2 Congress finds the following: 3 (1) Each community in the United States is 4 benefitted by the work of nonprofit organizations, in-5 cluding in the areas of— (A) health and human services; 6 7 (B) education and worker training; 8 (C) the arts and culture; 9 (D) religion, faith, and spirituality; 10 (E) the environment, natural resources, 11 and recreation;

1	(F) justice and public safety; and
2	(G) civic organizations and social groups.
3	(2) Nonprofit organizations are a significant
4	and highly diverse sector of the economy of the
5	United States that includes 1,500,000 organizations,
6	according to the Internal Revenue Service, and that
7	accounted for as much as 5 percent of the Gross Do-
8	mestic Product of the United States in 2008, ac-
9	cording to the Government Accountability Office.
10	(3) While no Federal agency regularly collects
11	systematic employment data on the nonprofit sector,
12	the Congressional Research Service estimates that
13	nearly 10 percent of the workforce of the United
14	States is employed in the nonprofit sector as a whole
15	and more than 7 percent are employed by $501(c)(3)$
16	public charities.
17	(4) Most nonprofit organizations are small em-
18	ployers focused on delivering vital services and cre-
19	ating opportunities in communities and among
20	groups of people and, according to the National Cen-

ter for Charitable Statistics, 93.3 percent of the
nonprofit organizations in the United States have an
annual budget of less than \$1,000,000.

3	(6) The Federal Government provides signifi-
4	cant support to for-profit businesses through the

10	of many Federal, State, and local policy initiatives,
11	no Federal agency has responsibility for evaluating,

to be known as the "United States Council on Nonprofit
Organizations and Community Solutions" (in this section
referred to as the "Council").

20	extent practicable, the membership of the Coun-
21	cil includes individuals from geographic areas
22	and ethnic and racial backgrounds that rep-
23	resent the diversity of the United States.
24	(3) TIMING OF INITIAL APPOINTMENTS.—Ap-
25	pointment of the initial members of the Council shall

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1	be completed not later than 60 days after the date
2	of enactment of this Act.

13	including per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates
14	authorized for employees of agencies under sub-

16	Code, while away from their homes or regular places
17	of business in the performance of services for the
18	Council.
19	(c) CHAIRPERSON AND VICE CHAIRPERSON.—The
20	President shall select, from among the voting members of

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8 (1) EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR.—The Chairperson 9 of the Council shall appoint an individual to serve as 10 the Executive Director of the Council and that indi-11 vidual shall be paid at a rate equivalent to the rate 12 provided for level III of the Executive Schedule 13 under section 5314 of title 5, United States Code. 14 (2) STAFF.—The Executive Director may ap-

15 point and fix the pay of additional personnel to ad-16 minister the Council and provide staff support to the 17 Interagency Working Group. Such employees may be 18 appointed without regard to the provisions of title 5, 19 United States Code, governing appointments in the 20 competitive service and may be paid without regard 21 to the provisions of chapter 51 and subchapter III 22 of chapter 53 of that title relating to classification 23 and General Schedule pay rates.

24 (3) EXPERTS AND CONSULTANTS.—The Execu25 tive Director may procure the temporary and inter-

mittent services of experts and consultants in the
 same manner as an agency under section 3109(b) of
 title 5, United States Code.

(4) STAFF OF FEDERAL AGENCIES.—The head 4 5 of any Federal department or agency may detail to 6 the Council on a reimbursable basis, or on a nonre-7 imbursable basis for a period not to exceed 180 days 8 during any fiscal year, as agreed upon by the Execu-9 tive Director and the head of the department or 10 agency, any of the personnel of the department or 11 agency to assist the Council in carrying out the du-12 ties of the Council under this section. Any such de-13 tail shall not interrupt or otherwise affect the civil 14 service status or privileges of the Federal employee. 15 (h) POWERS OF THE COUNCIL.—

16 (1) HEARINGS.—The Council may hold hear17 ings, sit and act at times and places, take testimony,
18 and receive evidence as the Council considers appro19 priate to carry out this section, including holding
20 hearings throughout the United States.

21 (2) Obtaining data.—

(A) IN GENERAL.—Except as otherwise
prohibited by law, the Council may secure directly from any Federal department or agency

1	information the Council considers necessary to
2	carry out this section.
3	(B) AGENCY COOPERATION.—Upon the re-
4	quest of the Chairperson of the Council, the
5	head of any Federal agency shall furnish infor-
6	mation requested under this paragraph to the
7	Council.
8	(3) Mails.—The Council may use the United
9	States mails in the same manner and under the
10	same conditions as other agencies of the Federal
11	Government.
12	(i) Contracting for Research.—The Council
13	may enter into contracts for research to inform the delib-
14	erations of the Council.
15	(j) Reporting.—
16	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than one year
17	after the first meeting of the Council, and annually
18	thereafter, the Council shall submit to the President
19	and Congress, including the majority leader and the
20	minority leader of the House of Representatives and
21	the majority leader and the minority leader of the
22	Senate, a report that includes the results of study
23	activities under subsection (f), advice provided under
24	subsection (f), and recommendations of the Council
25	relating to such activities.

1 (2) ADVICE ON IMPLEMENTATION.—At the re-2 quest of Congress or the head of any Federal de-3 partment or agency, the Council shall provide advice 4 on the implementation of any recommendation in-5 cluded in a report under paragraph (1).

6 (k) ANNUAL SUMMIT.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 6 months 8 after the submission to Congress of the first report 9 of the Council under subsection (j), and annually 10 thereafter, the Council shall organize and carry out 11 a national summit on nonprofit organizations to in-12 form the public and the Members of Congress of the results of study activities of the Council under sub-13 14 section (f).

(2) TESTIMONY.—In carrying out a summit
under paragraph (1), the Council shall invite testimony from experts on nonprofit organization effectiveness and innovation.

16 SEC. 302. ECONOMIC IMPACT DATA.

17 Not later than 18 months after the date of enactment 18 of this Act, the Secretary of Commerce, acting through 19 the Bureau of Economic Analysis, shall submit to Con-20gress, the United States Council on Nonprofit Organiza-21tions and Community Solutions (established under section 22 101), and the Interagency Working Group on Nonprofit 23 Organizations and the Federal Government (established 24 under section 201) a report that includes recommenda-25 tions for the establishment of measures to assess and

12 The Secretary of Labor shall take steps to ensure 13 that employment data provided by the Bureau of Labor 14 Statistics includes nonprofit organizations as a distinct 15 category of employer.

16 SEC. 305. CENSUS DATA.

Not later than one year after the date of enactment
of this Act, and annually thereafter, the Director of the
Census shall submit to the President and Congress a comprehensive report on nonprofit organizations, including
subcategories of nonprofit organizations.

22 SEC. 306. RECOMMENDATIONS AND ASSESSMENT.

19	TITLE V—NONPROFIT
20	ORGANIZATION DEFINED
21	SEC. 501. NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION DEFINED.
22	In this Act, the term "nonprofit organization" means

In this Act, the term "nonprofit organization" means an organization that is described in section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and is exempt from taxation under section 501(a) of such Code, including reli-

- 1 gious organizations and philanthropic organizations that
- 2 meet such requirements.
