- 1 Fund on a long-term basis, the Universal Service Fund
- 2 needs to be exempt from the Antideficiency Act.

- 5 U.S.C. 254) is amended by adding at the end the fol-
- 6 lowing:
- 7 "(m) Application of Antideficiency Act.—Sec-
- 8 tion 1341 and subchapter II of chapter 15 of title 31,
- 9 United States Code, do not apply—
- 10 "(1) to any amount collected or received as
- 11 Federal universal service contributions required by
- this section, including any interest earned on such
- 13 contributions; nor
- "(2) to the expenditure or obligation of
- amounts attributable to such contributions for uni-
- versal service support programs established pursuant
- to this section.".

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
