A BILL

To reauthorize and strengthen the Combating Austism Act of 2006 (Public Law 109–416), to establish a National Institute of Autism Spectrum Disorders, to provide for the continuation of certain programs relating to autism, to establish programs to provide services to individuals with autism and the families of such individuals and to increase public education and awareness of autism, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "Combating Autism Re-
- 3 authorization Act of 2010".

4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

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- 5 Congress finds as follows:
- 6 (1) Autism is a general term used to describe 7 a group of complex developmental brain disorders 8 known as pervasive developmental disorders. To 9 meet the criteria for autism spectrum disorder there 10 must be clinically significant and persistent deficits 11 in social behavior, communication, and interactions, 12 as well as restricted, repetitive patterns of behavior, 13 interests, and activities.
 - (2) Autism is a neurodevelopmental disorder that results in difficulties with communication and social interaction, as well as repetitive behaviors. Autism affects individuals differently, mildly affecting some and significantly disabling others.
 - (3) A variety of physical, medical, and mental health issues may accompany autism, resulting in marked functional impairment in all activities of daily living. Epilepsy occurs in as many as 39 percent of individuals with autism. Neurogenetic conditions such as Down syndrome and fragile X syndrome can also co-occur with autism, as can gastro-intestinal problems, immune system disorders, sleep

- disturbance, sensory integration dysfunction, and pica. Many individuals on the autism spectrum face co-occurring mental health challenges, including anxiety and depression.
- (4) A 2009 report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that 1 out of 110 children, and 1 out of 70 boys, in the United States has an autism spectrum disorder. This finding represents a 57 percent increase over the prevalence rate previously reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. With prevalence estimates increasing at an alarming pace, autism is a national health emergency.
 - (5) The United States should ensure that individuals on the autism spectrum are provided equality of opportunity for full participation in society, independent living, and economic self-sufficiency.
 - (6) Autism has high costs to United States society. According to a report from the Harvard School of Public Health, the incremental lifetime cost of caring for a person with autism is \$3,200,000; the cost of caring for all individuals with autism in the United States is more than \$35,000,000,000,000 annually.

- (7) Autism is a major public health concern that is taking an enormous toll on millions of families who need answers that can come only through further research. Meeting the education, employment, and service-provision needs of individuals on the autism spectrum is a clear and compelling public policy issue that requires a rapid national response. Individuals and families are desperate to access services that are, at this point, grossly inadequate to meet the current and growing needs of individuals with autism.
 - (8) Several institutes at the National Institutes of Health conduct or support autism research, but the challenges posed by autism exceed the mission of any individual institute. A cross-agency institute with an aggressive, coordinated, and targeted research agenda aimed at improving the lives of individuals with autism is needed to accelerate research on the causes and effective treatment of autism.
 - (9) In searching for the causes of autism spectrum disorders, all promising avenues of research should be pursued, including research on the role of environmental exposures as risk factors for autism.
 - (10) The heterogeneity and complexity of autism and the etiological and phenotypic subtypes of

- autism require increased investment in large-scale
 biorepositories for DNA, brain tissue, fibroblasts,
 and biosamples relevant to environmental exposures.

 Such biorepositories will enable researchers to discover the multiple environmental and genetic risk
 factors for autism, and to identify biomarkers that
 will allow treatments tailored to the individual.
 - (11) Families of children with autism face barriers to accessing appropriate medical care, including lack of training for professionals, lack of evidence-based treatment guidelines, inadequate dissemination of information, and lack of comparative effectiveness research and other evidence-based treatment research. Autism intervention research networks on physical and behavioral health are needed to address these barriers.
 - (12) Meeting the needs of individuals with autism requires a coordinated approach within Federal agencies and among Federal departments. The approach should focus on both research and services for affected individuals and the families of such individuals.
 - (13) Individuals with autism have the same rights as other people to exert control and choice over their lives, to live independently, and to partici-

- pate fully in, and contribute to, their communities and society through full integration and inclusion in the economic, political, social, cultural, and educational fabric of society. Individuals with autism have the right to a life with dignity and purpose.
 - (14) Individuals with autism often need assistance in the areas of comprehensive early intervention, health, recreation, job training, employment, housing, transportation, and early, primary, and secondary education. With access to, and assistance with, these types of services and supports, individuals with autism can live rich, full, and productive lives. Services for transitioning youth and adults with autism are an especially pressing need, as are services that enhance the safety of individuals with autism of any age.
 - (15) Although autism has touched the lives of many, a significant segment of the public lacks knowledge of the signs of autism and the challenges that individuals with autism and the families of such individuals face.
 - (16) To meet the needs of individuals with autism, training, continuing education, technical assistance, and informational programs are needed for parents and professionals.

1	(17) There is a strong consensus that intensive
2	treatment as soon as possible following diagnosis can
3	significantly improve cognitive functioning, language
4	and adaptive behavior, reduce the cost of lifetime
5	care, and yield the most positive life outcomes for
6	children with autism.
7	SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF
8	AUTISM SPECTRUM DISORDERS.
9	(a) Establishment of the Institute.—Part C of
10	title IV of the Public Health Service Act (42 U.S.C. 285
11	et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following
12	"Subpart 21—National Institute of Autism Spectrum
13	Disorders
14	"SEC. 464z-8. PURPOSE OF THE INSTITUTE.
15	"(a) In General.—The general purpose of the Na-
16	tional Institute of Autism Spectrum Disorders (in this sec-
17	tion referred to as the 'Institute') is the conduct and sup-
18	port of research, training, the dissemination of health in-
19	formation, and other programs with respect to autism
20	spectrum disorders. The principal goal of the Institute is
21	to improve the lives of persons with autism spectrum dis-
22	orders through research focused on prevention, treatment
23	services, and cures.
24	"(b) Duties.—The duties of the Director of the In-
25	stitute shall include the following:

- "(1) Interagency coordination of autism spectrum disorders, the Director of the Institute shall plan and evaluate research and other activities conducted or supported by the agencies of the National Institutes of Health. In carrying out the preceding sentence, the Director of the Institute shall evaluate the activities of each of such agencies and shall provide for the periodic reevaluation of such activities.
 - "(2) Consultations.—The Director of the Institute shall carry out this section in consultation with the heads of the agencies of the National Institutes of Health, with the advisory councils of such agencies, and with the Interagency Autism Coordinating Committee described in section 399CC.
 - "(3) Consolidation of Autism Programs.—
 The Director of the Institute shall make recommendations to the Secretary and the Director of the National Institutes of Health regarding the consolidation of programs of the National Institutes of Health for the express purpose of enhancing support of research on autism spectrum disorders and the coordination of the activities of the Institute with related activities of the other agencies of the National

Institutes of Health and with related activities of
 other Federal agencies.

"(4) Coordination.—The Director of the Institute shall act as the primary Federal official with responsibility for overseeing all research on autism spectrum disorders conducted or supported by the National Institutes of Health and shall maintain communications with all relevant departments of the Federal Government to ensure the timely transmission of information concerning autism spectrum disorders. The Interagency Autism Coordinating Committee shall function as the primary advisory body for all such research coordination on autism spectrum disorders.

"(c) Sunset.—The National Institute of Autism Spectrum Disorders established under this section shall be established for a 10-year period beginning on the date of enactment of the Combating Autism Reauthorization Act of 2010. On the date that is 10 years after the date of enactment of the Combating Autism Reauthorization Act of 2010, the authorities of the Director of the Institute under this section and section 464z–9 shall be transferred to the Director of NIH.".

12	mental factors, such as wandering (referred to in this sec-
13	tion as 'individuals at risk'), the Secretary shall estab-

15	"(1) a one-time, single-year planning grant pro-
16	gram for eligible entities; and

19	"(b) Purpose of Grants.—Grants shall be award-
20	ed to eligible entities to provide all or part of the funding
21	needed to carry out programs that focus critical aspects
22	of life for children, transitioning youth, and adults with
23	autism spectrum disorders (including adults not eligible
24	for developmental disability services provided by a State),
25	such as—

1	"(1) postsecondary education, peer support, vo-
2	cational training, self-advocacy skills, and employ-
3	ment;
4	"(2) community-based behavioral supports and
5	interventions;
6	"(3) residential services, housing, and transpor-
7	tation;
8	"(4) nutrition, health and wellness, recreational
9	and social activities; and
10	"(5) personal safety for individuals at risk and
11	the needs of individuals with autism spectrum dis-
12	orders who become involved with the criminal justice
13	system.
14	"(c) Eligible Entity.—An eligible entity desiring
15	to receive a grant under this section shall be a State or
16	other public or private nonprofit organization, including
17	a State Council on Developmental Disabilities, as defined
18	in section 102 of the Developmental Disabilities Assist-
19	ance and Bill of Rights Act of 2000.
20	"(d) Planning Grants.—
21	"(1) In General.—The Secretary shall award
22	one-time grants to eligible entities to support the
23	planning and development of initiatives that will ex-
24	pand and enhance service delivery systems for chil-

1	dren, individuals at risk, transitioning youth, and
2	adults with autism spectrum disorders.
3	"(2) Application.—In order to receive such a
4	grant, an eligible entity shall—
5	"(A) submit an application at such time
6	and containing such information as the Sec-
7	retary may require; and
8	"(B) demonstrate the ability to carry out
9	such planning grant in coordination with the
10	applicable State Council on Developmental Dis-
11	abilities and organizations representing or serv-
12	ing individuals with autism spectrum disorders
13	and the families of such individuals.
14	"(e) Implementation Grants.—
15	"(1) In General.—The Secretary shall award
16	grants to eligible entities that have received a plan-
17	ning grant under subsection (d) to enable such enti-
18	ties to provide appropriate services to children, indi-
19	viduals at risk, transitioning youth, and adults with
20	autism spectrum disorders.
21	"(2) Application.—In order to receive a grant
22	under paragraph (1), the eligible entity shall submit
23	an application at such time and containing such in-

formation as the Secretary may require, including—

1	"(A) the services that the eligible entity
2	proposes to provide and the expected outcomes
3	for the individuals who receive such services;
4	"(B) the number of individuals who will be
5	served by such grant, including an estimate of
6	the individuals in underserved areas who will be
7	served by such grant;
8	"(C) the ways in which services will be co-
9	ordinated among both public and nonprofit pro-
10	viders of services for children, transitioning
11	youth, and adults with disabilities, including
12	community-based services;
13	"(D) where applicable, the process through
14	which the eligible entity will distribute funds to
15	a range of community-based or nonprofit pro-
16	viders of services, including local governments,
17	and the capacity of such entity to provide such
18	services;
19	"(E) the process through which the eligible
20	entity will monitor and evaluate the outcome of
21	activities funded through the grant, including
22	the effect of the activities upon individuals who

receive such services;

1	"(F) where applicable, the plans of the eli-
2	gible entity to coordinate and streamline transi-
3	tions from youth to adult services;
4	"(G) the process by which the eligible enti-
5	ty will ensure compliance with the integration
6	requirement under section 302 of the Ameri-
7	cans With Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C
8	12182); and
9	"(H) a description of how such services
10	may be sustained following the grant period.
11	"(f) EVALUATION.—The Secretary shall contract
12	with a third-party organization with expertise in evalua-
13	tion to evaluate such demonstration grant program and
14	not later than 180 days after the conclusion of the grant
15	program under subsection (e), submit a report to the Sec-
16	retary. The evaluation and report may include an analysis
17	of whether and to what extent the services provided
18	through the grant program described in this section re-
19	sulted in improved safety, health, education, employment
20	and community integration outcomes or other measures
21	as the Secretary determines appropriate.
22	"(g) Administrative Expenses.—Of the amounts
23	appropriated to carry out this section, the Secretary shall
24	set aside not more than 7 percent for administrative ex-

- 1 penses, including the expenses related to carrying out the
- 2 evaluation described in subsection (f).
- 3 "(h) Supplement, Not Supplant.—Demonstra-
- 4 tion grant funds provided under this section shall supple-
- 5 ment, not supplant, existing treatments, interventions,
- 6 and services for individuals with autism spectrum dis-
- 7 orders.".

8 "SEC. 399EE-1. MULTIMEDIA CAMPAIGN.

- 9 "(a) In General.—The Secretary, in order to en-
- 10 hance existing awareness campaigns and provide for the
- 11 implementation of new campaigns, shall award grants to
- 12 public and nonprofit private entities for the purpose of
- 13 carrying out multimedia campaigns to increase public edu-
- 14 cation and awareness and reduce stigma concerning—
- 15 "(1) healthy developmental milestones for in-
- fants and children that may assist in the early iden-
- tification of the signs and symptoms of autism spec-
- trum disorders; and
- 19 "(2) autism spectrum disorders through the

8	"(2) provide assurance that the multimedia
9	campaign implemented under such grant will provide
10	information that is tailored to the intended audience,
11	which may be a diverse public audience or a specific
12	audience, such as health professionals, employers,
13	criminal justice professionals, or emergency response
14	professionals.
15	"SEC. 399EE-2. NATIONAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE CENTER
16	FOR AUTISM TREATMENTS, INTERVENTIONS,
17	AND SERVICES.
18	"(a) Establishment of National Technical As-
19	SISTANCE CENTER FOR AUTISM TREATMENTS, INTER-
20	VENTIONS, AND SERVICES.—The Secretary shall award a
21	grant to a national nonprofit organization for the estab-

23	ance center.

7	"(3) Priority.—In awarding grants under this
8	section, the Secretary shall give priority to appli-
9	cants that—
10	"(A) are minority institutions that have
11	demonstrated capacity to meet the requirements
12	of this section and provide services to individ-
13	uals with autism spectrum disorders and the
14	families of such individuals; or
15	"(B) are located in a State with one or
16	more unserved or underserved populations.
17	"(4) Authorization of appropriations.—
18	To carry out this section, there are authorized to be
19	appropriated the following:
20	"(A) For fiscal year 2011, \$2,000,000.
21	"(B) For fiscal year 2012, \$2,200,000.
22	"(C) For fiscal year 2013, \$2,400,000.
23	"(D) For fiscal year 2014, \$2,600,000.
24	"(E) For fiscal year 2015, \$2,800,000.
25	"(F) For fiscal year 2016, \$3,000,000.

1	"(5) Definition.—In this subsection:
2	"(A) The term 'minority institution' has
3	the meaning given such term in section 365 of
4	the Higher Education Act of 1965.
5	"(B) The term 'University Center for Ex-
6	cellence in Developmental Disabilities Edu-
7	cation, Research, and Service' means a Univer-
8	sity Center for Excellence in Developmental
9	Disabilities Education, Research, and Service
10	that has been or is funded through subtitle D
11	or this subsection.".
12	SEC. 9. REPORT TO CONGRESS.
13	Not later than January 1, 2013, and each January
14	1 thereafter, the Secretary shall submit to the appropriate
15	committees of Congress a report concerning the implemen-
16	tation of this Act, including the amendments made by this
