# A BILL

To award a Congressional Gold Medal to Dr. Balazs "Ernie" Bodai in recognition of his many outstanding contributions to the Nation, including a tireless commitment to breast cancer research.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. FINDINGS.

	SECTION 1. PHOLINGS.
2	The Congress finds as follows:
3	(1) Dr. Balazs "Ernie" Bodai was born in Bu-
4	dapest, Hungary, in 1951.
5	(2) As a child, Dr. Bodai and his family lived
6	in a bomb shelter for over a year during the Hun-
7	garian Revolution of 1956 before managing to es-
8	cape and immigrate to the United States.
9	(3) Dr. Bodai received his B.A. and M.S. de-
10	grees from the University of California, Los Angeles
11	and subsequently received his M.D. degree from the
12	University of California, Davis, at the young age of
13	26.
14	(4) Dr. Bodai has authored over 250 medical
15	articles and published 5 books, 4 of which focus or
16	cancer.
17	(5) After working as a breast cancer surgeon
18	for 15 years and caring for more than 1,500 pa-
19	tients, Dr. Bodai became frustrated with the pace of
20	breast cancer research funding.
21	(6) In 1996, Dr. Bodai launched a campaign to
22	create a postal stamp to benefit breast cancer re-
23	search.
24	(7) After several trips to Washington, DC, and
25	countless visits with United States Senators and

Members of Congress, the Stamp Out Breast Cancer

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- Act, which allowed a breast cancer stamp to be sold at up to 8 cents above the normal first-class rate, was passed and signed into law in August 1997.
- 4 (8) As a direct result of Dr. Bodai's tireless 5 commitment to breast cancer research, as of 2010, 6 more than 900,000,000 breast cancer stamps have 7 been sold in the United States—providing over 8 \$73,000,000 for crucial, life-saving research.
  - (9) The Breast Cancer Research Stamp recently surpassed the Elvis Presley Stamp to become the all-time best seller for the United States Postal Service.
  - (10) In an effort to expand breast cancer research internationally, in 2005, Dr. Bodai introduced the first ever "global stamp" to raise awareness and funding to conquer the disease worldwide.
- 17 (11) As of 2010, as a direct result of Dr.
  18 Bodai's tireless commitment, over 70 countries have
  19 either created their own stamp or are in the process
  20 of doing so—making breast cancer research, early
  21 detection, and eradication a global health priority.

#### 22 SEC. 2. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

23 (a) Presentation Authorized.—The Speaker of 24 the House of Representatives and the President pro tem-25 pore of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements

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- 1 for the presentation, on behalf of the Congress, of a gold
- 2 medal of appropriate design, to Dr. Balazs "Ernie" Bodai
- 3 in recognition of his many outstanding contributions to
- 4 the Nation, including a tireless commitment to breast can-
- 5 cer research.
- 6 (b) Design and Striking.—For purposes of the
- 7 presentation referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary
- 8 of the Treasury (referred to in this Act as the "Sec-
- 9 retary") shall strike a gold medal with suitable emblems,
- 10 devices, and inscriptions to be determined by the Sec-
- 11 retary.

#### 12 SEC. 3. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

- 13 The Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
- 14 bronze of the gold medal struck pursuant to section 2
- 15 under such regulations as the Secretary may prescribe, at
- 16 a price sufficient to cover the cost thereof, including labor,
- 17 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses,
- 18 and the cost of the gold medal.

## 19 SEC. 4. STATUS OF MEDALS.

- 20 (a) National Medals.—The medals struck pursu-
- 21 ant to this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter
- 22 51 of title 31, United States Code.
- 23 (b) Numismatic Items.—For purposes of sections
- 24 5134 and 5136 of title 31, United States Code, all medals

- 1 struck under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic
- 2 items.
- 3 SEC. 5. AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS; PROCEEDS OF
- 4 SALE.
- 5 (a) AUTHORITY TO USE FUND AMOUNTS.—There is
- 6 authorized to be charged against the United States Mint
- 7 Public Enterprise Fund such amounts as may be nec-
- 8 essary to pay for the costs of the medals struck pursuant
- 9 to this Act.
- 10 (b) PROCEEDS OF SALE.—Amounts received from the
- 11 sale of duplicate bronze medals authorized under section
- 12 3 shall be deposited into the United States Mint Public
- 13 Enterprise Fund.

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
