SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

12	and water quality of the Gulf of Mexico and its wa-
13	tershed have been diminished by point and nonpoint
14	source pollution;
15	(3) the United States should seek to attain the
16	protection and restoration of the Gulf of Mexico eco-
17	system as a collaborative regional goal of the Gulf
18	of Mexico Program; and
19	(4) the Administrator of the Environmental
20	Protection Agency, in consultation with other Fed-
21	eral agencies and State and local authorities, should
22	coordinate the effort to meet those goals.
23	(b) Purposes.—The purposes of this Act are—
24	(1) to expand and strengthen cooperative ef-
25	forts to restore and protect the Gulf of Mexico;

1	(2) to expand Federal support for monitoring,
2	management, and restoration activities in the Gulf
3	of Mexico and its watershed;
4	(3) to commit the United States to a com-

8	(4) to establish a Gulf of Mexico Program to
9	serve as a national and international model for the
10	collaborative management of large marine eco-
11	systems.
12	SEC. 3. GULF OF MEXICO RESTORATION AND PROTECTION.
13	Title I of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act

10	human-induced environmental changes on the
11	water quality and living resources of the Gulf of
12	Mexico ecosystem;
13	"(C) developing and executing cooperative
14	strategies that address the water quality and
15	living resource needs in the Gulf of Mexico eco
16	system;
17	"(D) developing and implementing locally
18	based protection and restoration programs of
19	projects within a watershed that complement
20	those strategies, including the creation, restora
21	tion, protection, or enhancement of habitat as
22	sociated with the Gulf of Mexico ecosystem; and
23	"(E) eliminating or reducing point sources
24	that discharge pollutants that contaminate the

9	costs for services provided and charged against pro-
10	grams or projects carried out using funds made
11	available through a grant under this subsection shall
12	not exceed 15 percent of the amount of the grant.

14	"(1) Annual Report.—Not later than Decem-
15	ber 30, 2009, and annually thereafter, the Director
16	of the Program Office shall submit to the Adminis-
17	trator and make available to the public a report that
