# S. 3493

To reauthorize and enhance Johanna’s Law to increase public awareness and knowledge with respect to gynecologic cancers.

Mr. SPECTER (for himself, Ms. STABENOW, and Mr. MENENDEZ) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions

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## A BILL

To reauthorize and enhance Johanna’s Law to increase public awareness and knowledge with respect to gynecologic cancers.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. REAUTHORIZATION AND ENHANCEMENT OF**  
4       **JOHANNA’S LAW.**

5       (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 317P(d)(4) of the Public  
6       Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247b–17(d)(4)) is amended  
7       by inserting after “2009” the following: “, \$16,500,000  
8       for the period of fiscal years 2010 through 2012, and such  
9       sums as are necessary for each subsequent fiscal year”.

1 (b) COLLABORATION WITH NONPROFIT  
 2 GYNECOLOGIC CANCER ORGANIZATIONS.—Section  
 3 317P(d) of such Act (42 U.S.C. 247b–17(d)) is amended  
 4 by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

5 “(5) COLLABORATION WITH NONPROFIT  
 6 GYNECOLOGIC CANCER ORGANIZATIONS.—In car-  
 7 rying out the national campaign under this sub-  
 8 section, the Secretary shall collaborate with the lead-  
 9 ing nonprofit gynecologic cancer organizations, with  
 10 a mission both to conquer ovarian cancer nationwide  
 11 and to provide outreach to State and local govern-  
 12 ments and communities, for the purpose of deter-  
 13 mining the best practices for providing gynecologic  
 14 cancer information and outreach services to varied  
 15 populations.”.

16 **SEC. 2. DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS REGARDING OUT-**  
 17 **REACH AND EDUCATION STRATEGIES RELAT-**  
 18 **ING TO GYNECOLOGIC CANCER.**

19 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 317P of the Public  
 20 Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 247b–17) is amended by  
 21 adding at the end the following new subsection:

22 “(e) DEMONSTRATION PROJECTS REGARDING OUT-  
 23 REACH AND EDUCATION STRATEGIES.—

24 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall carry  
 25 out a program to make grants to nonprofit private

1 entities for the purpose of carrying out demonstra-  
2 tion projects to test different outreach and education  
3 strategies to increase the awareness and knowledge  
4 of women and health care providers with respect to  
5 gynecologic cancers, including early warning signs,  
6 risk factors, prevention, screening, and treatment  
7 options. Such strategies shall include strategies di-  
8 rected at women and their families, physicians,  
9 nurses, and key health professionals.

10 “(2) PREFERENCES IN MAKING GRANTS.—In  
11 making grants under paragraph (1), the Secretary  
12 shall give preference to—

13 “(A) applicants with demonstrated exper-  
14 tise in gynecologic cancer education or treat-  
15 ment or in working with groups of women who  
16 are at especially high risk of gynecologic can-  
17 cers; and

18 “(B) applicants that, in the demonstration  
19 project funded by the grant, will establish link-  
20 ages between physicians, nurses, and key health  
21 professionals, hospitals, payers, and State  
22 health departments.

23 “(3) APPLICATION FOR GRANT.—A grant may  
24 be made under paragraph (1) only if an application  
25 for the grant is submitted to the Secretary and the

1 application is in such form, is made in such manner,  
2 and contains such agreements, assurances, and in-  
3 formation as the Secretary determines to be nec-  
4 essary to carry out this subsection.

5 “(4) CERTAIN REQUIREMENTS.—In making  
6 grants under paragraph (1)—

7 “(A) the Secretary shall make grants to  
8 not fewer than five applicants, subject to the  
9 extent of amounts made available in appropria-  
10 tions Acts; and

11 “(B) the Secretary shall ensure that infor-  
12 mation provided through demonstration projects  
13 under such grants is consistent with the best  
14 available medical information.

15 “(5) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 6  
16 months after the date of the enactment of this sub-  
17 section and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall  
18 submit to the Congress a report that—

19 “(A) summarizes the activities of dem-  
20 onstration projects under paragraph (1);

21 “(B) evaluates the extent to which the  
22 projects were effective in increasing early detec-  
23 tion of gynecologic cancers and awareness of  
24 risk factors and early warning signs in the pop-

1           ulations to which the projects were directed;  
2           and

3           “(C) identifies barriers to early detection  
4           and appropriate treatment of such cancers.

5           “(6) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

6           “(A) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of car-  
7           rying out this subsection, there is authorized to  
8           be appropriated in the aggregate \$15,000,000  
9           for the period of fiscal years 2010 through  
10          2012 and such sums as are necessary for each  
11          subsequent fiscal year.

12          “(B) ADMINISTRATION, TECHNICAL AS-  
13          SISTANCE, AND EVALUATION.—Of the amounts  
14          appropriated under subparagraph (A), not more  
15          than 9 percent may be expended for the pur-  
16          pose of administering this subsection, providing  
17          technical assistance to grantees under this sub-  
18          section, and preparing the report under para-  
19          graph (5).”.

20          (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Subsection  
21          (d)(3)(A) of such section is amended by inserting “(other  
22          than subsections (e))” after “this section”.

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
