A BILL

To establish the History is Learned from the Living grant program to enable communities to learn about historical events in the United States in the past century through the oral histories of community members who participated in those events, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "History Is Learned
- 5 from the Living Act".

1	SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS REGARDING PRESERVATION
2	OF STORIES OF HEROES OF HISTORICAL
3	MOVEMENTS AND EVENTS IN THE UNITED
4	STATES.
5	(a) Findings.—Congress finds the following:
6	(1) The historical events in the United States
7	over the past century have been integral to growth,
8	progress, and innovation in the United States.
9	(2) Notable examples of such historical move-
10	ments include the Women's Suffrage, Reagan Revo-
11	lution, Peace, Veteran, Civil Rights, Tea Party, Chi-
12	cano (El Movimiento), Environmental, and Deficit
13	Reduction Movements.
14	(3) Martin Luther King, Jr., Gloria Steinem,
15	Cesar Chavez, William Buckley, Susan B. Anthony,
16	Jacques-Yves Cousteau, Rachel Carson, Howard
17	Jarvis and John Muir are among the many well-
18	known heroes of such historical events.
19	(4) In addition to the well-known heroes of such
20	historical events, there are numerous unsung heroes
21	living in local communities across the United States.
22	(b) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
23	gress that the stories of the unsung heroes of historical
24	events in the United States over the past century should
25	be preserved and archived, and the historical events in

1	which they participated remembered, for generations to
2	come.
3	SEC. 3. HISTORY IS LEARNED FROM THE LIVING GRANT
4	PROGRAM.
5	(a) Grant Program.—There is established the His-
6	tory Is Learned from the Living grant program (in this
7	section referred to as the "HILL grant program"), to be
8	carried out by the Secretary of the Interior.
9	(b) REQUIREMENTS.—Under the HILL grant pro-
10	gram, the Secretary shall make 1-year grants in the
11	amount of \$200,000 to community groups, organizations
12	or institutions to—
13	(1) carry out projects through which the com-
14	munity may learn about historical events in the
15	United States in the past century through the oral
16	histories of members of the community who partici-
17	pated in those events; and
18	(2) submit to the Secretary a digital report (in-
19	cluding interviews, documents, videos, photos, etc.)
20	on the projects, in such form and containing such
21	information as may be specified by the Secretary, in-
22	cluding but not limited to—
23	(A) each oral history described in para-
24	graph (1);
25	(B) the relevance of such oral history, and

1	(C) the background of those interviewed
2	and the community, organizations and/or insti-
3	tutions to whom the oral history belongs.
4	(c) APPLICATION.—To be eligible for a grant under
5	this section, a community group, organization, or institu-
6	tion shall submit to the Secretary an application at such
7	time, in such manner, and containing such information as
8	the Secretary may require.
9	(d) Preservation of Oral Histories.—The Sec-
10	retary shall establish a system to preserve and make avail-
11	able to the public the digital reports submitted under sub-
12	section $(b)(2)$.
13	(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
14	are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary to carry
15	out the HILL grant program \$5,000,000 for fiscal year

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16 2011 and each fiscal year thereafter.
