1	SEC. 2. ACCESS TO MENTAL HEALTH ASSESSMENTS FOR
2	MEMBERS OF THE RESERVE COMPONENTS
3	OF THE ARMED FORCES PERFORMING INAC-
4	TIVE-DUTY TRAINING.

5 Section 1074a of title 10, United States Code, is6 amended—

7 (1) by redesignating subsection (h) as sub-8 section (i);

9 (2) by inserting after subsection (g) the fol-10 lowing new subsection (h):

11 "(h)(1) The Secretary concerned shall provide to any 12 member of the reserve components performing inactive-13 duty training during scheduled unit training assemblies 14 access to mental health assessments with a licensed men-15 tal health professional who shall be available for referrals 16 during duty hours on the premises of the principal duty 17 location of the member's unit.

"(2) All mental health services provided under this
subsection shall be subject to and comply with all applicable privacy rules and security rules published by the Department of Health and Human Services as required by
the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act
of 1996.

24 "(3) Mental health services provided to a member25 under this subsection shall be at no cost to the member.";26 and

(3) in subsection (i), as redesignated by para graph (1), by striking "medical and dental readi ness" and inserting "medical, dental, and behavioral
 health readiness".

5 SEC. 3. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SUPPORT FOR MEMBERS OF 6 THE RESERVE COMPONENTS OF THE ARMED 7 FORCES.

8 (a) IN GENERAL.—Each member of a reserve compo-9 nent of the Armed Forces participating in annual training 10 or individual duty training shall, while so participating, 11 have access to the behavioral health support programs for 12 members of the reserve components described in sub-13 section (b).

(b) BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SUPPORT PROGRAMS.—
15 The behavioral health support programs for member of
16 the reserve components described in this subsection shall
17 include one or any combination of the following:

18 (1) Programs providing access to licensed men19 tal health providers in armories, reserve centers, or
20 other places for scheduled unit training assemblies.

21 (2) Programs providing training on suicide pre-22 vention and post-suicide response.

23 (3) Psychological health programs.

24 (4) Such other programs as the Secretary of25 Defense, in consultation with the Surgeon General

1 for the National Guard of the State in which the 2 members concerned reside, the Director of Psycho-3 logical Health of the State in which the members 4 concerned reside, the Department of Mental Health 5 or the equivalent agency of the State in which the 6 members concerned reside, or the Director of the 7 Psychological Health Program of the National 8 Guard Bureau, considers appropriate.

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9 (c) AVAILABILITY OF DEFENSE HEALTH PROGRAM 10 FUNDS.—Subject to applicable provisions of appropria-11 tions Acts, amounts available for the Department of De-12 fense for Defense Health Program shall be available for 13 behavioral health support programs for members of the 14 reserve components under this section.

(d) BUDGET.—The Office of the Secretary of Defense
for Health Affairs shall coordinate with the reserve components, including the National Guard Bureau, in determining the amounts required on a fiscal-year basis for behavioral support programs for members of the reserve
components under this section.

(e) EXECUTIVE AGENT.—The Joint Staff of the National Guard Bureau shall be the executive agent for the
implementation of behavioral health support programs for
members of the reserve components under this section.
