuilding Native American communities and have
7 necessary tools and resources.

#### 8 SEC. 3. PURPOSE.

9 The purpose of this Act is to authorize and establish 10 a Native American Economic Advisory Council to consult, 11 coordinate with, and make recommendations to the Execu-12 tive Office of the President, Cabinet officers, and Federal 13 agencies—

(1) to improve the focus, effectiveness, and delivery of Federal economic aid and development programs to Native Americans and, as a result, improve
substandard economic conditions in Native American
communities;

(2) to build and expand on the capacity of leaders in Native American organizations and communities to take positive and innovative steps—

22 (A) to create jobs;

23 (B) to establish stable and profitable busi24 ness enterprises;

25 (C) to enhance economic conditions; and

1	(D) to use Native American-owned re-	
2	sources for the benefit of members; and	
3	(3) to achieve the long-term goal of improving	
4	the quality of Native American life and living condi-	
5	5 tions and access to basic public services to the levels	
6	6 enjoyed by the average citizen and community of the	
7	United States by the year 2025.	
8	8 SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIVE AMERICAN ECONOMIC	
9	ADVISORY COUNCIL.	
10	(a) IN GENERAL.—There is established a Native	
11	American Economic Advisory Council (referred to in this	
12	Act as the "Council") to advise and assist the Executive	
13	Office of the President and Federal agencies to ensure	
14	that Native Americans (including Native American mem-	
15	bers, communities and organizations) have—	
16	(1) the means and capacity to generate and	
17	benefit from economic stimulus and growth; and	
18	(2) fair access to, and reasonable opportunities	
19	to participate in, Federal economic development and	
20	job growth programs.	
21	(b) Members.—	
22	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Council shall consist of	
23	5 members appointed by the President.	
24	(2) INITIAL APPOINTMENTS.—Not later than	
25	180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the	

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1	President shall appoint the initial members of the	
2	Council.	
3	(3) COMPOSITION.—Of the members of the	
4	Council—	
5	(A) 1 member shall be an Alaska Native;	
6	(B) 1 member shall be a Hawaiian Native;	
7	and	
8	(C) 3 members shall represent American	
9	Native groups and organizations from other	
10	States.	
11	(4) CHAIRPERSON.—The President shall des-	
12	ignate 1 of the members of the Council to serve as	
13	Chairperson.	
14	(c) EXPERIENCE.—Each member of the Council shall	
15	be a Native American who, as a result of work experience,	
16	training, and attainment, is well qualified—	
17	(1) to identify, analyze, and understand the at-	
18	tributes and background of successful business en-	
19	terprises and economic programs in Native Amer-	
20	ican communities and cultures;	
21	(2) to appraise the economic development pro-	
22	grams and activities of Federal agencies in the con-	
23	text of the goals and purposes of this Act; and	
24	(3) to recommend programs, policies, and need-	
25	ed program modifications to improve access to and	

1	effectiveness in the delivery of economic development	
2	programs in Native American communities.	
3	(d) VACANCIES.—A vacancy on the Council—	
4	(1) shall not affect the authority of the Com-	
5	mission; and	
6	(2) shall be filled in the same manner as the	
7	initial appointments to the Council.	
8	(e) EXPENSES.—Each Member of the Council shall	
9	be allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of	
10	subsistence, at the rate authorized for employees of agen-	
11	cies under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United	
12	States Code, while away from the homes or regular places	
13	of business of the employees in the performance of services	
14	for the Council.	
15	(f) STAFF.—	
16	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Council may, without	
17	regard to the civil service laws (including regula-	
18	tions), appoint and terminate an executive director	
19	and such other staff as are necessary to enable the	
20	Council to perform the duties required under this	
21	Act.	
22	(2) Compensation.—	
23	(A) IN GENERAL.—Subject to subpara-	

graph (B), the Council may fix the compensa-tion of the executive director and other per-

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1	sonnel without regard to the provisions of chap-
2	ter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title
3	5, United States Code, relating to classification
4	of positions and General Schedule pay rates.
5	(B) MAXIMUM AMOUNT.—The rate of pay
6	for the executive director and other personnel of
7	the Council shall not exceed the rate payable
8	for level V of the Executive Schedule under sec-
9	tion 5316 of title 5, United States Code.
10	(g) Detail of Employees.—
11	(1) IN GENERAL.—An employee of the Federal
12	Government may be detailed to the Council without
13	reimbursement.
14	(2) CIVIL SERVICE STATUS.—The detail of an
15	employee shall be without interruption or loss of civil
16	service status or privilege.
17	(h) TEMPORARY SERVICES.—The Council may pro-
18	cure temporary and intermittent services in accordance
19	with section 3109(b) of title 5, United States Code, at
20	rates for individuals that do not exceed the daily equiva-
21	lent of the annual rate of basic pay prescribed for level
22	V of the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of that
23	title.
24	(i) Administrative Services.—The Secretary of

25 Commerce shall provide necessary office space and admin-

istrative services for the Council (including staff of the
 Council).

#### 3 SEC. 5. DUTIES.

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Council shall advise and
5 make recommendations to Federal agencies on—

6 (1) proposing sustainable economic growth and 7 poverty reduction policies in a manner that promotes 8 self-determination, self-sufficiency, and independence 9 in urban and remote Native American communities 10 while preserving the traditional cultural values of 11 those communities;

(2) ensuring that Native Americans (including
Native American communities and organizations)
have equal access to Federal economic aid, training,
and assistance programs;

16 (3) developing economic growth strategies, fi17 nance, and tax policies that will enable Native Amer18 ican organizations to stimulate the local economies
19 of Native Americans and create meaningful new jobs
20 in Native American communities;

(4) increasing the effectiveness of Federal programs to address the economic, employment, medical, and social needs of Native American communities;

1	(5) administering Federal economic develop-
2	ment assistance programs with an understanding of
3	the unique needs of Native American communities
4	with the objectives of—
5	(A) making Native American leaders
6	knowledgeable about best business practices and
7	successful economic and job growth strategies;
8	(B) promoting investment and economic
9	growth and reducing unemployment and pov-
10	erty in Native American communities;
11	(C) enhancing governance, entrepreneur-
12	ship, and self-determination in Native American
13	communities; and
14	(D) fostering demonstrations of trans-
15	formational changes in economic conditions in
16	remote Native American communities through
17	the use of innovative technology, targeted in-
18	vestments, and the use of Native American-
19	owned natural and scenic resources;
20	(6) improving the effectiveness of economic de-
21	velopment assistance programs through the integra-
22	tion and coordination of assistance to Native Amer-
23	ican communities;
24	(7) recommending educational and business
25	training programs for Native Americans that in-

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nomic well-being and to further the purposes of this

(8) initiating proposals, as needed, for fellow-
ship and mentoring programs to meet the economic
development needs of Native American communities.
(b) ADDITIONAL DUTIES.—The Council shall—
(1) prepare a compilation of successful business
enterprises and joint ventures conducted by Native
American organizations, including tribal enterprises
and the commercial ventures of Native Corporations
(as defined in section 102 of the Alaska National In-
terest Lands Conservation Act (16 U.S.C. 3102)) in
the State of Alaska; and
(2) periodically sponsor and arrange con-
ferences and training workshops on Native American
business activities, including providing mentors, re-
source people, and speakers to address financing,
management, marketing, resource development, and
best business practices in Native American business

# SEC. 6. ASSESSMENT OF IMPACTS OF LEGISLATIVE PRO POSALS ON NATIVE AMERICAN ECONOMIC PROSPECTS AND OPPORTUNITY.

4 In preparing and communicating the comments and 5 recommendations of the President on proposed legislation to committees and leadership of Congress, the Director of 6 7 the Office of Management and Budget and the head of 8 a Federal agency shall include an assessment of the impacts of the proposed legislation on the economic and em-9 10 ployment prospects and opportunities provided in the proposed legislation to improve the quality of living conditions 11 12 of Native American communities, organizations, and members to the levels enjoyed by most people of the United 13 14 States.

#### 15 SEC. 7. REPORTS.

16	The Council shall—
17	(1) prepare periodic reports on the activities of
18	the Council; and
19	(2) make the reports available to—
20	(A) Native American communities, organi-
21	zations, and members;
22	(B) the General Services Administration;
23	(C) the Office of Management and Budget;
24	(D) the Domestic Policy Council;
25	(E) the National Economic Council;
26	(F) the Council of Economic Advisers;

1	(G) the Secretary of the Treasury;
2	(H) the Secretary of Commerce;
3	(I) the Secretary of Labor;
4	(J) the Secretary of the Interior;
5	(K) the Secretary of Energy; and
6	(L) members of the public.

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
