A BILL

To amend the Public Health Service Act to specifically include, in programs of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, programs to research, prevent, and address the harmful consequences of pathological and other problem gambling, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Comprehensive Prob-
- 5 lem Gambling Act of 2010".

SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- (1) Problem gambling is a public health disorder characterized by increasing preoccupation with gambling, loss of control, restlessness or irritability when attempting to stop gambling, and continuation of the gambling behavior in spite of mounting, serious, negative consequences.
 - (2) Over 6,000,000 adults met criteria for a gambling problem last year.
 - (3) The estimated social cost to families and communities from bankruptcy, divorce, job loss, and criminal justice costs associated with problem gambling was \$6,700,000,000 last year.
 - (4) Problem gambling is associated with higher incidences of bankruptcy, domestic abuse, and suicide.
 - (5) People who engage in problem gambling have high rates of co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders.
 - (6) In response to current budget shortfalls, many States are considering enacting or have enacted legislation to expand legal gambling activities with the intent of raising State revenues.

1	(7) The Substance Abuse and Mental Health
2	Services Administration is the lead Federal agency
3	for substance abuse and mental health services.
4	(8) There are no agencies or individuals in the
5	Federal Government with formal responsibility for
6	problem gambling.
7	SEC. 3. INCLUSION OF AUTHORITY TO ADDRESS GAMBLING
8	IN SAMHSA AUTHORITIES.
9	Section 501(d) of the Public Health Service Act (42
10	U.S.C. 290aa(d)) is amended—
11	(1) by striking "and" at the end of paragraph
12	(17);
13	(2) by striking the period at the end of para-
14	graph (18) and inserting "; and"; and
15	(3) by adding at the end the following:
16	"(19) establish and implement programs for the
17	identification, prevention, and treatment of patholog-
18	ical and other problem gambling.".
19	SEC. 4. PROGRAMS TO RESEARCH, PREVENT, AND ADDRESS
20	PROBLEM GAMBLING.
21	Title V of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C.
22	290aa et seq.) is amended—
23	(1) by redesignating part G (42 U.S.C. 290kk
24	et seq.), relating to services provided through reli-
25	gious organizations and added by section 144 of the

1	Community Renewal Tax Relief Act of 2000 (114
2	Stat. 2763A-619), as enacted into law by section
3	1(a)(7) of Public Law 106–554, as part J;
4	(2) by redesignating sections 581 through 584
5	of that part J as sections 596 through 596C, respec-
6	tively; and
7	(3) by adding at the end the following:
8	"PART K—PROGRAMS TO RESEARCH, PREVENT,
9	AND ADDRESS PROBLEM GAMBLING
10	"SEC. 597. PUBLIC AWARENESS.
11	"(a) In General.—The Secretary, acting through
12	the Administrator, shall carry out a national campaign to
13	increase knowledge and raise awareness within the general
14	public with respect to problem gambling issues. In car-
15	rying out the campaign, the Secretary shall carry out ac-
16	tivities that include augmenting and supporting existing
17	(as of the date of the support) national campaigns and
18	producing and placing public service announcements.
19	"(b) Voluntary Donations.—In carrying out sub-
20	section (a), the Secretary may—
21	"(1) coordinate the voluntary donation of, and
22	administer, resources to assist in the implementation
23	of new programs and the augmentation and support
24	of existing national campaigns to provide national

1	strategies for dissemination of information, intended
2	to address problem gambling, from—
3	"(A) television, radio, motion pictures,
4	cable communications, and the print media;
5	"(B) the advertising industry;
6	"(C) the business sector of the United
7	States; and
8	"(D) professional sports organizations and
9	associations; and
10	"(2) encourage media outlets throughout the
11	country to provide information, aimed at preventing
12	problem gambling, including public service an-
13	nouncements, documentary films, and advertise-
14	ments.
15	"(c) Focus.—In carrying out subsection (a), the Sec-
16	retary shall target radio and television audiences of events
17	including sporting and gambling events.
18	"(d) Evaluation.—In carrying out subsection (a),
19	the Secretary shall evaluate the effectiveness of activities
20	under this section. The Secretary shall submit a report
21	to the President and Congress containing the results of
22	the evaluation.
23	"(e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—For the
24	purpose of carrying out this section, there is authorized

- 1 to be appropriated \$200,000 for each of fiscal years 2011
- 2 through 2015.
- 3 "SEC. 597A. RESEARCH.
- 4 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, acting through
- 5 the Administrator, shall establish and implement a na-
- 6 tional program of research on problem gambling.
- 7 "(b) National Gambling Impact Study Commis-
- 8 SION REPORT.—In carrying out this section, the Secretary
- 9 shall consider the recommendations that appear in chapter
- 10 8 of the June 18, 1999, report of the National Gambling
- 11 Impact Study Commission.
- 12 "(c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—For the
- 13 purpose of carrying out this section, there is authorized
- 14 to be appropriated \$4,000,000 for each of fiscal years
- 15 2011 through 2015.
- 16 "SEC. 597B. PREVENTION AND TREATMENT.
- 17 "(a) Grants.—
- 18 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary, acting
- through the Administrator, shall make grants to
- 20 States, local and tribal governments, and nonprofit
- agencies to provide comprehensive services with re-
- spect to treatment and prevention of problem gam-
- bling issues and education about problem gambling
- issues.

1	"(2) APPLICATION FOR GRANT.—To be eligible
2	to receive a grant under this subsection, an entity
3	shall submit an application to the Secretary in such
4	form, in such manner, and containing such agree-
5	ments, assurances, and information as the Secretary
6	determines to be necessary to carry out this sub-
7	section.
