Mr. Bennet introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Armed Services

A BILL

To provide for a continuation and expansion of the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration program, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. CONTINUATION AND EXPANSION OF WOUNDED
- 4 WARRIOR CAREERS DEMONSTRATION PRO-
- 5 GRAM.
- 6 (a) Continuation of Program.—The Secretary of
- 7 the Army shall continue the Wounded Warrior Careers
- 8 Demonstration program being conducted in collaboration
- 9 with the Army Wounded Warrior program at three loca-
- 10 tions pursuant to the memorandum of understanding on

- 1 the program between the Army and the National Organi-
- 2 zation on Disability dated January 2007.
- 3 (b) Expansion of Program.—

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- (1) In General.—The Secretary of the Army shall expand the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration program to nine additional locations in fiscal year 2011. The expansion of the program shall be conducted under the memorandum of understanding referred to in subsection (a), as modified pursuant to subsection (f).
 - (2) Additional purpose of expanded pro-Gram.—The purpose of the expansion of the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration program under this subsection shall be to identify and disseminate best practices related to employment counseling and job placement of severely wounded warriors into civilian communities and careers and to otherwise assess the feasibility and advisability of various additional means to support the transition and reintegration of such warriors into such communities and careers.
 - (3) Locations.—Any location selected for the expansion of the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration program under this subsection shall be a location at which the Army, or one or more of the

1	other Armed Forces, have a large concentration of
2	severely wounded warriors who are ready for career
3	and employment counseling.
4	(c) Services To Be Provided Under Program.—
5	The services provided under the Wounded Warrior Ca-
6	reers Demonstration program shall include career-develop-
7	ment services for severely wounded warriors (and their
8	spouses, if appropriate) that are consistent with their
9	needs. Such services shall be provided by utilizing a
10	proactive, intensive, extended case-management model (in-
11	cluding individualized counseling) pursuant to which such
12	warriors and their families receive assistance in the fol-
13	lowing:

- 4 (d) MINIMUM DURATION OF PROGRAM.—The Sec-
- 5 retary of the Army shall carry out the Wounded Warrior
- 6 Careers Demonstration program until not earlier than the
- 7 date that is five years after the date of the enactment of
- 8 this Act.
- 9 (e) Availability of Services Under Program to
- 10 OTHER ARMED FORCES.—
- 11 (1) IN GENERAL.—The services provided under
- the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration pro-
- gram may be provided to severely wounded warriors
- of one or more of the other Armed Forces pursuant
- to a joint agreement between the Secretary of the
- Army, the Secretary of the military department hav-
- ing jurisdiction over such Armed Force, and the Na-
- tional Organization on Disability.
- 19 (2) COORDINATION.—The Secretary of Defense
- shall ensure coordination between the Secretary of
- 21 the Army, the Secretary of the Navy, and the Sec-
- retary of the Air Force regarding the participation
- of members of other Armed Forces in the Wounded
- Warrior Careers Demonstration program under this
- subsection, including actions to encourage and facili-

- 3 (f) Modifications of Memorandum of Under-
- 4 STANDING.—
- 5 (1) Requirements applicable to the
- 6 ARMY.—The Secretary of the Army and the National
- 7 Organization on Disability shall enter into such
- 8 modifications of the memorandum of understanding
- 9 referred to in subsection (a) as the Secretary and
- the Organization jointly consider appropriate to
- 11 comply with the requirements of subsections (a)
- through (d).
- 13 (2) Requirements applicable to other
- 14 ARMED FORCES.—Any provision of services under
- the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration pro-
- gram through a joint agreement described in sub-
- section (e) shall be incorporated into the memo-
- randum of understanding referred to in subsection
- 19 (a) in such manner as the Secretary of the Army,
- the Secretary of the military department having ju-
- 21 risdiction over the Armed Force concerned, and the
- National Organization on Disability jointly consider
- appropriate.
- 24 (g) Continuation of Dissemination of Lessons
- 25 Learned.—

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- (1) In general.—The Secretary of the Army shall continue to provide for the dissemination to other Federal departments and agencies, State and local governments, and appropriate nonprofit organizations of lessons learned and best practices developed under the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration program on the provision of benefits, services, and support to severely wounded warriors.
- 9 (2) DISSEMINATION TO VA.—As part of the dis-10 semination of information under paragraph (1), the 11 Secretary of the Army and the Secretary of Veterans 12 Affairs shall undertake such joint programs, activi-13 ties, and initiatives as the Secretaries consider ap-14 propriate to facilitate and further the dissemination 15 to the Department of Veterans Affairs of such les-16 sons and best practices as will be of particular use 17 to the Department in providing benefits, services, 18 and support to veterans who were severely wounded 19 warriors.

20 SEC. 2. REPORT ON WOUNDED WARRIOR CAREERS DEM-

21 ONSTRATION PROGRAM.

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than six months after 23 the completion of the Wounded Warrior Careers Dem-24 onstration program, the Secretary of Defense shall, in con-25 junction with the National Organization on Disability

1	(NOD), submit to the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, and
2	to the appropriate committees of Congress, a report on
3	the program.
4	(b) Elements.—The report required by subsection
5	(a) shall include the following:
6	(1) A comprehensive description of the Wound-
7	ed Warrior Careers Demonstration program, includ-
8	ing the following:
9	(A) Information on job placement and re-
10	tention of wounded warriors who participated in
11	the program.
12	(B) A description and assessment of the
13	career services provided under the program to
14	wounded warriors experiencing Post-Traumatic
15	Stress Disorder (PTSD) or Traumatic Brain
16	Injury (TBI).
17	(2) An assessment of the financial costs result-
18	ing from the failure of wounded warriors to gain em-
19	ployment or achieve self-sufficiency after service in
20	the Armed Forces.
21	(3) An assessment of the efficacy of the pro-
22	gram in preparing wounded warriors to meet the
23	challenges of employment after service in the Armed

Forces.

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1	(4) Such recommendations as the Secretary
2	considers appropriate, including recommendations
3	for the continuation or enhancement of the services
4	provided under the program.
5	(c) Definitions.—In this section:
6	(1) The term "appropriate committees of Con-
7	gress" means—
8	(A) the Committee on Armed Services and
9	the Committee on Health, Education, Labor,
10	and Pensions of the Senate; and
11	(B) the Committee on Armed Services and
12	the Committee on Ways and Means of the
13	House of Representatives.
14	(2) The term "National Organization on Dis-
15	ability" refers to the non-governmental organization
16	assisting the Department of the Army in carrying
17	out the Wounded Warrior Careers Demonstration
18	program in collaboration with the Army Wounded

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Warrior Program.

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
