A BILL

To provide emergency operating funds for public transportation.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Public Transportation
- 5 Preservation Act of 2010".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 7 Congress finds the following:
- 8 (1) The American Public Transportation Asso-
- 9 ciation estimates that since January 1, 2009, 84

1	percent of transit systems have raised fares, cut
2	service or are considering one of those actions.
3	(2) Many low-income workers, older Americans,
4	and people with disabilities depend on transit service
5	to get to jobs and health care. Reduced service and
6	higher fares can have a devastating effect on their
7	quality of life.
8	(3) Millions of Americans use transit every day.
9	Reduced transit service makes it harder for workers
10	to access jobs and puts more cars on the road, wors-
11	ening already bad traffic congestion in many metro-

25	(2) EXCEPTION.—

1 (A) IN GENERAL.—If a recipient submits a 2 certification to the Secretary that the recipient 3 has not had a major reduction in public trans-4 portation service, as described in section 5307(d)(1)(I) of title 49, United States Code, 5 6 or a fare increase as a result of decreased State 7 or local operating funding, and will be able to 8 avoid such reductions or increases through Sep-9 tember 30, 2011, without the funds made avail-10 able by this section, a recipient may use the 11 funds to replace, rehabilitate, or repair existing 12 transit capital assets used in public transpor-13 tation as defined under section 5302(a)(10) of 14 title 49, United States Code.

(B) USE OF REMAINING FUNDS.—A recipient may use any remaining funds made available by this section to replace, rehabilitate, or
repair existing transit capital assets used in
public transportation as defined under section
5302(a)(10) of title 49, United States Code if
that recipient has—

(i) restored a major reduction in public transportation service or rescinded a
fare increase; and

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(ii) is able to avoid reductions or in creases described in paragraph (1)(B).
 (d) REQUIREMENTS.—Applicable requirements of
 chapter 53 of title 49, United States Code, shall apply to
 funding provided under this section. Section 1101(b) of

5 funding provided under this section. Section 1101(b) of
6 Public Law 109-59 (119 Stat. 1156) shall apply to fund7 ing provided under this section.

8 (e) GOVERNMENT SHARE OF COSTS.—A grant under
9 this section shall be, at the option of the recipient, up to
10 100 percent of the net cost of the project.

(f) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There
are authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section
\$2,000,000,000 to remain available for obligation through
September 30, 2011.

15 (\mathbf{g}) FUNDS AVAILABILITY.—Funds apportioned under this section and obligated on or before September 16 17 30, 2011, shall be expended on or before July 1, 2012. 18 (h) OVERSIGHT.—Three-quarters of 1 percent of the funds available under paragraphs (1) and (2) of sub-19 20section (b), and one-half of 1 percent of the funds avail-21 able under paragraph (3) of subsection (b), shall be pro-22 vided for administrative expenses and program manage-23 ment oversight, and such funds shall be available through 24 September 30, 2013.

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
