## A BILL

- To protect the right of individuals to bear arms on Federal lands administered by the United States Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management.
  - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
  - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

### **3** SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; FINDINGS.

- 4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
  5 "Firearms Freedom on Federal Lands Act".
- 6 (b) FINDINGS.—Congress finds the following:
- 7 (1) Section 512 of the Credit Card Account8 ability Responsibility and Disclosure Act of 2009

(Public Law 111-24) prevents the Secretary of the
 Interior from promulgating or enforcing any regula tion that prohibits an individual from possessing a
 firearm in any unit of the National Park System or
 the National Wildlife Refuge System when certain
 conditions are met.

7 (2) The Secretary of Agriculture is not statu8 torily prevented from promulgating or enforcing reg9 ulations that prohibit an individual from possessing
10 a firearm on Federal lands administered by the
11 United States Forest Service.

(3) The Secretary of the Interior is not statutorily prevented from promulgating or enforcing any
regulation that prohibits an individual from possessing a firearm on Federal lands administered by
the Bureau of Land Management.

17 (4) The Antiquities Act of 1906 (16 U.S.C.
18 431-433) authorizes the President to designate Na19 tional Monuments under the jurisdiction of the De20 partment of Agriculture and the Department of the
21 Interior.

(5) The Antiquities Act of 1906 (16 U.S.C.
431–433) does not expressly prohibit the President
from restricting the legal possession of firearms

through Executive orders establishing National
 Monuments.

3 (6) The Second Amendment to the Constitution
4 provides that "the right of the people to keep and
5 bear Arms, shall not be infringed.".

# 6 SEC. 2. PROTECTING THE RIGHT OF INDIVIDUALS TO BEAR 7 ARMS ON FEDERAL LANDS ADMINISTERED 8 BY THE FOREST SERVICE AND BLM.

9 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Agriculture and 10 the Secretary of the Interior shall not promulgate or enforce any regulation or Executive order, including Presi-11 12 dential declarations authorized under the Antiquities Act 13 of 1906 (16 U.S.C. 431–433), that prohibit an individual from possessing a firearm, including an assembled or func-14 15 tional firearm, in any unit administered by the United States Forest Service or the Bureau of Land Manage-16 ment, if— 17

18 (1) the individual is not otherwise prohibited by19 law from possessing the firearm; and

(2) the possession of the firearm is in compliance with the law of the State in which the unit of
the National Forest System or the Bureau of Land
Management is located.

24 (b) STATUTORY CONSTRUCTION.—Nothing in this25 Act shall be construed—

(1) as affecting the authority, jurisdiction, or
 responsibility of the several States to manage, con trol, or regulate fish and resident wildlife under
 State law or regulations, including the regulation of
 hunting, fishing, trapping, and recreational shooting
 on public land managed by the Department of Agri culture or the Department of the Interior; or

8 (2) as limiting access for hunting, fishing, trap-9 ping, or recreational shooting.

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
