To prohibit the Federal Communications Commission from further regulating the Internet.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Internet Freedom Act
- 5 of 2009".
- 6 SEC. 2. LIMITATION ON AUTHORITY OF THE FCC.
- 7 (a) In General.—The Federal Communications
- 8 Commission shall not propose, promulgate, or issue any
- 9 regulations regarding the Internet or IP-enabled services.

1	(b) Exception.—The limitation set forth in this sec-
2	tion shall not apply to any regulations that the Commis-
3	sion determines necessary—
4	(1) to prevent damage to the national security
5	of the United States;
6	(2) to ensure the public safety;
7	(3) to assist or facilitate any actions taken by
8	a Federal or State law enforcement agency; or
9	(4) to ensure the solvency of the Universal
10	Service Fund established under section 254 of the
11	Communications Act of 1934.
12	(c) Rule of Construction.—Nothing in this sec-
13	tion shall be construed to supersede, repeal, or negate any
14	regulations regarding the Internet or IP-enabled services
15	that were in effect on the day before the date of enactment
16	of this Act, including any regulations established pursuant
17	to the Communications Assistance for Law Enforcement
18	Act (47 U.S.C. 1001 note).
19	(d) General Principles.—Congress finds that—
20	(1) the Internet and all IP-enabled services are
21	services affecting interstate commerce; and
22	(2) such services are not be subject to the juris-
23	diction of any State or municipal locality.
