Mr. Brown (for himself, Mr. Kerry, and Mr. Lieberman) introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

A BILL

To direct the Secretary of Homeland Security to conduct a survey to determine the level of compliance with national voluntary consensus standards and any barriers to achieving compliance with such standards, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Firefighter Fatality
- 5 Reduction Act of 2009".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
- 7 Congress makes the following findings:

- (1) Each year in the United States, over 100 firefighters die in the line of duty, while an additional tens of thousands of firefighters are injured.
 - (2) The Federal Government has a vested interest in protecting firefighter health and safety, as it relies on local fire departments to efficiently and effectively implement the National Response Framework in the response to major disasters.
 - (3) Adequate training, proper personal protective equipment, safe staffing levels, safe operating procedures, and physical and mental fitness of firefighters can reduce avoidable firefighter fatalities.
 - (4) The fire services, in conjunction with Government agencies and interested private-sector parties, has partnered with standards-making bodies to develop national voluntary consensus standards for safe fire department operations and fire fighting capabilities.
 - (5) Such standards are widely respected and promoted by all facets of the fire service to better ensure firefighter health and safety.
 - (6) Through its Firefighter Fatality Investigation and Prevention Program, the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health has identified the failure to follow specific national voluntary con-

- sensus standards as a contributing factor in many firefighter deaths.
- (7) A comprehensive accounting of fire department compliance with national voluntary consensus standards would help policy makers seeking to enhance public safety and reduce avoidable firefighter fatalities.

8 SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS.

- 9 In this Act—
- 10 (1) the term "national voluntary consensus 11 standards" means the most recently issued edition of 12 the national voluntary consensus standards for fire-13 fighter and fire department staffing, training, safe 14 operations, personal protective equipment, and fit-15 ness available on the date of enactment of this Act;
- 16 (2) the term "Secretary" means the Secretary
 17 of Homeland Security; and
- 18 (3) the term "Task Force" means the Task 19 Force to Enhance Firefighter Safety established 20 under section 5(a).
- 21 SEC. 4. SURVEY BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SE-
- 22 CURITY.
- 23 (a) SURVEY REQUIRED.—Not later than 120 days 24 after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary, in 25 consultation with the Task Force, shall begin to conduct

1	a survey of each career, volunteer, and combination fire
2	department located in the United States in order to ascer-
3	tain whether each such fire department is in compliance
4	with national voluntary consensus standards.
5	(b) Contents of Survey.—In conducting the sur-
6	vey, the Secretary shall—
7	(1) ascertain the rates of compliance with na-
8	tional voluntary consensus standards of—
9	(A) paid, volunteer, and combination fire
10	departments;
11	(B) fire departments located in commu-
12	nities of varying sizes; and
13	(C) fire departments in each of the States
14	and territories; and
15	(2) ascertain, for each fire department in the
16	United States, compliance with national voluntary
17	consensus standards for staffing, training, safe oper-
18	ations, personal protective equipment, and fitness.
19	(c) Report.—Not later than 2 years after the date
20	of enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall submit to
21	Congress a report—
22	(1) containing a summary of the findings of the
23	survey required under subsection (a); and

1	(2) that includes an accounting of fire depart-
2	ment compliance with national voluntary consensus
3	standards as described in subsection $(b)(1)$.
4	SEC. 5. ESTABLISHMENT OF TASK FORCE TO ENHANCE
5	FIREFIGHTER SAFETY.
6	(a) Establishment.—Not later than 60 days after
7	the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall
8	establish a task force to be known as the "Task Force
9	to Enhance Firefighter Safety".
10	(b) Membership.—
11	(1) IN GENERAL.—Members of the Task Force
12	shall be appointed by the Secretary from among the
13	general public and shall include—
14	(A) representatives of national organiza-
15	tions representing firefighters and fire chiefs;
16	(B) individuals representing standards-set-
17	ting and accrediting organizations, including
18	representatives from the voluntary consensus
19	codes and standards development community;
20	and
21	(C) other individuals as the Secretary de-
22	termines to be appropriate.
23	(2) Representatives of other depart-
24	MENTS AND AGENCIES.—The Secretary may invite
25	representatives of other Federal departments and

- agencies that have an interest in the fire service to participate in the meetings and other activities of the Task Force.
 - (3) Number; Terms of Service; Pay and allowances.—The Secretary shall determine the number, terms of service, and pay and allowances of members of the Task Force appointed by the Secretary, except that a term of service of any such member may not exceed 2 years.

(c) Responsibilities.—The Task Force shall—

- (1) consult with the Secretary to conduct the survey required under section 4; and
- (2) develop a plan to enhance firefighter safety by increasing fire department compliance with national voluntary consensus standards for staffing, training, safe operations, personal protective equipment, and fitness, including by—
 - (A) reviewing and evaluating the report required under section 4 to determine the extent of and barriers to achieving compliance with national voluntary consensus standards among fire departments; and
 - (B) considering ways in which the Federal Government, States, and local governments can promote, encourage, or require fire departments

- 3 (d) Report to Congress.—Not later than 6
- 4 months after the date on which the Secretary submits the
- 5 report required under section 4(c), the Task Force shall
- 6 submit to Congress and the Secretary a report containing
- 7 the findings and recommendations of the Task Force to-
- 8 gether with the plan described in subsection (c)(2).
