RESOLUTION

Authorizing expenditures by committees of the Senate for the periods March 1, 2009, through September 30, 2009, and October 1, 2009, through September 30, 2010, and October 1, 2010, through February 28, 2011.

1 *Resolved,*

2 **SECTION 1. AGGREGATE AUTHORIZATION.**

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of carrying out the
4 powers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules
5 of the Senate, and under the appropriate authorizing reso-
6 lutions of the Senate there is authorized for the period
7 March 1, 2009, through September 30, 2009, in the ag-
8 gregate of \$69,152,989, for the period October 1, 2009,

1 through September 30, 2010, in the aggregate of
2 \$121,593,254, and for the period October 1, 2010,
3 through February 28, 2011, in the aggregate of
4 \$51,787,223, in accordance with the provisions of this res-
5 olution, for standing committees of the Senate, the Special
6 Committee on Aging, the Select Committee on Intel-
7 ligence, and the Committee on Indian Affairs.

8 (b) AGENCY CONTRIBUTIONS.—There are authorized
9 such sums as may be necessary for agency contributions
10 related to the compensation of employees of the commit-
11 tees for the period March 1, 2009, through September 30,
12 2009, for the period October 1, 2009, through September
13 30, 2010, and for the period October 1, 2010, through
14 February 28, 2011, to be paid from the appropriations
15 account for “Expenses of Inquiries and Investigations” of
16 the Senate.

17 **SEC. 2. COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE, NUTRITION, AND**
18 **FORESTRY.**

19 (a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—In carrying out its pow-
20 ers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules of the
21 Senate, in accordance with its jurisdiction under rule XXV
22 of such rules, including holding hearings, reporting such
23 hearings, and making investigations as authorized by
24 paragraphs 1 and 8 of rule XXVI of the Standing Rules
25 of the Senate, the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition,

1 and Forestry is authorized from March 1, 2009, through
2 February 28, 2011, in its discretion—

3 (1) to make expenditures from the contingent
4 fund of the Senate;

5 (2) to employ personnel; and

6 (3) with the prior consent of the Government
7 department or agency concerned and the Committee
8 on Rules and Administration, to use on a reimburs-
9 able, or nonreimbursable, basis the services of per-
10 sonnel of any such department or agency.

11 (b) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING SEPTEMBER 30,
12 2009.—The expenses of the committee for the period
13 March 1, 2009, through September 30, 2009, under this
14 section shall not exceed \$2,735,622, of which amount—

15 (1) not to exceed \$200,000, may be expended
16 for the procurement of the services of individual con-
17 sultants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by
18 section 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act
19 of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 72a(i))); and

20 (2) not to exceed \$40,000, may be expended for
21 the training of the professional staff of such com-
22 mittee (under procedures specified by section 202(j)
23 of that Act).

24 (c) EXPENSES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2010 PERIOD.—
25 The expenses of the committee for the period October 1,

1 2009, through September 30, 2010, under this section
2 shall not exceed \$4,809,496, of which amount—

3 (1) not to exceed \$200,000, may be expended
4 for the procurement of the services of individual con-
5 sultants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by
6 section 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act
7 of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 72a(i))); and

8 (2) not to exceed \$40,000, may be expended for
9 the training of the professional staff of such com-
10 mittee (under procedures specified by section 202(j)
11 of that Act).

12 (d) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING FEBRUARY 28,
13 2011.—For the period October 1, 2010, through February
14 28, 2011, expenses of the committee under this section
15 shall not exceed \$2,048,172, of which amount—

16 (1) not to exceed \$200,000, may be expended
17 for the procurement of the services of individual con-
18 sultants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by
19 section 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act
20 of 1946); and

21 (2) not to exceed \$40,000, may be expended for
22 the training of the professional staff of such com-
23 mittee (under procedures specified by section 202(j)
24 of that Act).

3 ers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules of the

13 The expenses of the committee for the period October 1,
14 2009, through September 30, 2010, under this section
15 shall not exceed \$3,327,243, of which amount—

16 (1) not to exceed \$200,000, may be expended
17 for the procurement of the services of individual con-
18 sultants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by
19 section 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act
20 of 1946); and

21 (2) not to exceed \$15,000, may be expended for
22 the training of the professional staff of such com-
23 mittee (under procedures specified by section 202(j)
24 of that Act).

1 (d) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING FEBRUARY 28,
2 2011.—For the period October 1, 2010, through February
3 28, 2011, expenses of the committee under this section
4 shall not exceed \$1,416,944, of which amount—

18 445, agreed to October 9, 2004 (108th Congress), in ac-

20 of such S. Res. 400, including holding hearings, reporting
21 such hearings, and making investigations as authorized by
22 section 5 of such S. Res. 400, the Select Committee on
23 Intelligence is authorized from March 1, 2009, through

1 (1) to make expenditures from the contingent
2 fund of the Senate;

4 (3) with the prior consent of the Government
5 department or agency concerned and the Committee
6 on Rules and Administration, to use on a reimburs-
7 able, or nonreimbursable, basis the services of per-
8 sonnel of any such department or agency.

6 (2) not to exceed \$2,000, may be expended for
 7 the training of the professional staff of such com-

23 **SEC. 19. COMMITTEE ON INDIAN AFFAIRS.**

24 (a) GENERAL AUTHORITY.—In carrying out its pow-
 25 ers, duties, and functions imposed by section 105 of S.

1 Res. 4, agreed to February 4, 1977 (95th Congress), and
2 in exercising the authority conferred on it by that section,
3 the Committee on Indian Affairs is authorized from March
4 1, 2009, through February 28, 2011, in its discretion—

5 (1) to make expenditures from the contingent
6 fund of the Senate;

7 (2) to employ personnel; and

8 (3) with the prior consent of the Government
9 department or agency concerned and the Committee
10 on Rules and Administration, to use on a reimburs-
11 able, or nonreimbursable, basis the services of per-
12 sonnel of any such department or agency.

13 (b) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING SEPTEMBER 30,
14 2009.—The expenses of the committee for the period

10 (2) not to exceed \$20,000, may be expended for
11 training consultants of the professional staff of such
12 committee (under procedures specified by section
13 202(j) of that Act).

14 (d) EXPENSES FOR PERIOD ENDING FEBRUARY 28,
15 2011.—For the period October 1, 2010, through February
16 28, 2011, expenses of the committee under this section
17 shall not exceed \$1,083,838, of which amount—

18 (1) not to exceed \$20,000, may be expended for
19 the procurement of the services of individual consult-
20 ants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by sec-
21 tion 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
22 1946); and

23 (2) not to exceed \$20,000, may be expended for
24 training consultants of the professional staff of such

1 committee (under procedures specified by section
2 202(j) of that Act).

3 **SEC. 20. SPECIAL RESERVE.**

4 (a) ESTABLISHMENT.—Within the funds in the ac-
5 count “Expenses of Inquiries and Investigations” appro-
6 priated by the legislative branch appropriation Acts for fis-
7 cal years 2009, 2010, and 2011, there is authorized to
8 be established a special reserve to be available to any com-
9 mittee funded by this resolution as provided in subsection
10 (b) of which—

11 (1) an amount not to exceed \$4,375,000, shall
12 be available for the period March 1, 2009, through
13 September 30, 2009; and

14 (2) an amount not to exceed \$7,500,000, shall
15 be available for the period October 1, 2009, through
16 September 30, 2010; and

17 (3) an amount not to exceed \$3,125,000, shall
18 be available for the period October 1, 2010, through
19 February 28, 2011.

20 (b) AVAILABILITY.—The special reserve authorized in
21 subsection (a) shall be available to any committee—

22 (1) on the basis of special need to meet unpaid
23 obligations incurred by that committee during the
24 periods referred to in paragraphs (1), (2), and (3)
25 of subsection (a); and

1 (2) at the request of a Chairman and Ranking
2 Member of that committee subject to the approval of
3 the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Com-
4 mittee on Rules and Administration.

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
